# **BRITAIN RECEIVES UNITED STATES WAR**

Not Be Acted Upon Until Next Week.

Washington.—Ambassador Kellogg has reported to the State Depart-ment that he had delivered to the British Foreign Office the American reply to the communication from the London Government questioning the right of the United States to collect war claims from Germany from ben-efits received by that country under the Dawes plan.

The reply, drafted by Secretary Hughes, is understood to firmly sup-port the position that the Washington Government has every right accorded to the allied and associated powers to make its collections under the Dawes plan.

The reply rejects the British contention which was to the general effect that the United States, not being a party to the Versailles treaty the Dawes plan, has no right to any shares of the money collected thereunder. American claims total about \$250,000,000 and are for damage to American lives and property by Germans.

President Coolidge is reported as being opposed to any plan for submission to the world court or any other tribunal of the adjudication of war claims against Germany under the Dawes plan. His position also was said to be unchanged regarding war debt funding to the United States by France and other powers.

Mr. Coolidge is known to be con-vinced that the American position regarding claims collection is perectly understood by foreign Government interests and that the right of collection is established beyond quesion by treaty agreements.

The President's position that there is no need coreferring the subject of claims collections to a tribunal for adjudication is understood to be based on the belief that whatever differences may exist between the United States and Great Britain can e adjusted by regular negotiations conducted through representatives of th etwo Governments.

He feels it as evident that the position of the Washington administration, which has been outlined to the allied and associated powers by Ambassador Kellogg during the London conference, will be recognized by the interested Governments as the negotiations now being carried on beween Washington and London pro-

While he is being closely advised egarding the agitation by a part of London press concerning the question of war debt funding to the United States there has been no change in the position steadfastly taken by the executive on the ques tion and he sees no occasion for giving American newspapers materials to answer the arguments advanced by London papers.

### **OBSERVATION WARD** URGED FOR INSANE

To Provide an Observation Ward Where Patients Will Be Ex-amined and Classified

Austin, Texas.-Adoption by the coming session of the Legislature of recommendations which have been prepared by the State Board of Control will result in the carrying out of the board's plan for better medical treatment of patients confined in the various institutions for the insane in the State, according to an announcement by the board and such action would obviate the enactment of a law which Senator R. A. Stuart of Fort Worth has in contemplation.

The budget for insane asylums recently adopted by the State Board of Control provide for increase in salaries of first assistant physicians, who shall be graduate psychiatrists, and other assistant physicians. These increases are asked with the view of applying the most modern methods. applying the most modern methods in the treatment of the insane. In each asylum it is planned to provide an observation ward where patients will be thoroughly examined and classified, the most acute cause be-ing separated from the others. Ef-forts will then be concentrated on those patients classified as curable. The board had discussed the feasibility of establishing a common hospital for observation work to be located at some central point, but it found that this would be too expensive. In the opinion of board memthe providing of an observation ward in each institution would be more practical and less expensive. Such wards would save the expense of sending patients to the general observation ward from the institutions in which they are confined.

Salaries of first assistant physi-

cians would be increased from \$1,-800 to \$2,000 per annum, with board and laundry, if the Legislature fol-lows the Board of Control's recommendations. Salaries of other as-sistants would be increased to \$1,800. At the present time some of these receive \$1,400 and others \$1,500.

### NAVAL MEASURE IS APPROVED BY SENATE

Bill Authorizes Building Program
Cost \$110,000,000.

Washington.—The Senate has approved the naval construction bill authorizing a program expected to

cost \$110,000,000.

The bill provides for construction of eighty-eight cruisers, six gunboats to be used on the Yangtse River in China and the conversion of six battleships from coal to oil burners.

The measure was passed by the House and Senate last session, but was held up by a motion by Senator King (Dem.) of Utah to reconsider, which was defeated.

Appropriations for the program ill be asked in the navy supply asked in the navy supply bill for the next fiscal year, Chair-man Hale of the Naval Committee announced

Senator King reiterated his opposition, demanding again "an exhaustive and comprehensive investiga-tion of the conduct of the Navy De-

He declared the department "in-efficient and not up to the standards expected by the American peo-

"There is a feeling," he continued, tion in the navy in the last four

He favored consideration by the navy of the air and submarine prob-iems, and served notice that when the navy supply measure came up he would ask further inquiry into navy conditions.

Chairman Hale said Senator King's resolution for a naval inquiry "would receive every consideration when it came up before the committee."

Beek Inclusion of Corpus Christ New Orleans Intercostal

Representative Dempsey of New York, chairman of the House com-mitee reporting the bill, in a speech pefore the Rivers and Harbors Congress referred to these as the three most important projects in the bill and referring particularly to the in-tracostal canal said that on account pf the high costs prohibiting afl road construction this would be an important adjunct in handling the country's commerce. He pointed out cources of sulphur to be found in the Southwest, being at Gulf and Freeport.

