Air-tight, moisture and vapoproof containers should be used for packaging. Many containers and wrapping materials are available that meet these requirements. The committee recommends temperatures for quick freezing of 20 deg. F. in still air and 5 deg. F. in moving air. It is important that the rate of freezing should be rapid. Storage temperature should be 0 deg. F. and long storage periods should be avoided.

must be relied upon for the answers to many of the problems that arise. The Texas State Nutrition Council has just released its 1950 recommendations on home freezing of fruits, vegetables, fresh poultry, meats and fish and cooked foods and flour

The committee recommends that only high quality raw fruits and vegetables of suitable varieties be used for freezing and they add that fast and proper processing gives assurance of good quality if the product is used within a reasonable length of time. Only fresh poultry, meats and fish of high quality should be frozen.

The committee, in dsicussing the preparation of raw vegetables for freezing, answers the question of "why scald vegetables before freezing?" It was pointed out that research has shown enzyme activity is not stopped by low temperatures
