Going to church in them days was a real undertaking, a real task, but we didn't know it.

Most everybody else had the same means of transportation—a team of mules and a farm wagon—and as long as no one had a better way, ours was just as up-to-snuff as the next fellows.

We had to gin around considerable on Sunday mornings to get the chorus all done, everybody got ready, load into the old wagon and travel those five or six miles to the country church.

But nothing else ever entered our mind. Pop never entertained the idea of not going to church on Sunday, and when Pop went we all went. So did nearly everybody else in the community.

Pop and the oldest boy would occupy the spring seat and do the driving. Mom usually placed a cane-bottomed chair near the center of the wagon and held the baby on her lap. We kids would ride a board laid across the wagon frame, or would stand up, if permitted to do so.

When church services were over, quite a bit of visiting was done before we started the homeward journey. We'd visit in the church, outside the church, and then follow some of the neighbors plumb out to their wagon.

It wasn't like Rev. Yeats said about people of the Munday Methodist church last spring. "You people," he says, "can get out of that one door faster than any group of people I've ever seen. Hang around, shake hands and visit a while."

Well, we visited in them days. Shucks, we hadn't seen anyone all week and were ready for a little visiting. Pop was always a good visitor, anyway.

But since it was all over, the homeward journey was rather uneventful, unless we kids drummed up something to add to the amusement, which we usually did.

One particular trip home, we remember, one of the boys spied a bottle laying beside the road. He quick scooped out the rear end of the wagon, retrieved the bottle and then resumed his position in the wagon, and with his bottle.

Directly he took careful aim at a fence post we were passing. Mom saw what he was going to do and issued a grim warning, but she was too late!

He let go with the bottle, and much to his surprise, hit the post a center blow. In fact, it took everybody by surprise, even those who were watching, because we didn't believe he'd ever hit the post.

There was a resounding crash as the bottle was broken into smithereens. The noise scared the team of mules. They gave a big lunge, and started to run.

The force of the forward movement threw the bottle thrower out of the wagon. He went out backwards over the end gate and landed on his head in the middle of the road!

Mom's cane bottomed chair went over backwards, and she found herself flat on her back in the middle of the wagon. The kids were piled up, here, there and yonder. The only ones who didn't lose their positions were the occupants of the spring seat.

Pop brought the team to a stop, saw that everyone was present, checked us all for hurts, bruises, etc., gave us a lecture about how to conduct ourselves while riding in a wagon, and we resumed our journey homeward.

Yes, we had our excitement in them days, and don't ever think the horse and buggy days were without excitement!

Going into Memphis to night services one time, our team got scared at a large street light

HERE TO STAY

The number of small businesses in the country today per thousand of population is as large as at any time in our history. The authority for this is A. D. H. Kaplan, an economist who has written a report called "Small Business: Its Place and Problems."

What gives a report of this kind unusual interest is the fact that some years ago there was a widespread fear that small business was doomed because of an inability to compete with large business. This fear made itself felt in various ways. One of them was an attempt to levy heavy, punitive class taxes against the chain retail system. It was argued that this had to be done in order to keep the independent merchant from extinction. Yet, as everyone knows, the independent has successfully competed with the chains, and does the largest part by far of all the retail trade in the country.

In his report, Mr. Kaplan says that "the small business man will strengthen himself by learning how best to compete for, not how to restrict, markets." That is the best possible advice. To again use retailing as an example, the largest stores now in business were small stores once. Many of them were single-man or single-family operations. Their owners learned how to compete for business and how to make their stores attractive to consumers. Success followed.

Small business in the United States has always been distinguished by vitality and a progressive spirit. It is holding its own in the competitive scheme of things, and it is here to stay.

A GOOD AMENDMENT

The first step toward creation of a more efficient and independent judiciary for Texas will be made Nov. 2 by Texas voters if they approve a proposed constitutional amendment providing for judges retirement.

The amendment is one of eight to be voted on at the general election—it is last on the ballot—and will authorize the Texas Legislature to establish a judiciary system that will provide more economical and efficient administration of justice, a more independent judiciary, more competent

"A MIGHTY EFFORT"

As General Eisenhower once said, "Citizens, community and nation must join to help defeat the menace of fire . . . It is a mighty effort involving all our citizens, and covering every area of our social and economic life. Fire . . . must be controlled if the economic structure we have built is to be free from the threat of recurrent destruction."