### SAMUEL GOMPERS LABOR CHIEF PASSES AWAY

FAILING HEART ACTION AND THE GRUELLING TRIP FROM CITY OF MEXICO CAUSE

"THE CHIEF IS GONE"

Just Before the End Gompers Grasp ed the Hand of One of His Associates, Asking for His Wife.

San Antonio, Texas.—Samuel Gomp eds died at 4:05 Saturday morning in his room at the St. Anthony Hotel. His death was announced five minutes later by Chester I. Wright, press representative of the American Federation of Labor.

Wright came into the hall from the room where Gompers battled with the grim reaper all through the long hours of the night and said:

"The chief is gone."

Failing heart action, caused by the strain of the grueling trip from the City of Mexico and the aged man's generally weakened condition caused his death according to Wright.

In a bulletin issued at 10 o'clock Friday night, the last official state-ment issued before Gompers' death, the physicians declared that there been no change in his condition and that there was every indication he would spend a comfortable night.

At 2 o'clock, however, there was a sudden change in the veteran labor leader's condition and he sank rapid ly from that time until 4:05 o'clock

Shortly after 2 o'clock all memers of the Gompers party and officials of the American Federation of Labor were awakened by Wright and a United States immigration officer who stood guard at the door all night.

Local labor leaders were notified of their chief's condition at that time also and a number of men and women began crowding the corridors near the room, on the third floor at the St. Anthony.

Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor, went into his chief's room at 2:30 o'clock but would make no statement at that

Between 3:45 and 4 o'clock Gompers grasped the hand of one of his ssociates, asking for his wife in a faint voice.

"Please send for my wife, I know

I am dying," he begged.

It was within ten minutes after he spoke these words that he died, according to Wright.

After Gompers' death was announced purposeful looking men with iron-gray hair, in wrinkled business suits, stood in front of his door and cried

These men-leaders in the labor world-every one of them, spoke hardly a word.

They were too moved by the death of their chief to talk.

women in kimonas-mem bers of the American Federation of Labor secretariat staff-wept silently.

Their leader was dead. At 4:45 o'clock members of the executive staff of the American Federation of Labor met in Secretary Morrison's room for a conference and Wright announced that an offcial statement would be made, lowing the conference. He didn't know, however, how long the executive session would last, he said.

Gompers made no rational stateregarding the future of the American Federation of Labor before his death, however, according to

"That he did not make any statement regarding his wishes in relation to the federation is simply my personal opinion," said Wright, in explaining that he had heard nothing

One of the first persons to be notified of Gompers' death—even before news service flashes were sent—was President Calles of Mexico.

The first woman, except women members of the party, to be notified of the death, was Mrs. Chester I. Wright of Washington. Wright wired her immeriately after he an-

Mrs. Gompers was also notified immediately and fifteen minutes later

by the grim-faced men and weeping women who thronged the hallway on the third floor of the St. Authony. At 2:30 he uttered his last words. "Nurse, this is the end," he said.

"God bless our American institutions. May they grow better day by day."
From that time until the end Mr. Gompers was unconscious. breathing was heavy until just a few moments before the end. As death approached his face became calm and he sank peacefully and quietly

Seattle, Wash.-Alaska has been cut off from the outside world by sable because of a break in the Seattle-Sitka line and the Seattle-Ketchi-Kan cable, twenty-five miles porth of here. Breaks in the cable between Ketchi-Kan and Wrangell and Petersburg and Wrangell also were reported. Messages are being forwarded to the Puget Sound naval station at Bremerton, where they are sent by naval radio.

#### PRAIRIE DOG NOTICE

It is unlawful for any land owner or lessee of land in Callahan County to allow Prairie Dogs to run at large on same. It is his duty to have had them exterminated before this. On account of numerons complaints reaching this office relative to Prairie Dogs, it is suggested that trapping and fumigation is too slow and too expensive a method of extermination, and a poison formula is given herewith which is recommended by the United States Department of Agriculture, which if followed out systematically need not exceed in price four or five cents per acre.

Mix thoroughly one ounce of powdered strychine and one ounce of common baking soda. Dissolve one heaping spoonful of dry laundry starch in a little cold water and add it to three-fourths of a pint of boiling water. Boil and stir till a thin, clear paste is formed. Slowly sift the mixture of strychnine and soda into the starch paste, stirring constantly to form a smooth, creamy mass. Add one fourth pint of heavy corn syrup and one tablespoon of glycerine and stir. Add one-tenth ounce of saccharine and again stir thoroughly. Pour this mixture, while still hot, over thirteen quarts of clean oats and mix until all the grain is coated. Mix thoroughly one ounce of grain is coated.

For mixing use metal wash tub, if convenient, and stir with a hoe or spade. Each quart of the prepared poison is sufficient to treat about fifty holes. Scatter the grain on clean, hard ground, near the burrows, never on loose soil or in the holes. With reasonable care, cattle, sheep and other live stock on the range will not be endangered. endangered.

In this climate, where the animais do not hibernate, winter poisoning is recommended and, is effective, on account of the scarcity of green food obtainable for the dogs.
