

## Construction Work To Begin Soon On Home For Aged Here

Plans for the construction of a home for the aged in Baird were progressing this week, and Chamber of Commerce workers were elated at the possibility of an early start in actual construction of a 30 bed unit to serve the community.

The project was spearheaded by the Baird Chamber of Commerce which took on the responsibility of raising funds for the purchase of the site for the new building in North Baird.

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Brandon of Clyde will move to Baird and assume ownership and management of the rest home. Mrs. Brandon is a registered nurse and will be on hand when needed.

The committee in charge of raising the funds for the purchase of the location, composed of James Eubanks, Elsworth Mayer and Clyde White, reported that about half the required amount had been raised on the

first day of the campaign. The drive will be completed this week.

The home will employ some 12 to 14 people, it was reported. E. Elton Ables, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, said that the construction of the home was the culmination of a lot of effort on the part of the C of C, and he expressed his appreciation and the appreciation of the directors and officers for the work done by everyone who had a part in obtaining the home for the aged.

Aged Homes of Fort Worth will build and finance the building for Mr. and Mrs. Brandon. Lots have been purchased from Mrs. Felix Mitchell for the new building, which will have 15 resident rooms, kitchen, laundry, dining, and lounge facilities. It has been approved by the State Welfare Department and the State Health Departments.

## 142 Businesses In Callahan Co.

A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., announced this week that statement requests were mailed to 146 businesses in Callahan County. He said figures were obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1963.

According to Mr. Hemphill, each January business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to approximately three million business concerns — to the corner grocery store worth a few thousand dollars as well as businesses worth millions.

The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total business in the United States would be higher than the three million quoted above.

During the past year, Hemphill added 115 changes were made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings of Callahan County businesses, including 32 names added, 31 names deleted, and 52 changes in the ratings of continuing businesses. The changes occurring in Callahan County are about even with the rest of the country where a change of business significance is counted about every five seconds.

**AUSTIN** — The ordeal of the "black beans" has been repeated in the Texas Senate, although without the usual dire consequences.

Texas' Constitution requires "choice by lots" every ten years to determine which members of the Senate shall begin the decennial two year terms and which shall receive four year terms.

Among those whom the fate of the "black bean" drawing decreed must run again next spring, if they are to remain more than two years in the Senate, were veterans George Moffett, Dorsey Hardeman, Charles F. Herring, Frank Owen III, Bruce A. Reagan and William T. Moore.

Other returning senators with half-term assignments were Galloway Calhoun Jr., Martin Dies Jr., Abraham Kazen Jr., David Ratliff and A. R. Schwartz.

Freshmen senators who got two-year terms were H. H. Blanchard, Don Kennard, Jack Strong and J. P. Word.

Returning senators who held onto four-year terms were A. M. Aikin Jr., Mrs. Neveille H. Colson, Tom Creighton, Louis Crump, Grady Hazlewood, Culp Krueger, George Parkhouse, William N. Patman, Andy Rogers and Franklin Spears.

New members drawing full terms were James S. Bates, Criss Cole, Ralph Hall, D. Roy Harrington, Walter Richter and Murray Watson.

However, there is a possibility that a constitutional amendment and new redistricting act may require election of all senators again next year.

**COIN TOSS CHOICE** — Selection of the president pro tempore of the Texas Senate was determined by the toss of a coin.

Senator Martin Dies Jr. of Lufkin won over Senator Louis Crump of San Saba when the pair decided to flip a coin for the position, rather than to oppose each other.

Customarily, the selection is made on the basis of seniority. In this instance, Dies and Crump had equal seniority.

**HOUSE RULES FIGHT** — Election of Speaker of the House Byron Tunnell, fourth-term representative from Tyler, took place at the opening of the 58th Legislature with only tok-

en opposition — nine votes cast for Rep. John Alaniz of San Antonio.

But the rules fight that followed Tunnell's ascension to the speaker's stand was a different story.

A group led by Rep. Bob Eckhardt of Houston sought to adopt the permanent rules of the 57th Legislature as the temporary rules of the 58th — a custom that has been followed by previous sessions.

The last session operated under temporary rules until its waning days. It then adopted its amended rules as its own permanent rules. Thus if the current session had followed suit, it would have necessarily adopted the changed rules, under which no Legislature has operated as its own.

It was decided not to do so, by a vote of 108 to 39.

