And he isn't coming to town just for an hour, then going some place else. He is going to be here all Christmas week, and he will spend some time in town every afternoon, having candy for the kiddoes, and stuff like that, if present plans are worked out.

Some think we have the greatest crowd-drawing event we've ever had in our Appreciation Day program.

It has brought people to town, and those boys who have formed the steering committee for this event, have worked hard to keep the thing in good order.

As the fall season got into full swing, we began getting some kicks from our cotton farmer friends, so the story goes.

They thought people in the fields shouldn't quit their work in mid-afternoon and come to town for Appreciation Day.

So the steering committee decided to cooperate by discontinuing Appreciation Day during the busy harvest season.

We think that was a good decision, because we need to cooperate with people in the rural communities, and they wish us, to make a successful community.

But Appreciation Day was resumed again Wednesday, and from the looks of the crowd here it was no small event.

## Local P.-T. A. Opens Drive For Band Uniforms

Appropriation of five hundred dollars for the beginning of a school band uniform fund culminated from the meeting last Monday of the executive board of the Parent-Teacher Association.

According to Mrs. Paul Pruitt, president, the P.-T. A. is setting the money aside with the stipulation that the remaining funds necessary for purchasing the required uniforms be raised and committed for that purpose by September, 1950.

Mr. W. C. Cox, superintendent, estimated the cost of twenty-five desired new band uniforms at \$1375 and assured the board that private pledges for contributions plus those expected from civic organizations may make possible the total sum needed by next fall.

Mrs. Bill Sharp vice-president, introduced a motion, which successfully carried, to set aside the regular December day meeting of the P.-T. A. in order that the elementary school musical program scheduled for that time might be presented to the public at a night, December 14.

A unanimous vote made definite funds available for the purchase of supplies for the office of the school nurse.

Mrs. L. C. Guinn, radio and visual education committee chairman, reported that two special Christmas films have been ordered for immediate use, bringing the total number of moving pictures presented in school this year to twenty-five.

"I am confident that, under your new commander, you will continue as a powerful factor in maintaining the policies and prestige of the United States in the Mediterranean.

## Texan Wins 4-H Sectional Honors In Dairy Production

E. P. Wicker, Jr., 19, of Wilson, had the honor of being judged one of 10 sectional winners in the 1949 National 4-H Dairy Production program. Despite loss of 11 calves through disease and loss of valuable feed when the barn burned three years ago, he developed a herd of 18 registered Jersey dairy cattle. During seven years in 4-H, young Wicker also did an excellent job with his meat animal and field crops programs. He has shown a number of prize cattle, including a grand champion which received the American Jersey Cattle Club award. He won a scholarship for being outstanding junior showman at the 1947 South Plains Fair. More than 350 persons saw his demonstrations on dairy production subjects. He was a member of judging teams which received high ratings, and was junior leader of his club. He also was active in the county 4-H Council.

As reward for a fine record, Wicker attended the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, as guest of the Kraft Foods Company. This activity is conducted under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.

Better telephone service for patrons of the Munday exchange was promised for the immediate future last Thursday when officials of the Southwestern Associated Telephone Company met with local people to talk over the situation. The meeting was held in the C. D. A. office at two o'clock last Thursday afternoon.

Meeting with the group were Mr. Reed of the Dallas office and Mr. Robinet of Seymour, district manager. The meeting came as the result of a letter written the Dallas office by local city officials asking that immediate steps be taken to improve local service.

A number of Munday citizens pointed out instances of poor service which they believed to result from defects in the local system, such as poor conditions of cables, etc.

Mr. Reed stated that most of these defects could be remedied and promised an immediate improvement in service. He stated that the company would not be able to begin work on installing a modern system here until the latter part of 1950.

### LOCAL NEEDS FOR 1949

We're pulling for these needs in 1949. What will the year bring?

1. An adequate waterworks system. This is a must for the continued growth of Munday.
2. Building of more housing projects. There continues to be a housing shortage.
3. Recreational facilities for our youth of today—our citizens of tomorrow.

### IS YOUR SCHOOL SAFE?

Is the school which your children and your neighbor's children attend safe from the deadly hazard of fire? And, if fire does strike, has every possible precaution been taken to make sure that those in the building will be quickly evacuated?

