> of the State. With the support price of cotton the farmers are assured a good price for their cotton. It behooves all available laborers in each community to rally to the support of the farmer and their community in helping to gather the cotton crop. The time has been when local schools and business houses would close early in the afternoon in order that the school children and the help in the stores as well as house wives could go to the cotton fields. It may be that such means will again have to be resorted to in order to save the present cotton

The Texas Employment Commission through its farm program is directing migratory farm crews, as the crop is harvested in the southern sections of the state, to other localities harvest progresses. In addition to these migratory crews the T. E. C. is recruiting and directing all agricultural laborers to farmers in the various localities thru

Individuals and crew leaders should contact the local Texas Employment Commission Farm Representative in their locality or the Texas Emploment Office if there is such an office in their locality, and the TEC will make every effort to refer such people to farmers that need cotton gath-

The counties of Archer, Baylor, Clay, Haskell, Knox, Montague, Throckmorton, and Wichita are handled through the Wichita Falls office. Any cotton pickers or crew leaders that are available for cotton pulling should contact the Wichita Falls

The Texas Emploment Commission has especially trained farm placement men that can be contacted at the Chamber of Commerce in Haskell and Knox City. People living in the area of these two towns should contact the Chamber of Commerce Office in either of these towns and ask for the TEC Farm Placement man.

Mr. A. W. Linden, representative of the commission, is aiding farmers in this area. His office is at the Chamber of Commerce in Haskell, but he comes to Munday several times a week. He requests farmers wanting pickers to leave their names and addresses with their ginner, giving the number of acres he has in cotton and the number of pickers wanted.

#### FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Duirng the next twenty-four hours, the chances are that fire will take 30 lives-and destroy \$2,000.000 worth of property. And that will happen during every ensuing day and night, if fire waste continues at the present rate.

That is why public officials and civic groups in some 10,000 commounties are now organizing in preparation for the 1949 Fire Prevention Week observance, which will take place from Oct, 9 to 15.

Fire Prevention Week has been an annual event since 1920, when President Wilson issued he first Presidential proclamation authorizing it. It has only one purpose-to show us the simple precautions that will prevent most fires. To achieve that goal, thousands of experts contribute freely of their knowledge, time and energy. Nothing is left undone that might serve the cause. Practically every American, unless he be a hermit in the hills, has the chance to gain knowledge that may save his life, his home, his job.

However, this fine work is of small value without public cooperation. The experts are ready to teach us, but they cannot make us learn unless we wish to. They are offering an opportunity-and it us up to us to take it.

The point is simple and plain. Listen, read, and learn during the week-and put into constant practice what you learn. If we do that, fire's horrible and unnecessary harvest of death and destruction will be sharply reduced.

#### ANOTHER CITIZEN OF BOY'S RANCH

# MISSOURI PACIFIC RAILROAD STRIKE?

Over twenty years ago, the Congress of the United States passed the Railway Labor Act. It was hailed by union leaders as a model for the settlement of labor disputes.

THE LEADERS of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, Order of Railway Conductors, and the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen on the Missouri Pacific Railroad have refused to avail themselves of the peaceful means provided by this Act for settling their disputes. They insist that they be the sole umpire of their own disputes over the meaning of contracts.

#### There is no Need for Strikes

With all of the available methods for the interpretation of contracts, there is no need for a strike or even a threat of a strike, but the leaders of these railroad unions have ignored the ordinary procedures established by law and insist upon imposing their own interpretations of their contracts by means of a strike.

The wheels have stopped rolling on the Missouri Pacific. They may stop rolling on other railroads at any time. Recently the Wabash Railroad was forced to discontinue operation for several days under similar circumstances.

What are These Strikes About?

These strikes and strike threats are not about wage rates or hours. They result from disputes over the meaning of exist-ing contracts. They cover chains for a full day's pay for less than a day's work, or for payments for services personned by others who were fully paid for the work done.

There is an established legal method for handling disputes involving existing written contracts-just as there is such a method of settling any contract dispute which you may have in your daily life.

efficiently or economically if the leaders of the unions ignore agreements or laws.

#### Provisions of the Law which are Disregarded

There are five ways under the Railway Labor Act to settle disputes over the mean-

ing of contracts: 1-Decision by National Kailroad Ad-

justment Board. 2—Decision by System Adjustment Board for the specific railroad.

3—Decision by arbitration.

4-Decision by neutral referee.

5—Decision by courts.

Cotton has made exceptionally good growth in most sections of the State this year. Right along with a heavier set of bolls there has been a rank growth of leaves.
