Bears Open Season With Mountaineers

Baird's young and inexperienced Bears will open the 1965 football wars with the Santa Anna Mountaineers Friday night at the Bears Den. Kickoff time is 8:00 p. m.

Santa Anna will be seeking to avenge the 45-12 pasting handed them last year by the Bears.

The 1964 district champion Bears were virtually wiped out by graduation, losing 15 Seniors. Nine letter men return for this year's team, one regular starter from last year and eight reserves.

Steve Stanley, at 155 lbs. is the only regular starter return-

ing. Other lettermen are J. D. Faircloth, 145, back; Dickie Hass at 145 and Bobbie Jack Sims, 165, guards; Tommy Bearden, 165, center; Robert Griggs, 150, tackle; Kenny Townsend, 130, back; Benny Brame, 130, end; and Donald Barron, 135, center.

Rites Held For Wreck Victim

Funeral services for Robert John Lewis, 42, of Franklin, Wis., killed Friday morning in a car-truck crash west of Baird, was held at 2 p. m. Monday in Godfrey Funeral Home chapel with the Rev. Albert Cooper, pastor of the First Methodist Church, officiating.

Burial was in Ross Cemetery under direction of Godfrey Funeral Home.

Mr. Lewis was killed along with Danny Niles Tatum, 15 of Memphis, Tenn., when the car they were in crashed head-on into a truck loaded with cement sacks about 2:20 a. m. Lewis was hitchhiking a ride with Tatum.

Highway patrolman Jerry Matthews of Baird said a motorist saw the teenager pick up Lewis a short time earlier between Abilene and Baird.

Edge Smith of Waxahachie, driver of the truck, was not injured.

Mr. Lewis was a veteran of the Navy during World War II. Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Ethel Sattler, and one sister, Mrs. Arlene Craig, both of South Bend, Ind.

School doors swung wide Monday mornings as classes began in Baird Public Schools. Total enrollment this year is 389.

The 2nd and 7th grades had the largest with 41 and 38. There are 35 first graders, 30 third graders, 35 fourth and fifth graders, 23 sixth graders, 32 in the eighth grade.

In high school there are 35 freshmen, 30 sophomores, 33 juniors and 22 seniors.

After the first five days of classes, the schedule will be interrupted for the first holiday, Monday, Sept. 6.

would also pay \$50 a month for part-time secretarial help for Keathley.

Jones County is expected to approve between \$2,000 and \$2,200 as its part in the system next year.

The money approved by the three counties would then be enough to give Keathley a \$500 a year raise, which is expected to be requested by 104th District Judge Owen Thomas and 42nd District Judge J. R. Black. The judges are Keathley's superiors under the law setting up the office in Abilene.

It would also be enough to pay \$4,500 for a male assistant to Keathley, which the judges are also expected to request, and \$50 a month for permanent part-time secretarial help, which Keathley said he wants.

New Law

The tri-county plan was prompted by a new law which became effective this week which allows for the probation of persons convicted of misdemeanor crimes.

Commissioners are expecting that misdemeanor court judges in the three counties will assess the probationers enough fines and fees to pay much of the expenses of the office.

Guilty Plea In Bogus Bond Sale

A 37-year old Abilene man pleaded guilty in 42nd District Court here Monday to the illegal sale of bogus church bonds to a retired Cross Plains school teacher, and was given a four-year probationed prison sentence.

The plea was entered by Wellington Sharp of Abilene, to an indictment alleging the sale of securities by an unregistered dealer.

Three other indictments growing out of the same transaction will be dismissed, Dist. Atty. Bradley Miles said.

The bogus bond victim was Miss Missouri Strahan, who purchased \$2,000 worth of bonds on Master Church Bonds, Inc., a corporation headed by Sharp, Miles said.

One of the stipulations in Judge J. R. Black's probation decree was that restitution be made in the case.

Sharp is also under two felony check-swindling indictments in 42nd District Court in Abilene. These cases are still pending, Miles said.

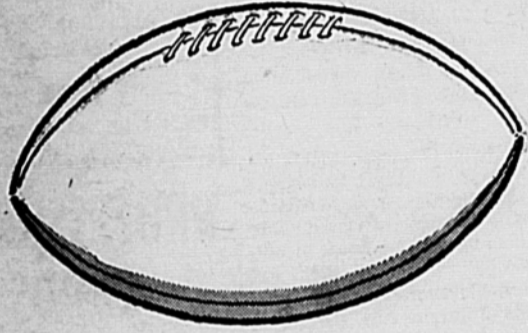

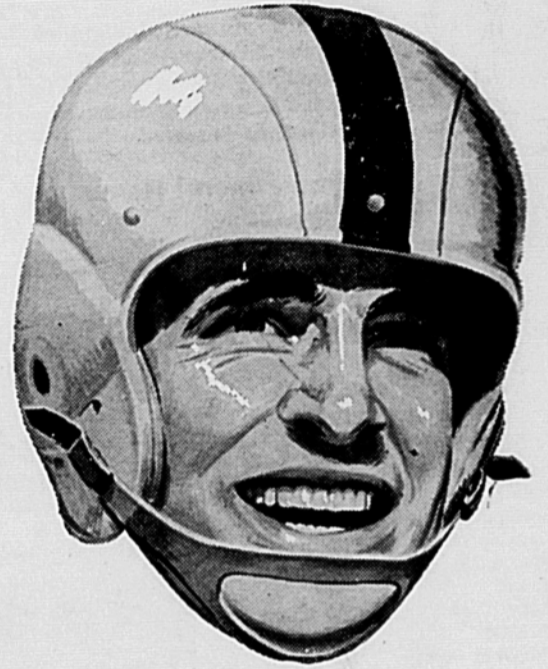

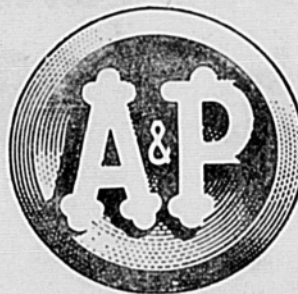
