Every grand jury for the past several years has examined the old jail and recommended a new one, it was stated. The grand jury of the October term of court promised its full support in getting a new jail built.

Wilson and Patterson, Fort Worth architects, submitted plans for the building, 1091/2 feet by 37.8 feet, surrounded by escape proof fence. The jail part, with 21 prisoner capacity, would be of reinforced concrete and should be escape proof. It would have the latest equipment, including automatically contolled doors.

The jailer's living quarters, according to plans, would be of brick, allowing for inexpensive der of Munday and Whitaker of expansion at a later date, if need-

The bond issue is being worked up by Wm. N. Edwards Co. The Lawrence, Herbert Ford, Junior state is expected to take up the bonds, because Knox county is in better shape than most counties on bonded indebtedness, not having approached its limit.

Outstanding public buildings indebtedness against Knox county now totals \$129,500, being composed of courthouse bonds of \$54.500, to be retired in 1955; hospital bonds of \$50,000 to be paid from 1956 through 1961; hospital bonds of \$25,000 to be paid at the rate of \$5,000 per year. 1962 through 1966.

The jail bonds would also start in 1962 at the rate of about \$3,000 per year until 1966, it was stated, then increased to about \$8,000 or \$9,000 a year, as no other issue would be outstanding and there would be only \$73,000

EXPERTS CAN ONLY DO SO MUCH

Organized fire prevention activity has reached a new peak in this country.

Everything that the experts can think of to awaken the public to the menace of fire is being done. On top of that, much special scientific work is underway-such as a propect recently instituted to inspect and report on the hospitals of the nation in the interest of fire safety. A national fire prevention drive has made excellent progress. State and municipal groups have joined in the common effort.

All of this work is necessary, and it should be stepped up in intensity wherever possible. But none of it can accomplish much without public cooperation.

The point is that the authorities can teach us how to prevent fire-but they can't do it for us. Fire prevention literally begins in the grass roots. No one can force you to make your home or farm or place of business safe from fire-except in the case of the most obvious hazards, which are covered by law. The carelessly dropped cigarette-faulty wiring-the overleaded, poorly maintained stove and heating systemthese are the roots in which most fires find their beginnings. Only the individual can corect them.

We can make this nation safe from fire. We can cut to the minimum the toll of more than 10,000 lives and some \$700,000,000 in property damage that fire takes each year. But each of us must help-actively, and to the limit-if the desired goal is to be reached.
