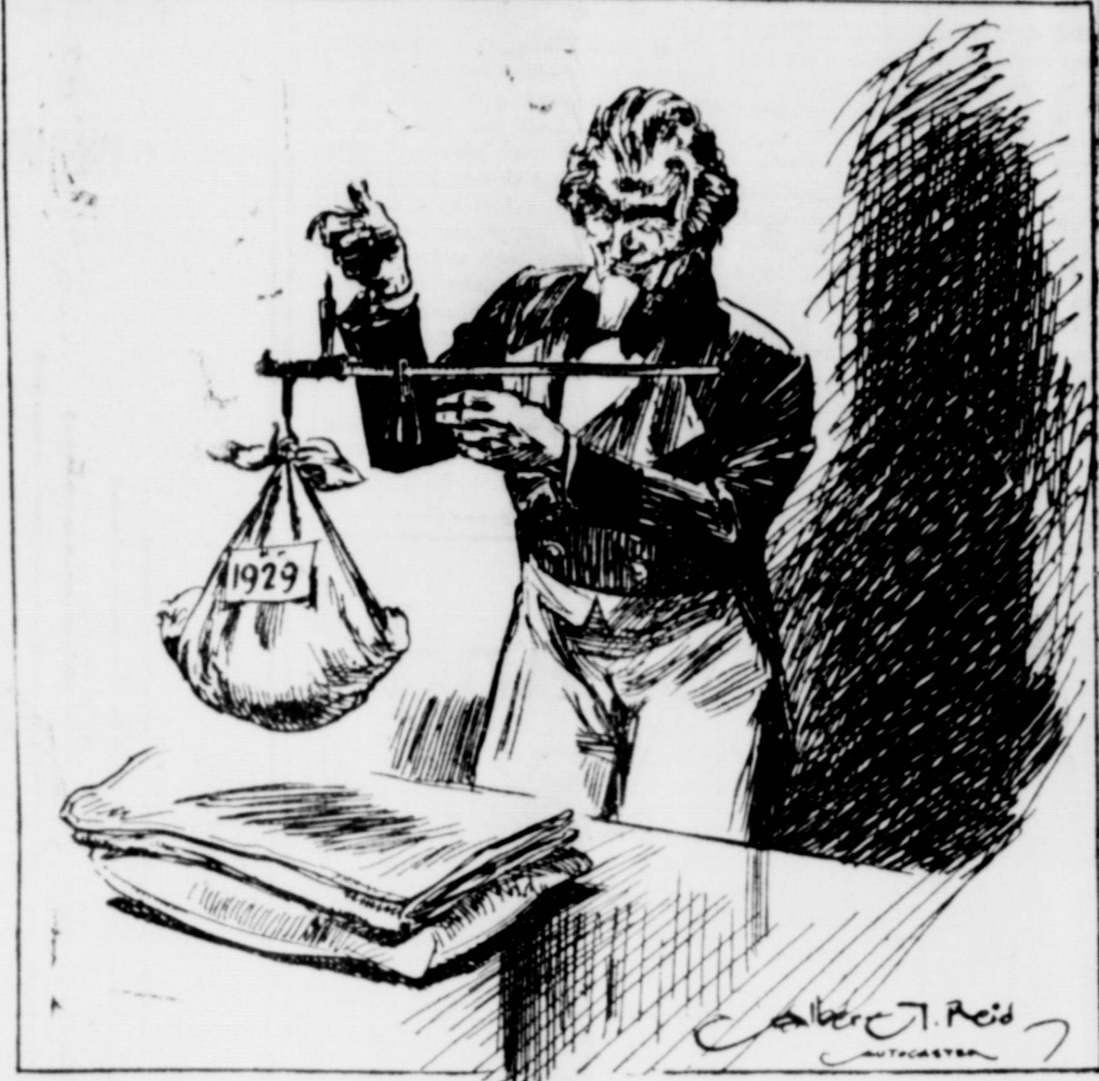

WILLIAM GREEN GIVES VIEWS ON CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, recently said, "The Christmas Seal Sale of the National Tuberculosis Association provides an opportunity to place upon every communication of the holiday period a symbol of the spirit of good will between men. The anti-tuberculosis movement is one of constructive purpose and method. Dissemination of health information is the sure way to check the white plague and this may be promoted by buying Christmas seals."

Every one can contribute in accord with his ability and I hope that wage-earners will do their part. The Association has put a special emphasis on preventative work among wage-earners because the highest mortality is among our fellow workers. This is an added reason for workers to encourage the sale for 1928 by endorsement and by purchasing the seals."

