This help, which is not enough to cover all the chapter's outstanding bills nevertheless points up the fact that the March of Dimes, while facing a financial crisis itself, is doing the best it can to help pay pa-tient aid bills," said Mrs. Verna Burleson, Chairman of the Callahan County Chapter. "This emergency aid comes at a time when the National Foundation counts upon funds raised in the current Emergency March of Dimes to redeem fully its pledge to all polio patients.'

The money will be used to help pay for treatment already provided to polio patients here this

Mrs. Burleson explained that were exhausted because of the high patient aid load coming together with expenditure of \$261/2 million to douole the supply of gamma globulin and to finance the field test and evaluation of the new polio vaccine. Despite a record sum raised in January through the March of Dimes, the amount fell \$20 million short of the year's minimum needs.

"We have in Callahan Chapter a good example of how the local unit and national headquarters work together," she said 'In the past, the National Foundation has always sent us whatever sum was needed to pull us out of the red. This year .its treasury drain-

ed, it sent us what it could." Mrs. Burleson said that patient care bills still outstanding will be paid out of the chapter's share of contributions to the emergency drive.





Reliable demand still prevails for stockers and feeders with quality. The plainer kinds were definitely weaker. Slaughter steers and yearlings were weak to 50 cents lower, with grassers and shortfeds on the big end of the lower prices.

Bulls found fully steady prices at Ft. Worth Monday. Low grade, lightweight shelly and emaciated canner cows were under severe pressure, some selling below \$4. Cows are currently selling \$1 to \$2 under prices a year ago at this time.






