GOVERNMENT AND THE PUBLIC HEALTH

It may be that some of the supporters of compulsory government medical care, whose logical end can only be completely socialized medicine, feel that government has always been involved to some extent in public health problems and might as well go farther.

The fact is that government health work in the past has been conducted in fields where its responsibility is clear-cut and undeniable. The Public Health service is the established example—its purpose is to prevent disease and to aid local government in disease control. Care for veterans, carried on by the Veteran's Administration, is an inevitable consequence of war, but veterans, are not compelled to accept it. Men whose health was injured in their country's services are obviously entitled to all the aid the government can provide. And is being carried on at the local, home-town level, instead of putting everything into the remote hands of Washington bureaucrats.

Again, an excellent case can be made for government medical assistance to the needy—to the people who simply can't pay for medical service. There is little opposition to this, and it falls naturally into the social responsibilities any government must accept.

But government must not undermine and possibly destroy the system of private medicine that has been so signally successful. There is no valid case for compulsory medical insurance which would force people to pay for it whether the service was desired or not. Here is where the line must be drawn and that will be the responsibility of Congress when the various proposed health bills come up for consideration.

TOWARD PRICE STABILITY

It would be a daring man indeed who would state categorically that the peak of the price rise has been reached—or that prices in general are due for an immediate and substantial downturn. But the all-out inflation that some forecast when OPA vanished into the shadows has certainly not occurred—and in some very important fields, including foods, a degree of price stability has been reached.

The good sense of most consumers is in part responsible for this—more and more of them have turned away from articles which they considered excessively priced. An increase in the supply of goods has also helped. And, finally, the attitude of retail distribution toward consumer problems has been of immeasurable value.

The typical retailer works on the principal that a main duty is to protect consumer purchasing power so far as he can—and sell honest merchandise at a fair price. This is true of chains and independents variety stores and department stores. Long before OPA retailers voluntarily held prices down when there was no law to prevent them from profiteering to their hearts' content. All during the war, retailers opposed hoarding and other inflationary influences. And since the war ended, they have led in efforts to keep prices from running wild.

We are beginning to see the success of these efforts now, as more and better goods flow into the stores. No one knows what the "normal price structure" of the future will be, or what relation it

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WHAT IS "FIREPROOF?"

The public has a dangerously wrong concept of what the word "fireproof," as applied to hotels and public buildings, means. That was the gist of expert comment made at the recent National Conference on Hotel Safety in Philadelphia.

A good many people seem to think that "fireproof" means a structure whose interior and exterior are immune to really serious damage by fire. But as a national Fire Protection Association member pointed out, "a fireproof building by definition is one where the structure will remain intact after a burnout of its contents." Under this definition, a stove or a furnace is a perfect example of fireproof construction. The contents may be destroyed, but the basic structure remains intact.

The public's interest lies in a type of construction which, whether it is called "fireproof" or not, will give maximum protection to occupants against death and injury by fire. And here is where building codes have lagged woefully behind. A recent issue of Life illustrates safe versus unsafe construction, with some vivid drawings. In the safe hotel or similar building, compartments and fire walls limit the area where fire can travel. A blaze might shoot up an air shaft but it would then quickly burn out for lack of fuel. In the unsafe structure, on the other hand, fire roars along natural flues made by open stair wells and elevator shafts. Open doors and transoms permit it to enter rooms unchecked. And death by burning, gas, and suffocation follows.

The National Board of Fire Underwriters, 85 John Street, New York City, offers to communities a model building code which designed to give the maximum possible protection to existing public buildings, should become the law in every city and town in the nation.

RUNNELS COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION

"Let no muddy water leave Runnels County."

That's the slogan of the soil conservation program in Runnels County, and County Agent J. A. Barton reports that 1946 came closer to seeing the slogan fulfilled than any previous year.

With sufficient crews and an ideal weather year, terraces were built on approximately 31,000 acres of Runnels County land during 1946, the county agent says.

"It is about as unusual now to see a Runnels County farm with rows running up and down hill, as it was some 20 years ago to see a terraced farm," says Barton.

