### NEEDLE IN THE HAYSTACK

If anyone is in doubt as to how compulsory government health insurance would work out in this country, he should examine the experience of other nations which have tried comparable schemes.

New Zealand has had socialized medicine for some years. After studying conditions there at first hand, Fred C. Clark, of the American Economic Foundation, said: "Under socialized medicine it is extremely difficult to get a doctor to leave his office to come to a patient. Since everything is free, people flock to the doctors for treatment of the most minor ailments. . . I could give you some shocking evidence of the quality of the treatments."

The Saturday Evening Post, recently published a series of three impartial and objective studies of medicine in England, where everybody—whether they want it or not—is covered by what amounts to government insurance. One of these articles said, "Prevention medicine should, of course, be a key activity of any national health service. . . But here is the doctor's dilemma, 'You don't have time to look for the needle in the haystack with patients crowding in on you this way,'" said one doctor. "It takes a lot of will power to give a patient a thorough physical examination when your waiting room is full."

The experience abroad proves that government medicine always reduces the quality of care. And it does that at an enormous cost to the people, who must pay the bill in one way or another.

### NOT BY BREAD ALONE

Each year, during the third week in October, National Bible Week is observed. The 1949 observance will run from the 17th to the 23rd.

The week is designed to again focus attention on those basic principles of Christianity which much of the civilized world is supposed to live by—and which are so widely and tragically violated. Here in the United States, to say nothing of other nations, we have little to pride ourselves upon as Christians. We have the highest rate of crime and delinquency in our history—three times as many people are incarcerated in penal institutions as are attending universities and colleges. Eleven out of 12 young people are not active

church members. Over 8,000,000 people are under treatment for mental disorders. Religions and morals are often openly ridiculed, and totalitarian principles, which are directly opposed to Christianity and all other great religious principles, which are directly opposed to Christianity and all the other great religions as well, are advocated and taught. There has never been a time when so much cheap and tawdry entertainment in books and magazines, and on the radio, stage and screen—was offered for sale, and it has a huge audience. Racial and class hatreds are rampant.

Looking at the international scene, it is clear that the failure to live up to the basic ideals of Christianity has led to misery and despair for millions, to the enslavement of once free-peoples, to a cold war which is absorbing more and more of our energies, our thoughts, our resources. The world is moving swiftly toward a cynical materialism which may destroy it unless the trend is checked.

At a time like this, National Bible Week has a vast significance. In the great old phrase, "Man cannot live by bread alone."

### ONE CIGARETTE

On a recent weekend we had new and terrible proof that a cigarette, harmless as it may appear, can be a lethal weapon.

The fire which destroyed a pleasure cruise ship at a Toronto dock, with a ghastly toll of death and injury, is believed to have started from a carelessly dropped cigarette. The following day a commercial plant burned in California, and the property loss was very heavy. Again, according to the authorities, a cigarette was the probable cause.

Does it seem incredible that so small a thing as the fire at the end of a cigarette can be responsible for major disasters? In the case of the passenger vessel, one entire section of the craft, containing staterooms, was flaming within three minutes after the fire was noticed. Within fifteen minutes the entire ship was ablaze. Under certain conditions fire travels with unbelievable rapidity. Its victims are trapped without hope of escape. The horrible hotel fires of last year and the year before provide other illustrations of this. And in the worst of those fires a cigarette also set off the holocaust.

The careless, thoughtless smoker can be as dangerous as a maniac with a bomb. He is a threat to lives, property, and irreplaceable natural resources such as forests and wildlife. Every person who smokes must be made to realize the obligation he owes to society to take care.

When the early day settlers got into fight with the Indians, they tried to kill the chief because the sight of seeing their leader fall usually shook the confidence of the redskins to such an extent that they retreated. But here's a story with a different twist:

Back in 1837, during the days of the Texas Republic, the savages made so many incursions against settlers that the Texas Congress declared war against them. Lieutenants Benthuyson and Miles, with a force of 18 mounted Rangers, encountered 150 Indians on the head waters of the Trinity on Nov. 10.

There was a fierce fight that lasted two hours. The Indian chief was killed and the redskins fell back—but in 20 minutes they returned to the battle, having meanwhile elected a new chief to lead them.

