DON'T HOARD!

Some time ago an association of retailers, which has a membership of 7,500 stores, appointed a Committee on Emergency Government Controls under the chairmanship of a Harvard professor of retailing. A few days aftre hostilities began in Korea, the Committee met. It urged that its members, and all other stores. "carry on through the months ahead with their usual concern for the interests of the consumers and the added determination to serve in all ways possible the interest of the nation as it faces a possible developing emergency." It emphasized that retailers will give full support to the government in policies resulting from the crisis in the Far Eest. It announced that retail experts would be delegated to consult with government officials on problems of policy that affect retail-

In peace or war, retailing is primarily concerned with the welfare of the consumer-if only for the reason that in the long run consumer welfare will determine the reailer's welfare. During and directly after the last war retailing did a splendid job of fighting the black market, in pointing out the dangers in consumer hoarding. and in maiking a limited supply of goods go around as equitably as possible. The experience thus gained places it in a better position than ever before to serve in any kind of an emer-

Disquieting reports of scare buying and hoarding have appeared again. It is to the great credit of retailing that the vast majority of store operators are urging that consumers buy normally, and are pointing out that the supply of goods of almost all kinds is fully adequate. The hoarder is a menace at a time like this. The intelligent and patriotic consumer will cooperate with retailing in preventing shortages and maladjustments in the supply machine by purchasing only what he needs.

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





Falls, the experts point out, account for thelerg sat mmfwy account for the largest number of home mishaps. The majority of them occur in kitchens.

To prevent falls, small ladders or step stools are recommended as standard kitchen equipment. It is makeshift ladders-stacks of books, wobbly tables and chairs-that cause most falls.

Stairways are the scenes of many falls. All stairways should be well lighted, painted in light colors, equipped with study! handrails and free of loose boards and nails.

Burns and scalds are common home accidents. There are several measures which can be taken to prevent them.

One way to prevent burns is never to dry clean clothing at home. And if inflammable liquids must be kept in the home, they should be stored in galvanized gasoline or oil cans. These cans may be tightly covered to prevent explosive fumes from

Deer Tag Test

USTIN-Further studies to Texas big game hunters will be determine the best deer tag for made this fall, according to the

The tag system was adopted by the Legislature as a conservation measure since it is designed to restrict each hunter to two antlered deer in one season. Enforcement of this bag limit was difficult under the

The 1949 Act stipulated that deer, when shot, must be tag ged with a number and data showing the successful hunter's name, date and place the game was bagged, all corresponding with the name and data on the hunter's license.

Tags, presumably metal, were prescribed by the new law, but such self-destructible tags were found inadequate to contain the required data. Last fall two small detachable stubs were connected by a perforated link to the main license. Holes in the ends of the stubs were intended to facilitate tying on the tag. Hunters complained that the

paper markers came off in transit, particularly if they got wet, and that the eyes of the tags pulled out. Meanwhile, the game department studied systems used elsewhere. States using the metal tags reported difficulty in inseparately connecting the gadgets with the paper licenses, and that the license distributors had difficulty locating the metal markers with numbers corresponding to the main license.

the soil. This reduces the fertility and breaks down the structure of the soil. Packing and baking are common results of this form of erosion.

4. Puddle erosion-rain water mixing with the loose particles of soil dislodged by the splash of the raindrops-seals surface cracks and openings and waterproofs the surface of the

In recent tests on land protected by a good grass cover only about a half a ton of soil per acre was moved by splashing and the water taken up by the soil was 2.36 inches during a 15-minute period. In unprotected land 70 tons of soil to the acre was moved in splash erosion and water intake was only

As Mr. Ford explans, on unprotected land, the churning action of splashing raindrops breaks down clods and crumbs of soil and relaxes plant food, organic matter, and clay particles into the water. The runoff mixed with these soil particles then has a scouring effect on the soil that it runs over.

The destruction increases when the soil is loose and the furrows are up and down the slope. Where the land is protected by a thick covering of plant growth pasture, cover crop of hay-the splash erosion is kept to a minimum. The runoff is slowed down "to walk", and little soil moves off the land.
