"For this embarrassing persistence, Douglas is not rewarded, either by success or the love of his fellow Democratic senators. But he is honored by people outside of congress who welcome his display of energy and integrity."

SOMERSET, PA., DAILY AMERICAN: "President Truman says the government has been the salvation of private enterprise, although the record shows that time and again private enterprise has been the salvation of the government."

OAKLAND, CALIF., VOICE: "The president of a Kentucky bank implies that bankers are getting soft. The reason that's happening, he argues, is that banks don't take the risks they used to. More and more, government is guaranteeing credit, underwriting risk, and subsidizing losses.
