





Wage Statement **Due With Returns** On Income Tax

The office of the Collector of Internal Revenue cautioned taxpayers today that income tax returns filed on either of the individual income tax forms could not be accepted unless statements of employers are attached. The FormW-2, issued by all employers to their employees, can not be used as a return this

Instead, all persons filing individual returns must use either Form 1020-A or Form 1040. Form 1040-A should be used by all persons having income from wages or salaries not in excess of \$5,000,00. It can be used as a joint return of husband and wife. All Forms W-2 received from employers, for both the husband and wife, must be at tached. The Collector's office will figure the taxes or refund due on these returns.

Forms 1040-A may be secured from employers, post offices, Collector of Internal Revenue.





Social Security Card Necessary For **Every Employee**

"Going to work on a new job without showing your social security card to the employer is as big a gamble as putting money in a bank without giving your name," says Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security office, "your wages can't be posted to your Old-Age and Survivors Insurance account, just like your money can't be credited to your account. And the chances are that your Federal insurance account is more valuable than your bank account.

"Every three months," Tate says, "your employer must report your wages to the Social Security Administration to be posted to your Old-Age and Survivors Insurance account. He must show the number of your account on the same line with your name and the amount of wages he had paid you. The number on your social security card is the number of your insurance account. If you don't show your card to your employer, he can't have your account number on his report. And you can't get credit for your wages.

"You want to be certain that all of your wages are posted to your account," Tate said, "because the retirement or supervis- Rebus Mayfield ors benefits that you and your family will collect is a percentage of the wages that have been entered into your account. The way to assure that all of your wages will be posted is to show your social security card to each emyour name on his payroll."



Don Jones has found that mechanical harvesting of cotton serves two important purposes on the South Plains. First, it cuts the cost of producing the crop. "This station recognized early the importance of mechanical harvesting to this area," says Jones. 'Our harvesting costs me about 50 per cent of the total production costs." Moreover, it speeds up the harvest. This avoids the heavy loss in grade that occurs when cotton remains in fields.

In addition to his work with cotton, Don Jones has had a part in the breeding of combine varities, which has led to the amazing development of grain, sorghums as a commercial grain crop. He has also been ready with information about irrigation of cotton and grain sorghums and other crops as irrigation wells began to spring up all over the South Plains shallow water

It seems to us that, perhaps, this one characteristic-foresight is most responsible for Don Jones' valuable contribution to Texas agriculture. He has been able to look ahead with remarkable clarity and plot the trends of South Plains agriculture. He has then directed the work of his station in such a way as to be ready with vital research information when farmers needed it. He has kept up with-in fact, been out in front of-the rapidly changing Plains agriculture.

Don was born in Wisconsin in 1892. He had 35 years academic training at the University of Wisconsin. His first job in Texas was on the Lubbock Station from 1917 to 1923 as scientific assistant. From Lubbock, Jones went to Chillicothe, where he was superintendent of Substation No. 12 from 1923 to 1925. Since 1925, he has been superintendent of Lubbock station.



High Speed Roll-Over Tests Car Body







The accompanying photographs show the culmination of a gruelling series of tests conducted by Fisher Body engineers on a new ear body before it is placed in production.

The ear was rolled over at 50 miles an hour on a special course at the General Motors Proving Ground. Towed by another car. the test model automatically unhitched itself as it went up and air 45 feet before hitting over a ramp, hurtling through the ground.









In this test, the car rolled completely over and was driven off under its own power. Not a single pane of the safety plate glass was cracked. The test was made purely as an experiment to see how the new body by Fisher withstood the shock of being turned over at high speed.

Fisher Body engineers made high speed movies of the entire sequence to study in detail how the body resisted the shock.