Records kept in the County Extension office show that there are now around 145,000 acres on which "some kind of terraces" are doing the job of holding water and soil says the county agent.

In addition to running terraces lines himself, Barton says his office has four levels which stay loaned out most of the year to farmers who do their own terracing and contouring. This year a total of 108 farmers used the levels from the Extension office.

Along with terracing, Runnels county farmers applied 110,000 pounds of superphosphate to their farms and planted 20,000 pounds of hairy vetch during the small grain planting season.

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Washington News Letter

Washington—The House of Representatives this week by a vote of 285 to 121 passed a Resolution to submit to the people a constitutional amendment which would limit a President to not more than two terms in office. This question was seriously debated in the Constitutional Convention. The question of limiting Presidential tenure has been debated ever since. At one time the founding fathers wrote into the constitution a provision for one term of seven years, later changing it to provide four year terms with no limitation on re-election.

and myself filed a minority report in the House contending that if Presidential tenure should be limited, it should be limited to one term of six years. Presidents Andrew Jackson, Rutherford B. Hayes, Grover Cleveland, and William Howard Taft advocated a single term of six years for American Presidents. Such a limitation was written into the Democratic platform in 1912. Through the years more than 100 attempts have been made in Congress to impose such limitation.

Proponents of a limited tenure for Presidents contend that the Executive has grown too powerful, that our system of checks and balances between the Executive, Legislative, and Judicial branches has gotten seriously out of balance, and that any President with the power now given our chief executive can perpetuate himself in office. By limiting his tenure they say we would limit his power. It is further contended that doubtless more Presidents in the future, instead of following the precedent set by Washington and Jefferson and others in retiring at the end of their second term, will be trying to outdo the mark of four terms set by the late Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Opponents contend, however, that, after all, it is a matter to be left up to the people, that in times of emergency the people should have a right to reelect a President regardless of the number of terms he may have served.

If the resolution is now passed by the Senate, the people themselves will have the opportunity to pass on this subject.

The House Committee on Un-American Activities this week witnessed an unusual spectacle—a sister testifying against her brother. Ruth Fischer of New York told the Committee her brother, Gerhard Eisler, was a "most dangerous terrorist both for the people of America and the people of Germany." Apparently Eisler has been one of the leading fomenters of communism in this country. The

record indicates that he received extensive training for this purpose in a communist school in Moscow.

Eighty-two year old bachelor Senator Arthur Capper of Kansas is receiving some notice over his proposed bills to create uniform marriage and divorce laws throughout the United States and also to outlaw the advertising of intoxicating liquors. I remember getting Capper's farm paper when I was a small boy on the farm. The old gentleman has been in public life for almost a half century, serving as Governor of Kansas before his election to the Senate in 1918. The Senator will probably not get very far with either of his proposals although a great deal can be said for both of them. No states in the Union have identical marriage or divorce laws, and some contend that it is a case of the chain being no stronger than its weakest link. The State of South Carolina will not grant a divorce on any grounds or permit the remarriage of divorced persons, while the State of New York still operates under a law written by Alexander Hamilton before the American Revolution granting a divorce solely on the ground of adultery. The Senator, coming from perhaps the most notoriously dry state of the American union, contends that if you cannot prohibit the liquor traffic you should not encourage it through advertising. Perhaps on both his proposals the argument could be made that society should make greater endeavor to create moral as opposed to immoral atmosphere.

Reference was made in this

newsletter some weeks ago to the chaos into which the Socialist-Labor Government had thrown that country through the government's taking over the ownership and operation of the coal mines. Some of the chickens are now coming home to roost. Many of the industries of England are now closing down because of a lack of coal. While our country appears to be booming for the present at least—the British are suffering more than at the end of the war and seem to be on the verge of economic collapse. Perhaps they will learn that you cannot get something for nothing and that honest toil is the chief creator of wealth.