The sale in Texas is being conducted by the Texas Public Health Association and their twenty-three local associations. It is expected that over \$100,000 worth of these health seals will be sold.

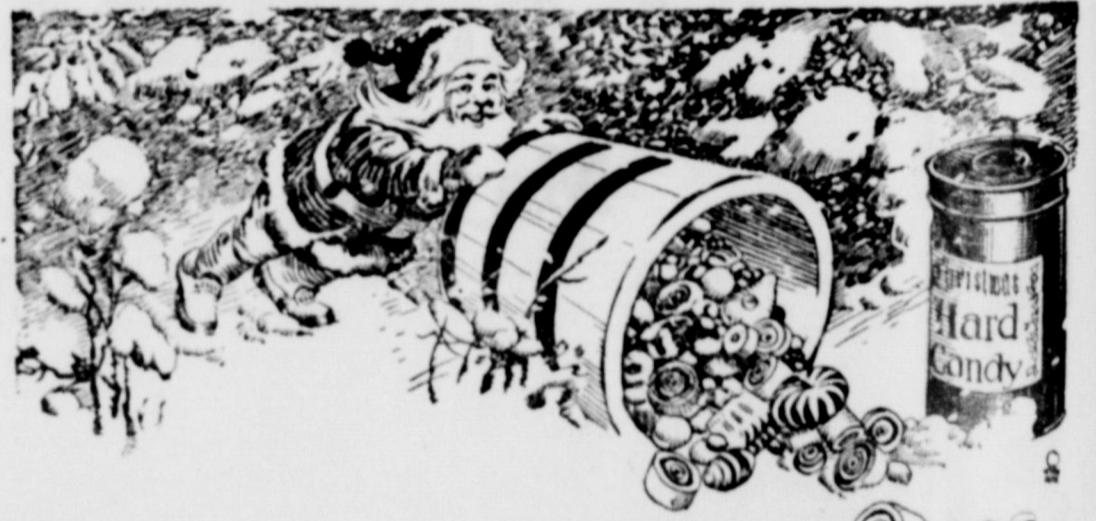

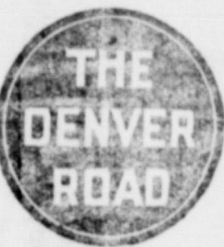

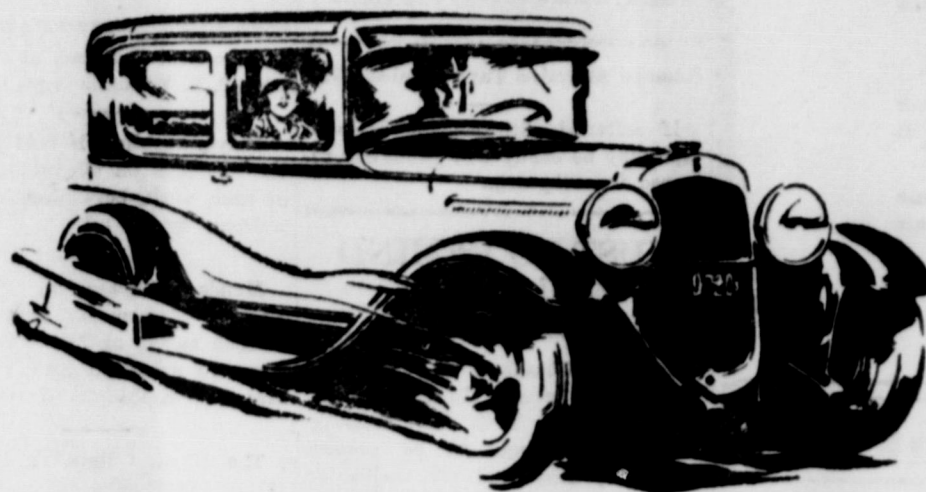

THE lubrication system for the engine of the new Ford is as simple in principle as water running down-hill.

A gear pump in the bottom of the oil pan raises the oil to the valve chamber reservoir. From here it flows on to the main crankshaft bearings and the front camshaft bearing. Overflow oil drops into the oil pan tray and runs into troughs through which the connecting rods pass.

As the ends of these rods strike the oil they scoop up a supply for the connecting rod bearing. At the same time they set up a fine spray that lubricates the pistons and other moving parts.

If the oil level is allowed to fall below low, the supply becomes insufficient to oil all parts as they should be oiled.