But the Texans had used this delay to good advantage; they had taken a position on a knoll among some timber. The savages were unable to drive them out and lost heavily from the rifle fire. So they set fire to the grass all around them—and this brought the Texans out but hardly with the result that the warriors had expected or wanted. The Rangers charged out of their threatened position with such determination that after a considerable of a struggle, the Indians fled, leaving 50 dead. The Ranger losses, while not heavy, were heavy enough—nine had been killed, including Lieutenant Miles and three had been wounded.

And that is the story of an Indian fight in which the chief was killed and then the redskins stopped just long enough to elect a new leader and came back for more—which they received from the Texas Rangers.

General Sam Houston not only won the battle of San Jacinto—but he financed the military campaign that was climaxed by that great victory.

lack of strict military discipline of the Texas army, Houston made a speech to the men, saying that he had been criticised for not fighting the enemy but that as soon as circumstances were advantageous, he would.

Dear editor:  
 More and more, I been readin about mechanical cotton pickeres and how the day ain't far off when most cotton except a little around the turn rows will be picked by machines, and the other afternoon while I was wandrin around out here enjoyin the October sunshine I stumble on a copy of a newspaper which I had picked up and took home with me after supper I looked it over and noticed an article by a man opposin the mechanical cotton picker on the ground it would throw a lot of people out of work.

Now this ain't the first time I've encountered such an argument of the first time I've had had something to say about it, but such a contention still floors me.

In the first place, while most farmers don't grow cotton for the benefit of cotton pickers but mainly to make a profit at it, which we won't go into whether they do or not, even if the aim of the farmer was to provide work for cotton pickers, and if a mechanical cotton picker could do the job cheaper than hand pickers, it would still be better to use the machine and pension the pickers. Of the two, pickin cotton by hand or lettin a machine do it while the pickers watched, I believe most pickers would take the latter. It's easier and more fun and they can do it in the shade.

But what riles me up is that some smart bird is always contending the farmer ought to hold back on progress just to give work to somebody, although you don't see many of the city people arguin against mechanical refrigerators so more ice men will have work or many city editors



throwin out their type-settin machines so more printers can have work.

It burns me up to have some city man tell the farmer what he ought to do in the way of goin broke so somebody else can have work to do. Personally, you wouldn't say my farm out here is a model of efficiency, but any time anybody has a idea on how I can save some labor, mine or the hired kind, he's welcome to develop it. The farmer has enough to do tryin to feed the world without furnishin it spending money too.



**Moffett Gives News Of Austin In Highlights**

There will be two elections of interest to you between now and Christmas. On November 8th, the people of Texas will vote upon ten proposed changes in our State Constitution, and will elect twenty-one members of the new State Board of Education. Early in December cotton farmers will vote upon the establishment of cotton marketing quotas for the 1950 crop, and the acreage restrictions that go with it. The first election concerns Texas Governmental and School affairs only, while the second is held throughout the fourteen (14) cotton producing states, and is required by a national law, passed by the Federal Congress. I am intermittently asked what has Texas done about the cotton situation and the correct answer is that Texas as a state government has no connection with acreage reduction, quotas, etc. The State of Texas in the past three or four years has caused some research to be done to find new uses for cotton and the expansion of old ones. Research is slow work, but it has resulted to date in the usage of about one million more bales of cotton annually than would have otherwise been used. I was the author of the bill which got this research work going in Texas and it ought to be expanded for the nylon and rayon manufacturers are constantly expanding their efforts to find new uses for these fabrics and have met with more success than is healthy for the cotton producer. If about five million additional bales of cotton could be consumed in the United States each year, there would be no need for acreage reduction.

Among the ten proposed amendments to the constitution is one which provides that women may serve on juries in Texas, as they do in thirty-seven other states. Those who support this amendment say that women receive practically the same educational training in our schools and colleges as the men, go to the same picture shows, read the same newspapers, listen to the same radios and work alongside men in most trades and occupations, and hence are as well qualified as men to serve on juries. They also can vote, just as men can. Those who oppose this amendment maintain that woman's place is in the home and not in the jury room. They also dwell on the point that every court house in Texas will have to be remodeled, as has occurred in other states, so that separate and suitable sleeping quarters will be available for women jurors, that are retained overnight, as is often done in lengthy criminal cases. It has already developed that some women are opposed to this amendment (the last one on the ballot) while a considerable number of men are for it.

The other nine amendments will be discussed in succeeding articles. It is to be hoped that

a large number of people will go to the polls. The best way to insure good government is for a high percentage of the people to take a part in it.