PLANT GARDEN FOR HEALTH AND ECONOMY

Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox
M. D., State Health Officer
of Texas

Austin—During the past few weeks there has been a general increase in the incidence of mumps throughout the State. There have been 1750 cases reported since January 1, compared with only 896 cases during the same period last year, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

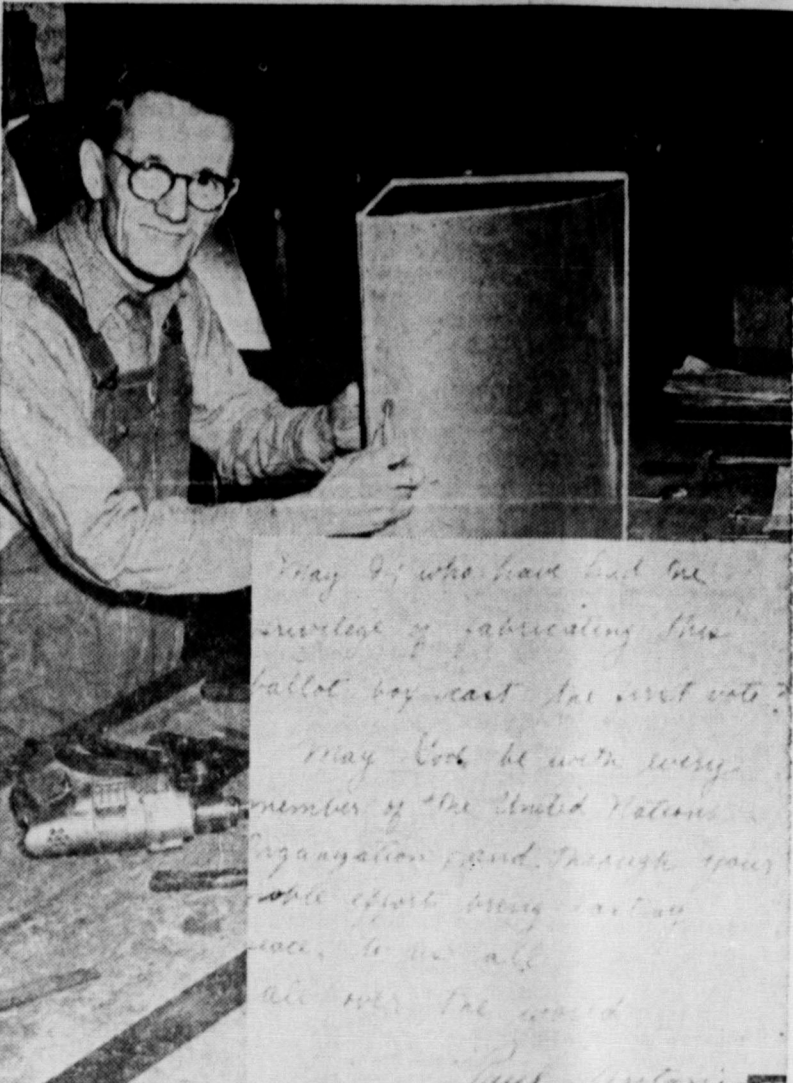
Though mumps is one of the common childhood diseases, serious complications may develop, so children should be protected as much as possible from the disease. The usual control procedures such as avoidance of crowds, exclusion from school of all cases or suspected cases and quarantine should be followed. The family physician should be consulted when a case occurs.

The most easily recognizable characteristic symptom of mumps is a painful swelling of the salivary glands. Sometimes there is an involvement of other portions of the body causing disturbances in the digestive nervous, circulatory, and genito-urinary systems. The disease is usually accompanied by a temperature rise which more often than not is mild.

"The patient suffering with this disease should be isolated from other members of the family immediately upon the suspicion that mumps exists, and the family physician should be called promptly," Dr. Cox advises. "In the meantime, complete rest in bed is indicated. The doctor's orders should be followed strictly. Violating instructions can lead to serious injury, which may permanently affect the individual's health."

NEW YORK — When Paul Antonio, tinsmith, slipped "the first vote" into the UNO ballot box which he had just made, it was a plea that echoed prayers of religious people everywhere.

Thousands of churches, regarding civic responsibility as a stewardship, are encouraging prayerful study of the United Nations program. The Methodist lay-activities leaders, as one part of the denomination's Crusade for Christ, are making this a mid-winter emphasis.

