Fish Survey At Lake Baird

The Texas Game and Fish Commission released a report to Callahan County Water Control and Improvement District, following a survey a com-mission team made at Baird lake Thursday night and Friday of last week. The survey was re-quested by the water board af-

The survey team used five 100-ft. nets in the count. The first 25 feet of each net was one inch, and the next 75 feet was equally divided with 1½ inch, 2 inch and 3 inch. They were set at 6 p. m. Thursday and removed at 8 a. m. Friday.

The team members took from the nets the following fish: 54 shad, 25 curpsuckers, 23 chan-nel cat, 5 black bullheads (poly-wogs), 6 bass which weighed a total of 13 lbs. and 2 ozs., one sunfish, two redears, eight blue-gills, one longear, two golden shiners and 67 crapple. Two of the crapple weighed 134 and 114

OLDER WORKERS CAN EARN MORE, STILL GET SOME SOCIAL SECURITY

Many working people 65 and over who have not yet applied for their social security benefits may have some money coming to them under a change in the law recently enacted by Congress. This change makes it possible for older workers to earn more and still collect some of their social security benefits.

Under the law as it stands now, a social security beneficiary can earn as much as \$1200 in a year and still collect all his social security benefits.

A beneficiary who earns more than \$1200 in a year gives up only \$1 of his social security benefits for each \$2 that he earns from \$1200 up to \$1700. For every \$1 that his earnings go over \$1700, he gives up a matching \$1 of his benefits.

The table below will give you a rough idea of how this works out. It is set up along the lines of the mileage charts you find on many road maps.

First look in the column on the far right for the amount closest to the amount of your monthly social security benefit (or your

First look in the column on the far right for the amount closest to the amount of your monthly social security benefit (or your monthly family benefit, if other members of your family will be receiving benefits based on the same social security account).

Next look in the steps that go up starting on the left for the amount nearest to your expected earnings for the year. Directly under that step, in the box on a line with the benefit amount, you will find the amount of benefits payable for the year.

If you do not know how much your benefit (or family benefit) rate will be, you can ask your social security office to give you an estimate. Or you can ask that office for a copy of Leaflet No 855 and estimate the amount yourself
