

Details of the recently announced International to save users of our products approximately \$20,000,000 a year have now been worked out.

We have reduced prices on 163 models. These cover 12 basic models of farm tractors, 123 basic models of farm machines, 16 basic models of industrial tractors and engines, and 12 models of motor trucks, as well as certain motor truck attachments. 

Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

Austin- By proclamation of President Harry S. Truman, the month of April is Cancer Control Month throughout the nation. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, is asking each citizen to consider the danger signals and secure medical advice at the first appearance of any suspicious symptom. There are many causes of cancer; the most common form of which is chronic or prolonged irritation.

One of the questions often asked is whether or not cancer is hereditary in human beings. Tendencies to form cancer may possibly be inherited; however, since the method of inheriting such tendencies is obscure, the presence of cancer in one or both parents should be merely a cause of greater alertness in looking for and recognizing suspicious symptoms on the part of family members. There is no need of a fatalistic attitude. The fact concerning heredity do not justify them.

At the first warning signs recognized, consult your physician. The early symptoms are any sore that does not heal, particularly about the tongue, mouth, or lips; a painless lump or thickening, especially in the breast, lip, or tongue; irregular bleeding or discharge from any natural body opening; pro gressive change in the size or color of a wart, mole, or birthmark; per sistent hoarseness or difficulty in swallowing; and any change in nor mal bowel habits. See your doctor abou any of these signals.

LEEMULSION

And its use

Chicks are easy subjects to Breathing Troubles: Bronchitis, Chilling and Pneumonia, being the most common. These usually appear between hatching time and four weeks of age.

BRONCHITIS: the most common is caused by a specific virus, and is very contagious.

CHILLING: Results from too sudden or too great a change in temperature from that which is normal for chicks. Too much heat will cause as much trouble as not enough heat.

PNEUMONIA: A general name where the lungs are effected. It is sometimes caused by Pullorum infection, sometimes by molds, sometimes by other germs. What to do under these conditions:

Chemists and household equipment specialists of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, recommend keeping your sink drain in good condition by pouring boiling water down it every few months. This softens and carries away clogged grease. Whenever your drain begins to clog, use boiling water at once, and pump out the pipe with a plumber's friend.

Before using the drain cleaners on the market, you should understand the action of the lye in these preparations. Soda lye combines with grease to form hard soap, potash lye forms soft soap, the soda lye forms so much hard soap that it will close the pipe entirely and cause more difficulty than the grease. A drain cleaner made with potash lye is better, because the soap it forms when it hits the grease is soft and can be flushed down the pipes more easily.



Plant Bed Tips

Garden plants like tomatoes abbage, pepper, lettuce, and eggplants can be started in plant beds six to eight weeks before time to plant them in the garden.

Lettuce and cabbage plants can be moved directly from the plant bed to the garden when they are two or three inches high but tomatoes, eggplants, and pepper need to be thinned and hardened before transplanting into the gar den. The plants left in the plant bed should be thinned to a space ing of two to three inches apar and those thinned out moved into another box to grow three or fou weeks more until they are sturdy enough to set out in the garden. Transplanting the vegetables into small paper cups or similar containers given the gardener the advantage of a good mold of soil around the roots. These added weeks of protected growth will make the plants grow off more quickly and set fruit eariler than when small plants or seed are used.