These are all important questions, and they can't be answered off-hand. Many a supposedly safe school has become the smoldering scene of a ghastly tragedy. Every school should be subjected to a simple fire test which has been suggested by the National Board of Fire Underwriters. It goes like this:

1. Are the stairways protected by fire-resisting enclosures?
2. Are there at least two exits, well separated on each floor?
3. Are all exit ways clear of obstructions?
4. Is the heating boiler or furnace in a separate, fire-resistive room?
5. Are safe arrangements provided for the disposal of waste paper trash?
6. Are prescribed fire drills practiced regularly?

If your school can answer YES to questions like these, you can breathe easily. If the answer is NO . . . then look out! Every year fire strikes in more than 2000 schools—and in many cases death, injury and maiming children follows. There is no greater community responsibility than making our schools safe—and keeping them safe.

### YOU'RE SAFE ON A TRAIN

At the last session of Congress, legislation was proposed which would, in effect, have given the government vague and sweeping authority over railroad practices and regulations that are involved with safety. Inasmuch as the safety factor enters directly or indirectly into every phase of railroad operation, this legislation, had it passed, would have provided power-hungry bureaucrats with a field day.

Fortunately, I didn't get anywhere, but such proposals have a habit of turning up again and again like the proverbial bad penny. So it would be a good idea for the public to learn just how

safe the railroads are.

Railroad safety was covered graphically by a Houston Press staff writer who had interviewed a railroad spokesman. He said: "You're safer in those plush super trains that whisk you across the countryside at 90 miles an hour than you'd be with an inside straight at your club . . . If your life depended solely upon your immunity from passenger train accidents—while you're a passenger—your life expectancy would be 20,000 years, or two times the age of Methuselah . . ."

In 1948, the number of people killed in train accidents was the smallest for any of the 61 years for which the Interstate Commerce Commission has kept records. And 43 percent of last year's fatalities were persons involved in highway crossing accidents, while 35 percent of the deaths came to trespassers on railroad property.

No form of comfortable transportation ever devised is as safe as the railroads.

### THE CORPORATION DOLLAR

When an industrial concern sells a dollar's worth of its product, what happens to the money? Do the owners happily pocket most of it? The report of a good sized coal company, for the year which ended last April 30, shows how its money is spent.

Out of each dollar received in sales, this company paid out 51.21 cents for labor.

The next biggest cost was payments made for purchases and services, which totaled 32.01 cents. Welfare and pension funds, which are solely for the benefit of labor, cost 4.91 cents, while government took 4.21 cents in taxes.

It was necessary to retain 2.63 cents of use in carrying on the business, and interest on long-term indebtedness amounted to .78 cents. Finally, out of each dollar it was paid for its product, the stockholders received in dividends 2.02 cents—a trifle more than one-fiftieth.

To sum up, the workers in this company received about 25 times as much as did the owners and the government got more than twice as much as the owners. The money paid in dividends was one of the smallest items in the concern's financial operations.

As a general rule, workers receive a great deal larger part of industry's total earnings than do the owners—and government commonly gets as much or more than the owners. In these days, you'd search a long time to find a corporation in which the stockholder receives the lion's share.

"Where in 1932 the per capita cost for Federal expenditures was \$37.41, today it is \$282.82. There is a steady stream flowing out of Treasury coffers at the rate of \$80,000 a minute."—Herbert L. Carpenter, Director, Commerce and Industry Association.