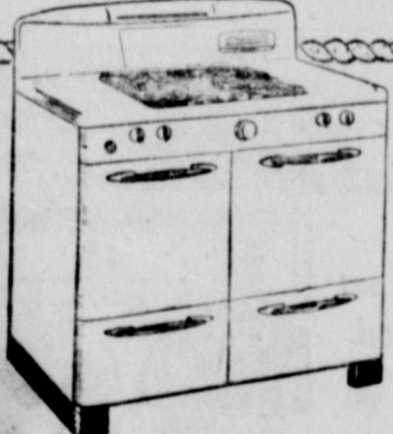

# FARM NEWS

PROGRAM  
from the County Agricultural Conservation Committee

## INVEST DIVERTED ACRES IN SECURITY

Farmers of Knox County who turn their diverted acres to a good conservation use, may well be making one of the best possible investments in security.

In voicing this opinion, Emmett Partridge, Chairman of the Knox County Agricultural Conservation Committee, pointed out that by using the land taken out of cotton and wheat for the building up of humus and fertility reserves, a farmer will be protecting the future productivity of his land, as well as protecting the price of these crops by seeding within his allotment.

Furthermore, the chairman explains, in many instances shifting some of the acreage from wheat to grass and legumes may boost the farm income. The experience of many farmers indicates that grass and legumes used as pasture and hay are often

more profitable than the cash crops which preceded them.

"Certainly, with supplies in excess of market demands and bins, cribs, and warehouses filling up, it would seem wise to adjust production by shifting the use of some land to commodities which are not in such excess," says the chairman. "And it is a real gain if in so doing the land can be built up so that it will become more productive in the future."

"With population in the United States increasing at the rate of 2 million a year, it may not be many years until the reserves we can build now may be needed to meet the needs of 170 million people instead of the 148 million people in this country now."

Mr. Partridge said the Agricultural Conservation Program for 1950 will emphasize conserva-

tion practices which may be used to build up soil reserves on the land taken out of cotton. He advises that information on financial assistance to help farmers in carrying out a number of these conservation practices is available at the County Agricultural Conservation office.

## Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox  
M. D., State Health Officer  
of Texas

AUSTIN—Lockjaw, or tetanus, is a very serious disease caused by a tiny germ that looks like a stick with a ball on one end—something like a microscopic lollipop, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. This ball is called a spore and it is the seed of the germ. Lockjaw germs are found in the soil, especially in manured soil of the barnyard or garden; in blank cartridges; etc.—in fact, just about everywhere. These germs grow best in wounds where there is considerable tissue destruction and in which chips of glass, wood splinters or grains of dirt have been embedded.

Every accident seen by the physician must be considered from the lockjaw angle; and whenever there is any question, tetanus antitoxin should be given, for it is the antitoxin that has helped to keep the incidence of lockjaw at its low level. Your

physician will advise you as to its use. Its disadvantages are that it gives only temporary protection; it does not get rid of the lockjaw germs in the wound; and it does sometimes cause hives and other disagreeable symptoms for a few days, particularly if the subject has had previous injections. Should lockjaw develop, it requires much antitoxin and entails great expense; and even then, not all cases can be saved. It is not possible to free the environment of lockjaw germs, but now there is a method of active immunization. The subject becomes his own manufacturing establishment for antitoxin to combat lockjaw poison.

One nice feature about the

treatment is that it can be combined with diphtheria and whooping cough prophylaxis. The concurrent immunization is, preferably, carried out in infancy. Should a child already have his

diphtheria toxoid and whooping cough vaccine injections, he can take the lockjaw toxoid injection alone; and these can be given at any time with very little discomfort.