The citizen's duty in this regard is plain. It lies in keeping his property to high standards of fire safety. That means care in the handling of cigarettes, explosive fluids, and all other flammables. It means a clean and orderly home and place of business, without dangerous accumulations of trash. It means thorough maintenance of heating systems, electric appliances, and other such equipment.

From the community standpoint, fire prevention involves a long range program. The National Board of Fire Underwriters has summed up some of the necessary projects. They include better building construction, better fire safety laws and enforcement, better fire prevention education in schools, better water systems and better fire fighting services. All of these goals can be attained by any town—and the cost will be repaid time and time again in the lives and property that will be saved from destruction.

What it all adds up to is that we can lick fire—if we have the will to do it.

judges and security for aged and infirm judges who have devoted their lives to public service.

Texas is one of only 17 states that do not provide for retirement of members of the judiciary. Thirty-one states, including Louisiana, Arkansas and New Mexico, have adopted similar plans. Retirement for Federal judges has been in effect for many years.

The proposed amendment applies to only 47 appellate judges and 132 district judges over the State.

Proponents of the amendment point out that the change will enable more qualified lawyers to seek positions of public service, and allow younger, more active men to decide the controversies of Texas citizens.

The proposed retirement system would help speed the trial of cases by providing for special assignment of retired judges to active duty when and where needed to relieve congested dockets. If this is not done, there will be a need for the establishment of additional courts, at increased cost to the taxpayer.

Newcomers to our town are puzzled when they hear talk of "The Barbecue Club." Want to know who can join, and what the purpose is.

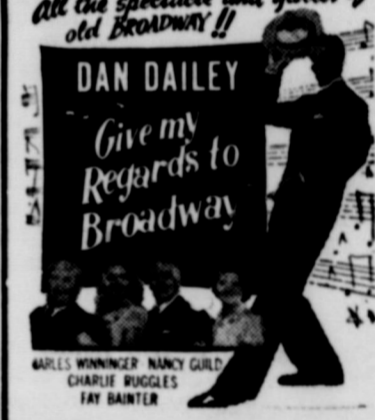

At the present time a county employee—for instance, an operator of a road maintainer—may severely injure a hand or foot and

Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

AUSTIN—The four day tumor postgraduate course just concluded in Galveston, sponsored jointly by the State Health Department and the University of Texas Medical School, is an important phase of the work being done by the Cancer Control Division of the State Health Department, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Special emphasis was placed on neoplasms of the lungs, the thyroid, and the lymphoid system. More than a hundred Texas physicians, both general practitioners and specialists attended the course, and some of the nation's best known cancer authorities participated in the program.

Dr. Arthur Purdy Stout, Professor of Surgery at Columbia University spoke on "Pathology of Tumors of the Thyroid"; Dr. Don C. Weir, Instructor in Radiology, St. Louis University, discussed "The Diagnosis, Treatment and Prognosis (Radiological) of Neoplasms of the Lymphoid System"; and Dr. Shields Warren, Director of the Division of Biology and Medicine, Atomic Energy Commission, spoke on "The Medical Aspects of Atomic Bombings".

Other leading tumor specialists who assisted in the course included Dr. C. A. Stevenson, Chief of Radiology, Scott and White Clinic; Dr. Harry Hauser, Assistant Professor of Radiology, Western Reserve University School of Medicine; Dr. John V. Good, Professor of Surgery, Southwestern Medical School, and Dr. W. E. Adams, Professor of Surgery, University of Chicago School of Medicine.

Inspect Cars Now For Winter Driving Police Chief Urges

Lax automobile owners who are negligent in the care and maintenance of their cars are the cause of many of Munday night time auto accidents, Police Chief Tuck Whitworth declared today.

"Greater safety on the road at night," he said, "is impossible until the careless fellow who thinks he can drive his car with one light on, with faulty misaligned headlights, poor tires, and brakes, wakes up to the fact that he is a menace on the road at night . . . and does something about it."

With longer nights ahead this Fall and Winter which means more night driving, it is more important than ever that motorists give their car lights regular care, Chief Whitworth said. An improperly directed headlight can blind the driver of an oncoming car in an instant and cause an accident, according to Whitworth. Tail lights and warning lights are also very necessary accident prevention devices which must be carefully maintained he said.

