Are United In Lutheran Church

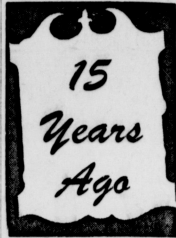

Since 1959 she has been director of Camp Rio Blanco near Crosbyton which served Girl Scouts from the Caprock Council. She has been district advisor for the Council since 1955.

Last Friday was her last day in the Girl Scout "Little House" where she was employed 16 years ago after a year as first grade teacher for the Islidui Public School system.

Emphasis on this special week was pointed to by John McKee, chairman of the Texas Committee on Public Education, who wrote: "The ever increasing school population of Texas points to and emphasizes the growing need for public school instruction facilities as well as qualified teachers. It also suggests that maximum utilization should be made of buildings and teachers already available. It is economically sound to utilize as fully as possible every available space and facility."

"Teachers should be provided with up-to-date and appropriate instructional materials, equipment, and supplies to help them in their work. During the past few years, many electronic and visual teaching aids have been developed through research to provide new "instructional media" for classroom use. Some of these aids to teaching suggest new approaches that make better use of teachers' time and skills as well as pupils' capacity to learn. "The electronic method cannot and should not reduce the

role of the teacher, but will free the teacher for creative work that no machine can ever perform. "Demonstrations of the electronic method in teaching laboratories by teams of classroom teachers have been made available to Texas schools through state and regional meetings. Many schools are now using the new devices with success, particularly the laboratories for teaching foreign languages. Schools are learning that such instructional media are not "gadgets", but can be used

to assist in the teaching of individual pupils as well as to reach more pupils with fewer teachers. "To evaluate any one of the instructional aids accurately and intelligently, parents and school personnel must become familiar with what is being used and know how each is used in the classroom. Also, administrators, teachers, and citizens need to explore together new developments in teaching aids and consider improved approaches to the use of all teaching aids and facilities."

however, was discussed at length by Black and his committee, and Elvon DeVaney told of the study made by Western Texas Farm Labor Association for a similar program. He said that the new Farmers Home Administration program makes financing of such projects possible, either as an out-and-out grant or as a loan to a farm organization. He said his organization had considered the possibility of a housing program to that which Smith had considered last year.

Jesse Young, manager of the Employment Commission office here, said Bailey county has 2800 farm workers each year, part of them also going to Parmer county. Of this number, he said 1800 are transients. Irvin St. Clair, city business man and councilman, said the city's view is changing with regard to federal aid. "We feel now," he said, "that money for

such improvements is available from the federal government, and that Muleshoe might as well avail itself of such funds." He said the city also is considering many other ways of aiding workers — parks, for example.

The committee members were told that an adequate, modern housing project would attract a better type of worker. Instances of private housing in areas where major concerns have located plants, were cited. They also were told that the old-fashioned, barracks type, one-the-farm program is rapidly becoming a thing of the past, the workers demanding and getting better housing than the old barracks provided. "They come here from south Texas where they have modern, efficient housing, and they expect the same type of housing here," the committee was told.


