The destruction of property by fire in America has steadily increased until the annual loss now is approximately 500 million dollars.

These hundred of millions of dollars have gone beyond re- I. O. O. F. Mrs. Robert Walker and claim; the money has been worse than wasted.





After she is down, or even before, she should have her udder pumped up and the teats should be tied so the air will stay in until the presure has done its work. Never let the bindings stay on all night as the circulation being cut off for a long time will cause the teat to slough off at the point of binding. Never let the bindings stay more than three hours. Be very cautious that no infection is intf. in a solution of lysol or any good disinfectant and also throughly disinfect the instruments that are used as about as many cows are ruined from the infection introduced into the udder by the treatment as by milk fever It can wel be remembered that milk fever is not contageous and is seldom if ever found in the heifer calving her first time. Fever is often found in heavy producting cows but when found in the ordinary farm cow the cause is poor management before calving. Lack of proper feed and min erals.