Chief Whitworth suggested several important precautions for driving safety at night which all motorists should observe:

1. Check the condition of tires, brakes, and other safety devices regularly.
2. Give headlights regular care. Have them tested and aimed at least twice a year. Be sure all car lights operate satisfactorily at all times.
3. Always lower lights when

meeting another car. 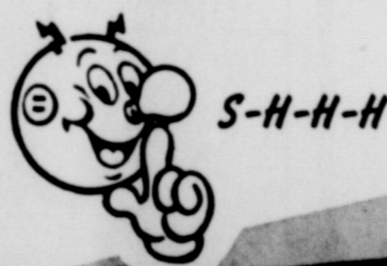

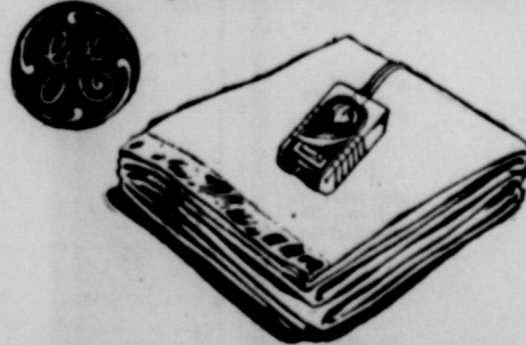

When friends drop in for tea or coffee, your own home-made bread will add a gracious touch. Make Orange Nut Tea Bread ahead of time for it slices better after 24 hours. Cream together 1/4 cup shortening, 1 cup sugar. Add 1 egg, beaten. Sift together 3 cups flour, 1/2 tsp. baking powder, 1/2 tsp. baking soda, 1 tsp. salt. Add alternately to creamed mixture with 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup orange juice. Add 1 tsp. grated orange rind, 1/2 cup chopped nut meats. Pour into greased loaf pan 10 1/2" x 5" x 3 1/2". Bake in gas oven 350° for 1 1/4 hours. If you want to keep the Tea Bread longer than a few days, add 1/2 cup dates.

Broiled potatoes turn out crisp and brown when peeled raw, sliced quarter inch thick, dipped in oil and placed on pre-heated broiler pan under medium flame. About 6 to 8 minutes on one side and 5 on the other make them just right for a quick-broiled dinner.

When the gas flame is turned down to simmer point after bringing vegetables to the boil, you save about 75 per cent in fuel.

If you are buying a new automatic gas water heater, be sure that it is adequately sized. Your utility company or dealer will tell you, for example, that some automatic appliances use more hot water than the manual types.

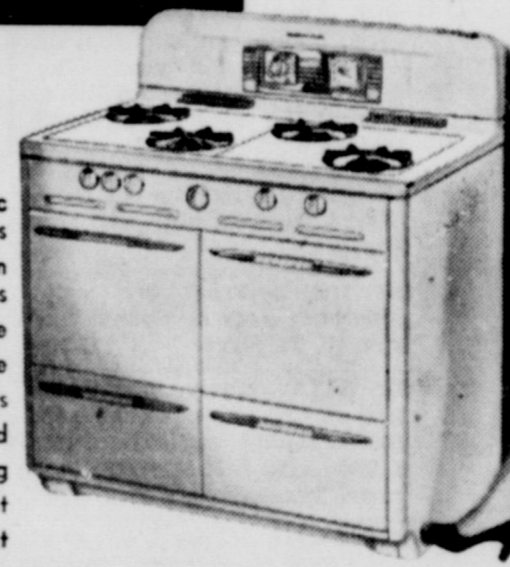

FARM NEWS

from the County Agricultural Conservation Committee

CONSUMERS BENEFIT FROM PRICE SUPPORTS

Consumers as well as farmers benefit from government price support programs, says Emmett Partridge, Chairman of the Knox County Agricultural Conservation Committee.

Price support programs encourage storage of surpluses, says Mr. Partridge. When there is more wheat or corn or potatoes than can be handled by marketing facilities, a farmer can get a loan and put the surplus in storage. The loan program before the war helped to fill the granaries so that bread rationing was not necessary during the war. Now that the granaries have been emptied for war needs and to feed famine-stricken people in war devastated countries, the loan program is helping to fill them up again for use by consumers later on.

By the end of August this year, nearly 100 million bushels of wheat had been placed in storage under loan. For consumers full granaries are the best assurance of enough to eat if lean years should come.

Price supports also help the consumer, the chairman points out, by encouraging an adequate production. When farmers are sure they will be protected against ruinous price drops, they follow their natural bent and do everything to produce abundantly, the chairman points out. "Price supports coupled with conservation measures practiced by farmers made possible the 35 to 40 percent increase in food production we've had during and since the war."