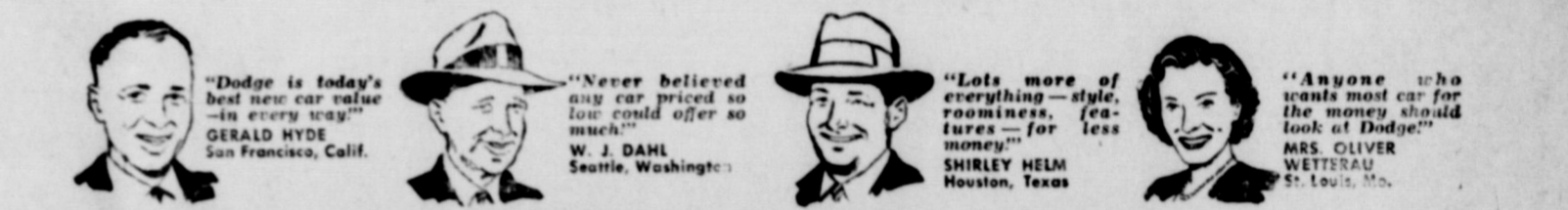

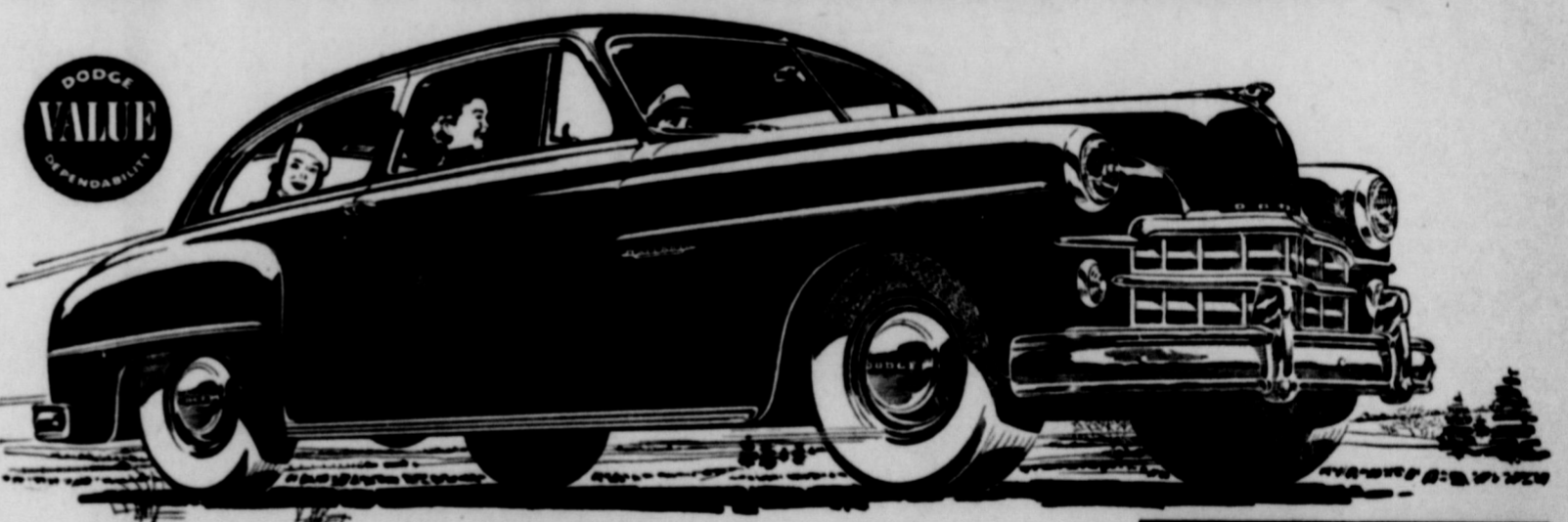

## LOOPHOLES in the Law

By WILL WILSON

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of short case histories, all taken from court records, showing how legal loopholes often enable criminals to escape punishment in Texas. Will Wilson, of Dallas, is chairman of a special steering committee of the State Bar, which is working for revision of the antiquated Criminal Code and Code of Criminal Procedure in order to eliminate these loopholes.)

Burglar Joe admitted that he broke into a store operated by

Mrs. Fred Smith in Prairie Hill, Texas. He confessed that on September 27, 1941 he broke in the back door of the store building, entered and stole several articles of merchandise.

Since there was no doubt of Joe's guilt, he was convicted and sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. But on appeal the verdict was reversed.

At the trial Mrs. Smith testified that she was the wife of Fred Smith and that she lived with him at Prairie Dell, where they operated a store. The in-

diction pointed out that the store, at the time of the burglary was under the control and ownership of Mrs. Smith.

The reversal was solely on a technicality involving ownership of the store. Although Mrs. Smith was operator of the store, it was community property belonging jointly to her and Mr. Smith. In the eyes of the law the husband was owner. The indictment charging Joe should have alleged that the husband, instead of the wife was the owner of the property.

