H. D. Arnold Completes 27 Years As Head Of Goree Public Schools

H. D. Arnold, superintendent of Goree public schools, believes in being a stickler on the job—and the Goree school patrons think so much of him that they have kept him at the post for 27 consecutive years.

He has taught 37 straight years in the Goree immediate area, 10 of them at Bomarton.

The school he heads is a large red brick plant valued at \$85,000, including a two-story combination gymnasium and auditorium. Added to the equipment this year was a large mess hall from Camp Berkeley where 200 pupils daily are fed at 20 cents a meal. Mrs. W. R. Couch is supervisor.

Goree schools have 348 scholastics, a small increase over last year's figure. It has 22 credits and 75 students in high school.

For the first time, a six-man football team is being supported this year. It has won two games, once each over O'Brien and Benjamin, and had two more games slated—with Vera and Megargel.

Three buses are operated. One by J. B. Justice northward to Hefner; another by H. H. Edwards to Lake Creek, and a third to Brushy by W. H. Kelly.

The system absorbed Brushy to consolidation, one half of Hood, one half of Washburn, and contracted for pupils from Hefner and Lake Creek. The school district comprises 57 square miles.

J. C. Carver is principal. Other instructors are Mrs. W. M. Taylor, English; Mrs. Frances Akins, home economics; W. A. Akins, history; Mrs. H. L. Moore principal of grade schools; Mrs. Jerry Rogers, Mrs. Gable Sue McCaleb, Mrs. Vera Carver, Mrs. Alta Burton, Mrs. Ava Thibaud, grade teacher; and Mrs. H. D. Arnold, primary.

PLOW STALKS UNDER AND STARVE WEEVIL

Memphis, Tenn.—Reduce next year's boll weevil damage now by plowing under cotton stalks, the National Cotton Council today recommended to producers in areas where the harvest is just being completed.

If stalks are plowed under, the weevil will be deprived of a source of food and shelter and will enter hibernation in a weakened state, the Council said. Previous experience has proved that when stalks are plowed under as early as possible, the weevil infestation the following spring is greatly reduced.

The Council is conducting the "starve the boll weevil" campaign

in cooperation with federal and state Extension workers and with experiment station entomologists.

Between the early '20's and early '40's farmers increased production per acre of cropland 23 per cent; production per animal unit of breeding livestock 30 per cent and output per worked 64 percent.

The timber cut from the national forests in the quarter ending September 30 totaled 1,127 million

board feet, the largest cut from national forests ever registered in any one quarter.

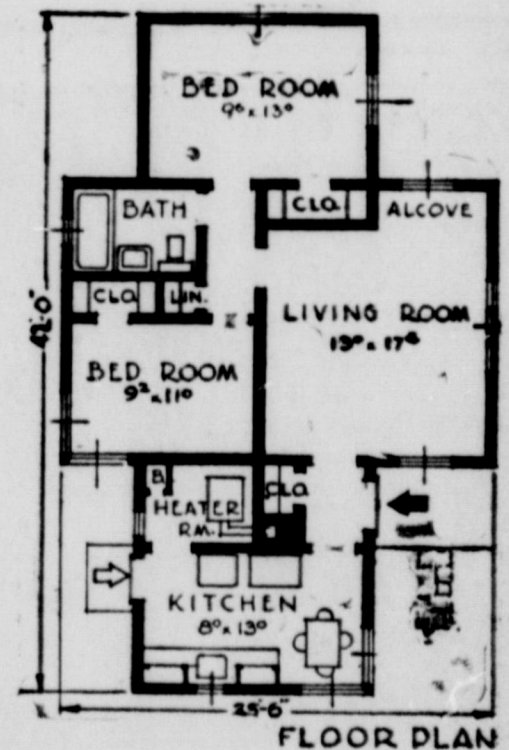

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox
M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

Austin—It is the duty of every citizen, young and old, to help in preventing the spread of disease. Every man, woman and child in Texas has a personal obligation to keep as well as possible, and to protect others from illness. Even the kindergarten age child can be taught to cover a cough or sneeze, to help in preventing the spread of colds or other infectious diseases that start with the symptoms of a cold.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, emphasizes the fact that the local health officer can do little to break the chain of communicable disease in the community if he does not have the whole-hearted support of the people. Every case of illness that looks suspicious of being a communicable disease should be promptly reported to the health officer. Physicians report to the county health officer the cases of communicable disease they diagnose as such, but parents often fail in

Land Bank Has Greater Volume Since 1935

A greater volume of Land Bank loans was closed in Texas during 1946 than in any year since 1935, according to Mr. Jake Hall of Seymour, president of the Baylor-Knox National Farm Loan Association, and Secretary Treasurer L. B. Donehoo who attended a conference of NFLA leaders held in Lubbock last week.

"This increase in loans indicates a desire of landowners to put their financing on a long-term basis and tie down today's low interest rates," Mr. Donehoo said.

At the meeting in Lubbock, reports showed that the Land Bank has practically completed its program of decentralizing loan servicing functions begun 5 years ago. The result is that today most of the business farmers and ranchers have with the Land Bank can be transacted with their own home association. Operations of the local associations and plans for the annual stockholders' meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Houston in February were discussed.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston is completely owned by Texas farmers and ranchers through the 143 local national farm loan associations, Mr. Donehoo said. The Land Bank, with no government funds of any kind invested in it, now has combined capital, surplus, and reserves amounting to more than \$43,000,000. This is in addition to approximately \$6,000,000 in reserve and surplus of the associations in their own local accounts.

The National Board of Directors of Allied Independent Theatre Owners of America scored the film companies for forcing the local theatre men of the nation to raise their admission prices if they play certain so-called special pictures. The Board meeting in Detroit, Michigan passed a strong
