Highway 80 Named Medallion Route

U. S. Highway 80, probably the longest single highway in Texas, will be known as the "HISTOR-ICAL MEDALLION ROUTE."

The Texas State Historical Survey Committee has awar 56 Texas Historical Building I dallions to structures located along this 819 mile ribbon of concrete and asphalt that have been designated as worthy of state recognition because of their historical, cultural or architectural significance. In addition there are 24 historical mu-seums along the route stretching from Waskom on the eastern border of the state near Shreveport, Louisiana, to Anthony on the western border, 19 miles north of El Paso.

Dr. Rupert N. Richardson of Abilene, President of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, said, "These struct log cabins, court houses, church-es, missions, ranch headquarters and plantations, may now stand forever as a monumental bute to the proud historical tra-ditions of Texas. I think it is only fitting that we officially proclaim U. S. Highway 80 in Texas as the "HISTORICAL MEDALLION ROUTE."

The Travel and Information Division of the Texas Highway Department is now in the pro-cers of compiling a roster of the museums and medallion structures along the Historical Medallion Route for distribution by travel informations and Chambers of Commerce along Highway 80 as an aid to the traveling public.