Warning Made Against Heavy Cotton Crop

Austin—Warning cotton growers to plan 1947 operations with care, Dr. A. B. Cox, professor of cotton marketing at the University of Texas says that possible declining prices anticipated in 1947 could be the pitfall of cotton growers.

In the current Texas Business Review, published by the Bureau of Business Research, Dr. Cox writes, "The consensus is that the year 1947 will be one of declining prices both in terms of what farmers buy as well as what they sell. These declines will not be universal, they will not be uniform and they will not occur at the same time."

He estimated the carryover of cotton in the United States in August 1 will be about 3,200,000 bales, the lowest since August 1929. On August 1, 1946, the carryover was 7,522,000 bales.

Demand for cotton goods is still strong in the United States as well as throughout the world, Dr. Cox said, and there probably will be a high rate of consumption in the next 12 months.

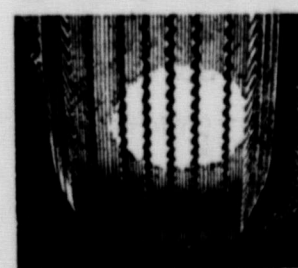

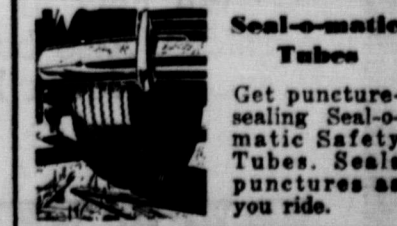

Fort Worth—D. D. Clough of Munday has entered one Aberdeen-Angus in the breeding classes of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show livestock division, Edgar Deen, general manager, announced today.

Gilmer Bill Is Aimed At Curbing Strike Violence

Among the many bills dropped in the legislative hopper at Austin seeking to cure the evils inherent in strikes is one relating to strikes by utility employees introduced by the Honorable Claud Gilmer of Rock Springs, Speaker of the House of Representatives during the last regular session.

Mr. Gilmer's bill applies only to water, gas, and electric utilities and proceeds on the theory that the maintenance of water, gas and electric services are absolutely essential to the life, health and safety of the people, and that it is the duty of the state to prevent any person or group of persons from wilfully destroying or damaging the facilities used in rendering the service.

His bill further provides that although any employee or group of employees have the right to strike or quit work at will, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, whether employees or not, to interfere with the ingress or egress of any employees to or from any property of any utility by picketing, or to harass or intimidate any employees who are willing to work in order that the service may be maintained.

Under the terms of the Gilmer bill, it is a felony punishable by a penitentiary sentence for any person to wilfully wreck, destroy, or sabotage any plant, equipment or facility of a water, gas, or electric utility.

Mr. Gilmer's bill applies to utilities furnishing water, gas and electric service whether the utility be a private corporation, a municipality or a state agency, such as a River Authority.

This is to take care of such situations as happened to the L. C. K. A. this past year when service to a good many towns there was interrupted and also such situations as the Pittsburgh power strike.

FIXING UP the HOME

By Diane Greeter

How Much Water for What Task? WHEN considering a new water heater, know your household hot water needs exactly. This knowledge is of great value to those of us who are planning to install an automatic hot water system in a new home.

Here is a chart I discovered the other day. It may help you to figure out your own requirements and decide what capacity heater is adapted to your needs. The amount of 140 degree water needed for each household operation is shown:



Most of the items listed must be multiplied by the number in your family to give you an idea of the amount of hot water you use each day. And it is wise to remember that many of these activities are carried on simultaneously.

Fortunately the automatic gas water heater, which may be fueled with liquefied petroleum gas in areas beyond the pipelines, heats water so quickly that a 65 gallon heater will do more than the work of an 85 gallon heater operating with less modern fuels.

Too, it is well to remember that heaters which are part of a central heating system are not as economical as they seem at first sight. Not only do they demand additional fuel, a fact which many overlook, but because they frequently heat water to uselessly high temperatures they promote the formation of scale which ultimately may clog coiled tubing and storage tanks.
