Election of Agricultural Conservation community committeemen and delegates to the county convention for the election of a county committee will be held in Knox County during the next few weeks, Emmett Partridge, chairman of the county Agricultural committee, announces.

Any person who is participating in the 1947 Agricultral Conservation Program, Sugar Program, or who had a contract with the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. is eligible to vote. This includes owners, operators, tenants or sharecroppers. Lists of eligible voters are being prepared and will be used to check votes cast in the election.

Delegates to the county convention, elected in the community election, will meet with delegates from other communities in the county and elect a county committee.

"This grass roots administration of the farm program is one of the cornerstones of the program," says Mr. Partridge. "It can be made stronger if every eligible farmer will vote in the coming elections and take an interest otherwise in developing the program. # Many Chickens **Are Headed For Food Lockers**

College Station-With the emphasis on better management of the poultry flock to save money and grain, there will be a lot of roosters and poor layers lined up for the freezer locker this year. Roy Snyder, extension poultry marketing specialist for Texas A. and M. College, says that home preparation of poultry for the freezer locker is comparatively easy. The main thing to remember is that no time should be lost between killing and ireezing.

It is very important that the birds be well-bled. The tempera ture of the scalding water should be 128 deg. F. Pierce the brain, just as 'though the bird was going to be dry-picked. The feathers will pull a little easier and the skin will be in better condition for storage.

Tie the wings and legs down on birds for roasting or baking, to make a more compact package. If the bird is to be stewed or fried, cut it ready for the pan. It is more easily done before packaging than after freezing,

Snyder says that good packaging of poultry for the locker is essential. Many users have found that sealed cellophane bags of tight cartons are the best ways to preserve quality.


If the temperature of the freezer is maintained at zero deg. F., well-packaged poultry can be kept six to 12 months.

Yes, A service-connected blind veteran is entitled to receive, at Government expense, a guide dog and various devices necessary to assist him overcome his handi-

Q. Does a veteran have to have a 10 per cent or more service-connected disability to be eligible for out-patient treatment?

A. Any veteran with an estabished service-connected disability is entitled to out-patient treatment for the service connected disability, regardless of the degree of

disability Q. If I go to a private physician to determine whether I need hospital treatment or domiciliary care, will the government pay for cost of the examination ? A. The Government will pay he cost of examinations by a private physician only if Veterans Administration has given the physician prior authority for such examination. Q. Please tell me what veterans are eligible to have prescriptions filled at Government expense? A. If the veteran's physician has been authorized by Veterans Administration to treat the veteran, VA will pay cost of the prescription if it is used in treatment of the veteran's service-connected

# **Pasture** Needs **Rest For Making Good Grazing**

It pays to rest one pasture a year and allow it to go to seed. So says J. D. Smith, manager of the Big 4 ranch. Smith has rested at least one pasture the past two years, and finds it good management to be able to turn his cows in this pasture when all of his other pastures are grazed down. "I wouldn't have had any place to put them," said Smith, "and at the same time I am improving my grass by resting it during the growing season and allowing it to seed.

Ranchers and stockmen in the Wichita Brazos Soil Conservation District are finding that adjusting livestock numbers to the long range carrying capacity of their ranges are paying off. Soil Conservation Service range technicians go over the range with each rancher and determine what kinds of grass he has, the proper grazing period, and methods of grazing for the fastest improvement. A range in fair condition is producing only on-half of what it is capable, thus ranchers are losing money by following wasteful practices. \* 14

Another major advantage of culling stressed by livestock authorities is that it will help to reduce the hazard of continued large livestock inventories. They urge the elimination, now, of many animals which have been kept in the herd in the past because of the general upward trend in prices. For these reasons, close culling recommended this fall as one of the important steps in the good management and feeding, which will help to solve the problem of scarce and high-priced grains. 

### Will Bring Good Prices And Save Grains For

Efficient Animals Removing unproductive, inefficient livestock from a herd is good business at any time, but is especially desirable and profitable under 1947 conditions. That is why close culling of livestock is strongly recommended this fall by Extension Service livestock specialists and other authorities.

Livestock producers who carefully select unprofitable animals and sell them this fall profit two ways. The cull animals sell at unusually favorable market prices, and more high-priced grain is made available for feeding the more efficient animals remaining in the herd.

Several factors are important in selecting cull animals. Colling should include crippled, diseased and poor quality animals, and unproductive breeding stock. In the breeding herd, it is desirable to cull cows that have missed calving for one or two years; they are likely to be fat and bring more money when sold. Dairy cows that produce less than the herd average are worth more when sold than when kept as "boarders" Sows which have farrowed small litters are not paying their share of the cost of feed and care. Hens that have stopped laying and are getting fat are robbing the flock of profit. As a rule, it pays to cull animals that are passing their. period of usefulness because of age, and to replace them with ounger stock. .