## Knox Prairie Philosopher Willing To Keep Up Prosperity By Helping Government Over-Spend Its Income



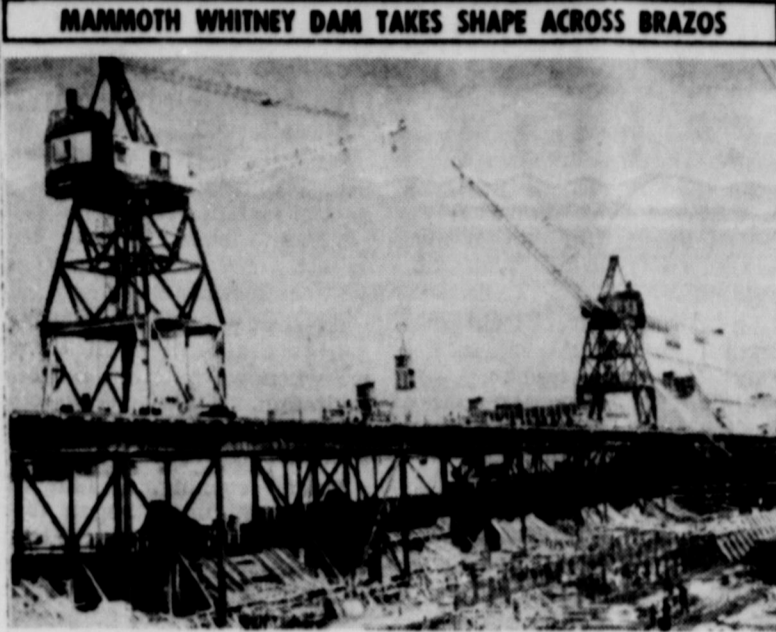

income by \$5,000,000,000, which will add to the income of individuals and corporations and stimulate them to re-spend."

TAYLOR—The collection period for commodities for the Christian Rural Overseas Program (CROP) has been extended until the end of the year in Texas.

## COTTON QUOTA REFERENDUM

### (1) "AN OLD AMERICAN CUSTOM"

Freedom of choice by popular election is one of our most zealously guarded American traditions. The cotton marketing quota referendum is a perfect example of American democracy in action. Through the referendum, each cotton grower helps to decide what action will be taken to solve his production and marketing problems. But this is true only if he **MAKES HIS VOICE HEARD** . . . if he takes an active interest in farm affairs in his local community . . . and

only if he **DOES VOTE** in the cotton marketing quota referendum on Thursday, December 15, 1949.

### (2) WHAT IS A COTTON MARKETING QUOTA?

A farm marketing quota represents each farm's fair share of the National marketing quota. The National cotton marketing quota for 1950 is the amount of cotton, which under normal conditions would be produced from 21 million acres of cotton. In general, the farm marketing quota is the production from the farm acreage allotment. A farm-

er who plants which is within his farm acreage allotment in 1950 may market his total production plus and carry-over cotton produced prior to 1950 penalty free. If a producer exceeds his allotment he must pay a penalty on the "farm marketing excess". The "farm marketing excess" is the normal production of the acreage planted in excess of the acreage allotment. But if the grower establishes his actual production to the satisfaction of the county PMA committee, the "farm marketing excess" is limited to the amount by which the actual production on the farm exceeds the normal production of the acreage allotment.

### (3) WHY HAVE QUOTAS BEEN PROCLAIMED

The Agricultural Adjustment of 1938 as amended provides that when the total supply of cotton for a marketing year exceeds the normal supply for the year the Secretary of Agriculture must proclaim marketing quotas for the next crop. Such a proclamation was made by Secretary Brannan on October 13, 1949. In making his proclamation, the Secretary found that total supply for the marketing year beginning Aug. 1, 1949 would amount to around 20,659,000 bales. The normal supply for the same period is estimated at 16,250,000 bales. "Total supply" includes the 1949 crop, carryover from the 1948 crop and estimated imports during the year. "Normal supply" includes estimated domestic consumption and exports for the marketing year and a reserve of 30 percent of these amounts. Thus "total supply" exceeds "normal supply" by 4,409,000 bales or 27.1 percent.

(4) WHY HOLD A REFERENDUM?

Democracy is based on government of, by, and for the people. And so it is with the farm program. It is the responsibility of the Department of Agriculture through the State, county and community PMA farmer-committees to acquaint farmers with the facts of the situation, and to point out what action is possible under existing legislation. It is up to the farmers themselves to let the Department know what they think should be done.

## Texan Sectional Winner in 4-H Achievement Program

ONE of the highest honors bestowed upon 4-H Club boys and girls is the 4-H Achievement award. Selection is based upon project achievement as well as club and community activity. One boy and one girl are chosen from each of the four extension sections to attend the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, where four of them will be selected for national awards.

One of the sectional winners was Howard Altenhof, 20, of New Braunfels, a 4-H'er for 11 years. During this period he inaugurated many new and better practices on the land and with livestock—largely from knowledge gained in 4-H Club work.

Hog management and soil conservation have been important factors. About 40 percent of Howard's hogs are shown in Texas stock shows each year. In 1947 he was a national winner in the 4-H Meat Animal program, and the following year received the national 4-H Club Camp award. This year his livestock judging team won first in the district, and Howard placed second as an individual. He has received county awards in achievement and leadership. His exhibits have been awarded nearly 100 ribbons—12 for champion and reserve champion honors.

