Freat Early For Control Of Hornfly

A tiny fly, grayish to black in color and about 3/8 of an inch long, about this time of the ear or a little later begins to rob the livestock producer of pounds of beef and dollars that could be profits. This small ploodsucker, according to James A. Deer, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. Collge, is the hornfly.

It is seen principally on the read, neck and shoulders of catle often in great numbers and permitted to multiply, they may cover 50 percent of an animal's body, says Deer. The hornfly has a very short life cycle-10 to 14 days. This factor, points out Deer, makes it possible for very heavy infestations to build up in the spring before the producer notices their presence. Control measures should be used early to check the multiplication in the first generation. The first spraying is very important and may reduce the total number of sprayings needed during the summer. Animals should be given the first treatment when the fly population reaches an average of about 25







For the families who like their ple with cheese, this recipe puts the cheese right into the filling to cook with apples in a pastry shell. To make Chateau Apple Pie, scald 1 cup evaporated milk in a double boiler. Add ½ lb. shredded processed cheese and ½ tsp. salt. Keep over heat until cheese is melted, stirring frequently. Gradually stir the mixture into 2 eggs, slightly beaten. Combine about ½ cup sugar, ½ tsp. cinnamon, ½ tsp. nutmeg. ½ tsp. cinname about 2, cup sugar, ½ tsp. cinnamon, ¼ tsp. nutmeg. Sprinkle over 2 cups apples, thinly sliced. Put apples into unbaked 9" pastry shell. Bake in hot gas oven (425°F.) 15 mins. Then turn down cas to reduce oven heat to 325°F. gas to reduce oven heat to 325°F. Pour custard mixture over apples in pie shell. Continue baking until a sharp knife inserted near the center of pie comes out clean about 35 mins. Cool and serve.



4-H Youth Raise 8,000,000 Birds In Poultry Program

Based on the increasing popularity of the National 4-H Poultry Achievement program, 4-H-'ers should top their last year's record of raising a total of 8,000,-000 chickens, turkeys, ducks and geese. Likewise the enrollment figure is expected to pass the 150,000 mark reached in 1949.



Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

Austin-Deaths from cancer in Texas reached a total of 7271 during the past year, indicating that a warning against cancer quacks and so-called cancer cures is justified by the State Health Department. Early diagnosis and competent treatment could have prevented many of these deaths, states Dr. Geo W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"There are but two ways of treating cancer. First, by surgery and second, by the use of radium and x-ray. Treatment must be started early and in the hands of a competent surgeon.
