Paymaster Gin Soon Will Have **New Gin Plant**

After better than 60 days of labor in erecting the building and machinery, the Paymaster Gin in Munday will soon be transformed into a complete new gin plant, according to H.

A. Pendleton, manager. Starting from the ground up, practically everything in the plant is new and complete and the most modern that can be had. The only exception is that some of the cleaning equipment from the old gin is being used in the new plant.

The building has been erected from the concrete foundation and is the latest in gin buildings anywhere in this area. It is all-metal and is fireproof throughout, Mr. Pendleton said. The latest type of cotton re-

> Eggs pass from the body, and hatch within 24 hours. Then the young worm lies in wait for the first unsuspecting barefoot person-usually a youngster-to come by. It pierces the foot skin and slowly inches its way deeper and deeper into the body until it reaches the intestinal tract where the cycle starts again. "It is a disease," Dr. Cox says, "that stunts the growth of chilren, causes skin discoloration, loss of weight, and anemia." Severe infections often cause a morbid craving for things as chalk or dirt, he adds.

But it's easy enough to control-merely by building properly designed sanitary pit privies or septic tanks. That, and wearing shoes.

A good many children in rural sections have had light infestions all of their lives, and have never known what it means to feel entirely well.





When John the Baptist began to preach he said, "Repent ye, for the kingdom of God is at hand." (Matt. 3:2). When Christ began to preach he said, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." (Matt. 4-17). Then he chose the twelve apostles and told them to go, "Preach, saying, the kingdom of God is at hand." (Matt. 10:7). After this he selected seventy disciples and sent them two and two. They were commissioned to say, "The kingdom of God to come nigh unto you." (Luke 10:9). Summarizing, we find that John the Bapitst, Christ, the twelve and seventy have all been preaching that the kingdom of heaven is "at hand" and "nigh" that is, it is "near approaching", "not far off". But the

question is, did it come in the days of John the Baptist? The answer is that it did not. John the Baptist lived and died and never was in the church or kingdom. Let the Bible answer. 51 WHEAT SUPPORT SET AT 1.99 OR 90%

So that growers may make their production plans, the Secretary of Agriculture has announced that price support on the 1951 Wheat crop will be at the same partiy level as for the 1950 crop, B. F. Vance, chairman of the State Production and Marketing Administration Committee, said today. The action was taken in accordance with legislation which directs that suport for field crops be announced in advance of the planting season.

Mr. Vance explained that support for the 1951 wheat crop will be at 90 percent of parity but not less than a national average of \$1.99 a bushel. This figure is based upon the latest parity price information available. If parity is higher at the beginning of the 1951-52 marketing year, the support will be increased.



Deer recommends that the in itial fumigation be made within a month after the grain has been placed in the bin. Monthly inspections during warm weath er are recommended to determine whether or not refumiga-

Since insects are likely to be found near the surface of a bin, the degree of infestation can usa sample of the surface grain. If as many as two weevils or five bran beetles are found in a two pound sample, the bin should be fumigated.

If the grain is stored in wooden bins, 1000 bushels of the grain can be fumigated with a mixture of ten gallons of one part carbon tetrachloride and three parts dichloride. Other recommended dosages are eight gallons of carbon tetrachloride or eight gallons of a mixture of four parts of carbon tetrachloride and one part of carbon disulfide per 1000 bushels of grain. The dosages of the three fumigants can be reduced by 25 per cent if the grain is stored in steel bins.

Fumigants should be applied from the outside of the bin by means of a bucket pump or other type of sprayer, and they should be distributed evenly over the surface of the grain. Deer warns that it is unwise to breathe.