On the subject of consumer prices, he says, "Certainly prices would not have been lower if less food had been produced. Food items about which there is the greatest complaint are commodities that are not supported. There are no price supports on beef and

lamb. "Farmers must protect their crops by storing them if they are to have the benefit of price supporting loans. The loan program is an incentive for farmers to produce and to protect what they produce."

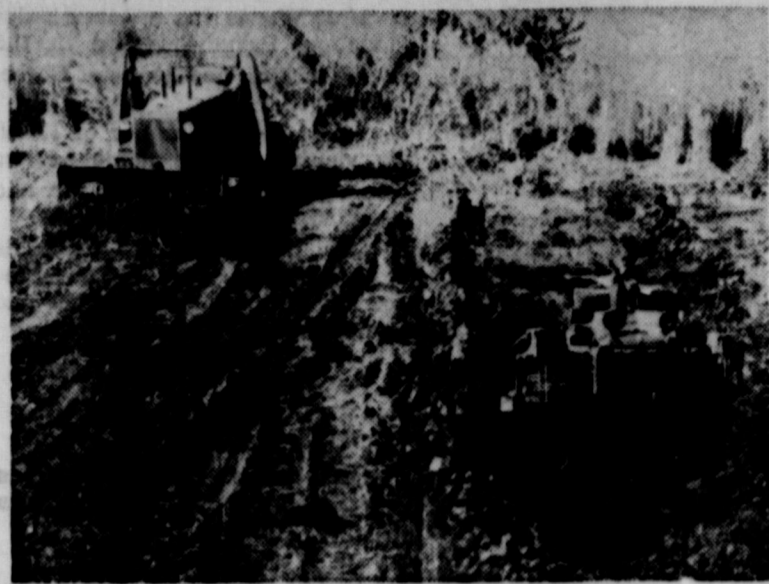
CONSERVATION WIDESPREAD

Forces that destroy the soil—erosion, depletion, and just plain wearing out—are being met by other forces that are controlling and checking them. More than 3 million farmers participated in the Agricultural Conservation Program in 1947. This means that this many farmers each carried out at least one soil or water conservation practice. The farms of these more than 3 million farmers contain about two-thirds of the Nation's farmland. These farms were improved by the conservation carried out. They produced substantially more than two-thirds of the nation's supply of food and fiber.

In making this statement, B. F. Vance, Chairman of the Texas PMA Committee, said that few people realize the work that is being done under the AC Program. The Program operates in every agricultural county in the United States. It has been in operation for 12 years. Many of the practices carried out in the first years of the program are still doing their part to conserve and protect the Nation's soil. Terraces, dams, sod covering, tree plantings and many other practices are still holding the soil.

Other practices such as the plowing under of green manure and the application of lime and phosphate, while not as apparent as dams and terraces, still are serving to protect the land in the increased growth of grasses and legumes.

The chairman states "Through their elected committees, farmers backed and supported by the Nation as a whole are organized in this fight to protect the soil and water resources of the country. Much has been done but far more remains—the battle is never-ending."



FARMERS MOVE THE EARTH

Power machinery is doing much to increase earth-moving soil and water conservation practices, says Emmett Partridge, Chairman of the Knox County Agricultural Conservation Committee. Through the use of bulldozers, carry-alls, and other big earth moving equipment, farmers are able to build dams, terraces, level land and carry out other effective conservation measures. The conservation work that would have required days of hand labor or man and team labor can be completed in a few hours.

Progress of this kind is an important factor in conservation work, since time is a real consid-

eration, says Mr. Partridge. Already we have lost more soil than we can afford to lose and it is "Later than we think."

Heavy equipment now available for dirt-moving enables farmers to build quickly the terraces needed to keep fields from washing away. Dams for the control of erosion and for livestock water are now constructed in a short time, the use of the dam is speeded up and the benefits from better distribution of livestock are quickly apparent.

Improved equipment for land-leveling is helping to make some more effective use of the limited irrigation water and checking soil losses due to improper irrigation.

Munday's Flood Diversion Plan To Get Hearing, Date Set November 8th

Knox County Commissioners court has set a meeting Nov. 8 at 10 a. m. at the courthouse in Benjamin to hear objections to Knox County Drainage District No. 1 engineer's plans for canals, drains, ditches to divert flood water from the city of Munday.

The report of Consulting Engineer Joe E. Wood, Wichita Falls, will be submitted at the session. A notice to objectors, issued by County Clerk M. T. Chamberlain, Benjamin, has been posted in numerous places in the county.