Young Altenhof has helped younger members get started in meat animal projects and coached them in judging teams. This year he assisted the county agent at the District 4-H Club Camp. He served on wildlife conservation.

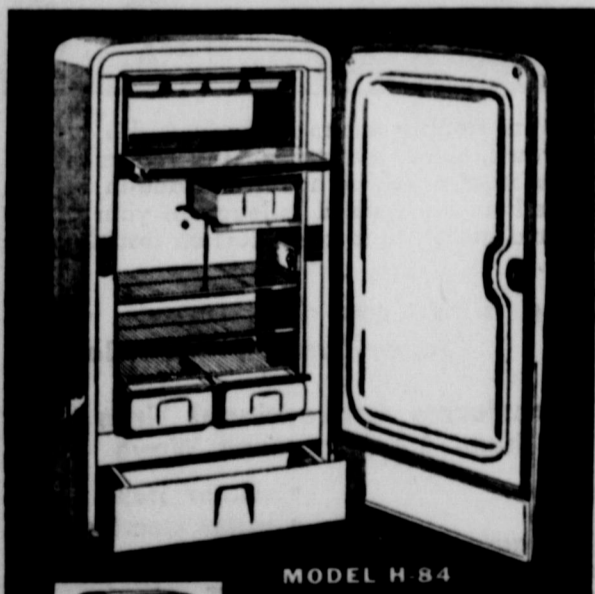

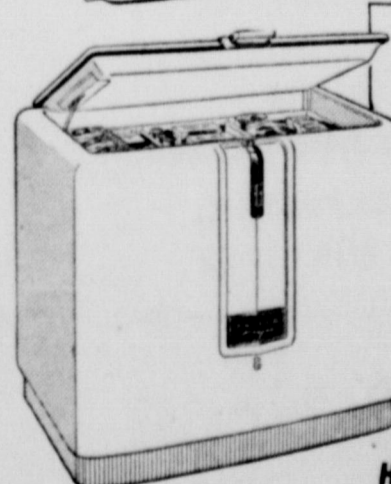

### Moffett Sees Need For More Uses Of Cotton

"The recently announced heavy cut in cotton acreage for 1950 emphasizes the need for intensive research for new and expanded outlets for cotton, and its products," said Senator George Moffett, of Chillicothe today. Moffett is Chairman of the committee on agricultural affairs in the Texas Senate, and a persistent advocate on using scientific research to find new uses for cotton. He further stated: "Scientific research gave us original possession of the atomic bomb at a cost of two billion dollars plus years of work by hundreds of people supervised by scientists. But it shortened World War II, and may have prevented World War III. The automobile companies spend millions upon scientific research annually, and undoubtedly have broadened the market once considered entirely reserved for cotton.

"Only pocket change has been spent thus far upon cotton research. Texas is the only cotton state that has even begun a research program. The federal government has recently set in motion several worthwhile research projects, some of them in cooperation with Texas. As a result of these efforts experts have discovered a way to waterproof cotton fabric so that it will be much more desirable for awnings, tents, tarpaulins, or any usage where shade cloth must stand weathering. Tobacco growers use much such cloth and their consumption of it will gradually pick up. A series of chemical treatments have also been discovered that will make cotton fabric highly resistant to rot and mildew. This will increase the use of cotton in wet and foggy climates, and particularly for storing various commodities in cloth bags. During the war, the bag manufacturers switched to paper for much of their output. It is hoped that this trend can be reversed. A recently discovered chemical treatment that will make cotton cloth bug and moth proof will be helpful. It is reliably stated that cotton research activities up to this time have either saved, or created, a market for a million bales of cotton each year. We need a market outlet for four million bales more than we have now.

"It is now clear that both the state and federal governments should expand cotton research ef-

forts. Cotton is the most important farm crop in ten states. If cotton acres become idle acres, as they may do, incomes will decrease throughout the cotton belt. Jobs will become scarcer, land values will slide, taxes will be harder to pay, and a creeping depression may visit us again. The best way to head off these conditions is to develop a bigger market for our principal Southern farm crop."

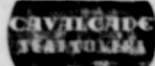
