174-H Calves Are Now Started; More May Be Added

Eleven 4-H Club boys of Knox County have started their calf feeding program for this year which includes seventeen calves now on feed. There are strong indications that this number of boys will be increased within the next week or ten days, according to R. O. Dunkle, County Agent.

All the 17 calves that are now on feed are of very high quality and most of the calves are on nurse cows and indicataions are that the highest quality groups that have been fed in Knox County. These calves all possess a very desirable type, quality and conformation and were selected from the League Ranch of Benjamin and the Edgar Norton Ranch in Hardeman County, and McFadden Ranch of Ben-

Most of the 4-H Club boys feeding calves are those that have had previous experience and three boys who are feeding calves for the first time this year. These boys are all interested in beef cattle and have a personal liking for livestock, and are willing to devote considerable time to carry out the small details which are necessary to keep their calves on full feed, and to make the maximum gain.

Another very important phase of 4-H Club work is that these boys have parents who are interested in his calf feeding demonstration, and wno will encourage their sons from time to time to carry out the instructions that are so important in a successful calf feeding program.



Dark Flour To Contain A Higher Protein Value vealed that the difference in bread

Enriched 80 per cent flour, to be on grocery shelves soon, has the same vitamin content as enriched white flour, but is higher in protein value energy-according to Miss Edith Lawrence, food preparation specialist of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service.

The story of American flour, Miss Lawrence says, goes something like this: For many years modern white flour has been losing Roxy Theater important values in milling. In order to have it white and fine, and of good keeping quality, the outer coat of the grain was removed. With it went around seveneights of the thiamine and niacin, three-fourths of the ribo-flavin, and four-fifths of the iron, as well as some calcium, phosphorus and better quality protein.



Quoting from an extensive survey, the Department points out that in 1942, milk consumption per capita at the \$2,000 income level per family was fully as high as at the \$4,000 level.

higher for the lower income group, being about two and three-fourths quarts per capita per week at the \$2,000 level and about two and onehalf quarts per week for the \$4,000 group. In the case of cheese, butter and ice cream differences in consumption were slight, but in each case were in favor of the higher income groups.

As incomes dropped below \$1,500 per year the quality of the diet deteriorated materially. For example, with incomes under \$1,000 a year consumption of milk dropped to a little less than two quarts per person per week. The decrease in consumption of other dairy products was fully as great propor-

This survey indicates that the consumption of milk and its products rises rapidly until incomes reach approximately \$2,000 per year. The really startling fact is that above that income level people apparently do not ordinarily improve their food habits materially with respect to the use of milk. 'It is obvious," states Mrs. Ethel Austin Martin, director of the Nutrition Service of the National Dairy Council," "that extensive nutrition education is essential if Americans are to consume the quantities of milk recommended by scientific authorities."



day before yesterday, I learned that you are anxious to sell the land you have and move to Missouri. I have been thinking of this ever since and cannot but think such a notion is utterly foolish.

"What can you do in Missouri better than here? Is the land any richer? Can you there, any more than here, raise corn and wheat and oats without work? Will anybody there, any more than here, do your work for you? If you intend to go to work, there is no better place than right where you are; if you do not intend to go to work, you can not get along anywhere.

"Squirming and crawling about from place to place can do no good. You have raised no corn this year; and what you really want is to sell the land, get the money and spend it. Part with the land you have and, my life upon it, you will never after own a spot big enough to bury you in. Half you will get for the land, you will spend in moving to Missouri and the other half you will eat, drink and wear out, and no foot of land will be bought.

"Now do not misunderstand this letter; I do not write it in any unkindness. I write it in order, if possible, to get you to face the truth, which truth is, you are destitute because you have idled away your time. Your thousand pre-tenses for not getting along better are all nonsense; they deceive nobody but yourself. Go to work is the only cure for your case."