\$60,000 Project

Briefly the plan to "get Munday out of the water" contemplates a diversion ditch in an east west direction near the south city boundary and ending near the southeast Farm Road, and a ditch beginning in Earnest Avenue, just west of the Wichita Valley railroad and extending along Field Avenue and the southeast Farm Road to Lake Creek, the petition cites.

An estimate made by Wood, shows cost of the project would be about \$60,000. An annual maintenance cost would be about \$600 per annum, which would comprehend flood and repair of erosion damage.

The report shows preliminary

ies would cost \$250; purchase of land, right-of-way and easements would be \$10,000, cost of construction about \$47,000 and engineering costs of \$2,820.

If the engineering figures and plans are approved, Munday will likely call soon thereafter a municipal bond election to finance the flood-control project.

Early this year a drainage area plan was drafted and presented to the court at Benjamin, but it met with a storm of objections from farmers and landowners in an area outside the city limits which has been embraced in the original control area. City officials then withdrew application for the permit so as to confine the district within the city limits proper. Objections then were withdrawn.

Munday, which lies in a flat area much like that on the high plains of Texas, has suffered repeatedly from flood waters after heavy rainfall to the west and southwest. Water drained from field and roadways into the main part of Munday, causing high water to run into stores and shops and washing away streets and sidewalks. One or two occasions water was so high canoes were propelled up and down main

streets.

Water damage was severe in the neighborhood of gins and about the Wichita Valley railway station and yards.

Temporarily, drainage ditches to carry off some of the high water are now being reopened by the city force. Work is proceeding also in the vicinity of the WV depot and a small canal has been cut in the oil-mill and gin areas to facilitate runoff.

Paving of numerous blocks in Munday this summer helped to prevent street washing and rushing of water into business streets, according to city officials.—Abilene Reporter-News.

Veterans' News

Carl R. Gray, Jr., Administrator of Veterans Affairs, will visit Southwestern installations of the Veterans Administration next month.

It will be Gray's first official visit to Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi since he was appointed head of the VA by President Truman to succeed General Omar Bradley, now Army Chief of Staff.

Gray left the position of Vice President of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway System to come to VA. He has had an active railroad career since his

youth in Kansas.

During World War II, Gray served overseas 34 months as Director General, Military Railway Service in North Africa, Italy and Southern France. Later, he became Director General of Military Railway Service in the European Theater of Operations.

Gray, a Major General, commanded approximately 25,000 officers and men and supervised military railway traffic over a system embracing more than 46,000 miles of lines.

The first GI Bill deadline is not far away. Veterans discharged before July 25, 1947, have only until July 25, 1949, to apply for readjustment allowances for unemployment and self-employment. GI's discharged after the 1947 date have until two years after discharge.

Q. What are the deadlines that apply if I wish to take my training under the provisions of the GI Bill at a later date?

A. You may apply for training

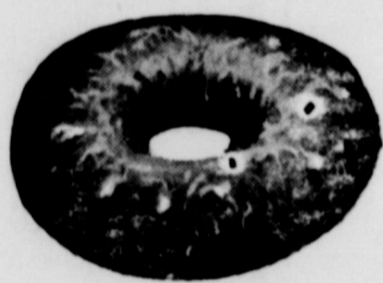

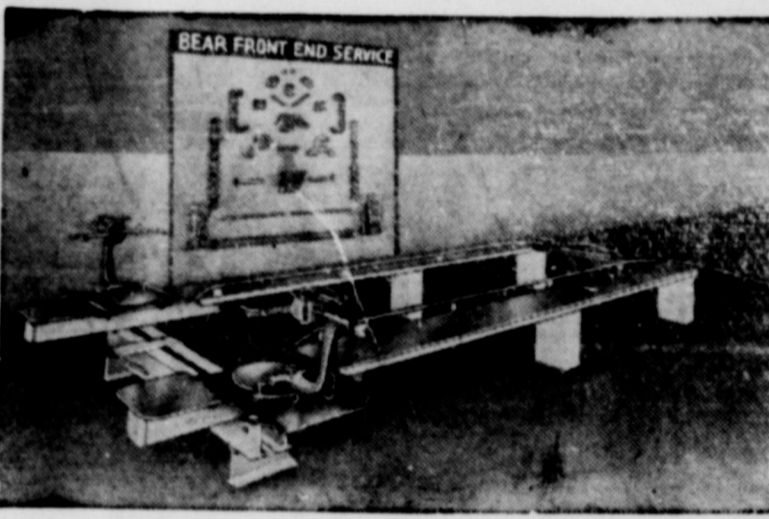