If the State Bar is successful in its efforts to bring about revision of Texas' criminal statutes, such loopholes in the law can be closed. Under the present system too many criminals escape justice, even when there is

no doubt of their guilt, breeding disrespect for the law and subjecting good citizens to constant threats from lawbreakers.

This, the annual meeting of the WTCC board of directors, will be the climax of the year's work of the organization in defining water needs of the area, and establishing economic loss through lack of water campaign to flood loss.

"The federal government will learn how badly West Texas needs water at this meeting," said WTCC President John D. Mitchell in reporting the plans to his executive board in session here this week. "We have been sitting over waterholes with Winchesters or fighting to keep our domestic water rights in West Texas for a long time.

"This is a program to develop new water, a program so big it can only be handled in a big way and that's what we are doing in bringing a man at cabinet level here to hear our story and tell us what the federal government can do to protect our economic loss from lack of water."

The WTCC has a nominal board of approximately 200 among its 6000 membership in the 132 county area, but the organization hopes to take interested officials from all the towns to help the water cause, according to Manager D. A. Bandeen.

Already the Bureau of Reclamation has authorized three West Texas surveys under the direction of Harry P. Burleigh, state planning engineer, according to Bandeen. One will provide for all the area on the Brazos river watershed above Possum Kingdom and below the Caprock, another is on the Colorado above the mouth of Pecan Bayou, while the other under the authorization is a survey of the Prairie Dog creek area and tributaries of the Red river in the Memphis-Chil-dress area.

These in addition to the \$85 million Canadian project already approved by the Bureau, to supply water to a dozen West Texas towns between Borger and Lamesa.

### Burlington To Have Conservation Tour This Year

Arrangements are being completed rapidly for a 1949 soil conservation tour, the fourth such tour to be sponsored by Burlington Lines in cooperation with the Second National Bank of Houston, Texas A&M Extension Service, and the U. S. Soil Con-

servaion Service. Meetings are to be held in selected towns in the West Texas territory served by Fort Worth and Denver City and The Wichita Valley Railways, November 14th to 18th, inclusive.

The first meeting of the soil conservation group will be in Shamrock on November 14th, to be followed by meetings in Childress on November 15th; Quanah, November 16th; Henrietta, November 17th; and Spur during

the afternoon and Stamford during the evening of November 18. Large gatherings in which local bankers and business men, Soil Conservation Service representatives, and others interested in conservation all will have a part, are being planned at each of these towns where the special tour party will stop.

The tour group is to be comprised of executive, traffic, and operating officers of Burlington Lines, top men from the Bank's agricultural and public relations departments, and district and area supervisors of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service and Texas A&M Extension Service, with a battery of news writers to tell the story of conservation work being done throughout the areas visited.

As the arrangements are being completed and local programs are worked out, the time and place of the meeting at each town will be announced, so that all interested may take advantage of the discussions and demonstrations on conservation and range management.

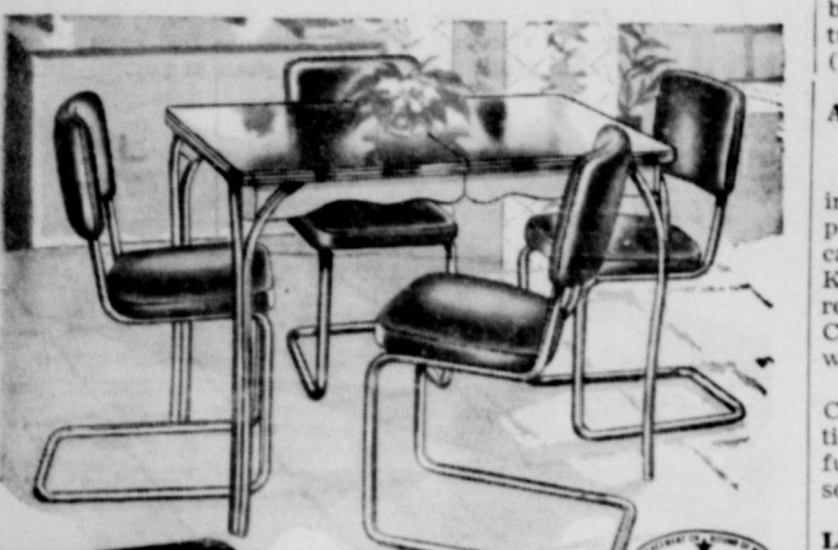