**HOUSE COMMITTEE NAMED** — Most members of the House of Representatives felt that House Speaker Byron Tunnell was "very fair" in his committee assignments.

Rep. John Allen of Longview, who made the nominating speech for the new Speaker, will head the committee on state affairs; Rep. Ben Barnes of DeLeon will be in charge of hiring and firing for the House as head of the rules committee.

Other chairmanships include: Rep. W. S. Healy Jr. of Paducah, Appropriations; Rep. Menton J. Murray of Harlingen, Congressional and Legislative Redistricting; Rep. James Cotten of Weatherford, Constitutional Amendments; Rep. Jerry Butler of Kenedy, Labor; and Rep. George Cook of Odessa, Oil, Gas and Mining.

**FAMILY TRADITION** — When Senator Strong took the oath of office as senator from the second district, it marked the 40th anniversary of the day his father, James G. Strong of Carthage, was first sworn in to represent the same area.

The elder statesman in the Strong family and his wife were witnesses to the swearing-in ceremony for their 32-year-old son.

**"HOT CHECK" BILL Proposed** — A bill which would help small town merchants with the problem of bad checks has been prepared by Sen. Bruce Reagan, who wants an act authorizing justice of the peace courts to try bad check cases up to \$25.

Under the present hot-check law, a merchant must travel to a county seat to file charges in a county court for a \$10 hot check. If Reagan's bill becomes law, the merchant could file a complaint in his local justice court.

Rep. George Richardson of Ft. Worth is preparing a bill which would allow justices of peace to try cases involving hot checks of less than \$50. He feels that the peace court justices are closer to the people of their areas and can handle complaints quicker than district attorneys.

**INSURANCE LEGISLATION** — Sen. A. R. Schwartz hopes to find a solution to a problem made apparent by Hurricane Carla. After the force struck the Texas coast, many homeowners had difficulty collecting for water damage because they had fled the scene and didn't know exactly how the damage occurred.

Schwartz's bill would require the State Board of Insurance to make insurance firms, instead of the homeowner, carry the burden of proof.

Another insurance bill is being drafted by Rep. Don Gladden of Fort Worth who will fight for legislation to protect persons injured in automobile accidents by uninsured motorists.

His bill calls for a special state fund to pay for personal injury costs incurred in accidents with uninsured drivers. Any car owner who couldn't prove ability to pay liability when he registered his car, would have to pay \$20 into the fund.

**70 MPH SPEED LIMIT** — Rep. Forrest Harding of San Angelo will introduce a bill to increase the maximum speed limit on Texas' highways to 70 miles per hour.

**"OLD FOLKS" MARCH** — Texas legislators have received a petition which says old folks of the state will camp on the Capitol lawn until they get higher pensions.

The printed petition was signed by Russell Jack Ballard. He identified himself as president of the Good Citizens League of Texas, Wichita Falls.

**CHILD CONTROL** — A House committee seeking economy in state government has recommended stricter regulation over state aid for illegitimate dependent children.

The Committee on Saving Taxes adopted a sub-committee report bearing this recommendation after argument over whether such aid encourages illegitimacy.

**PHONE RATE FIGHT ENDS** — A phone rate dispute between the City of Weslaco and General Telephone Company of the Southwest, ended in the Texas Supreme Court. Court upheld the city's right to set local rates and the phone company's right to set rates for long distance calls within Texas.

Controversy began three years ago when General Telephone sought an injunction to keep Weslaco's city commission from setting local rates which the firm considered too low; and to keep the city from establishing intrastate call rates on the same basis as that set by the Federal Communications Commission.

It often costs more to call someone in city within the state than it does to call the same distance, or even farther, to someone in another state.

Supreme Court upheld a decision made by the 4th Court of Civil Appeals.

**SECURITIES RECORD** - State Securities Board says Texas made significant gains as a source of public investment funds in 1962.

In its annual report to Governor Daniel the Board said the sharp decline in the stock market was no deterrent to public investment in funds which it regulates.

During the year the board granted 695 permits for the sale

in Texas of securities valued at \$357,340,707.

On the policing side of the board's activities, it reported that three applications, for permits to sell to the public securities valued at a total of \$740,000, were denied.

Report also noted that 22 applications representing \$22,417,826 were withdrawn.

More than \$445,000 in fees were collected during the year. **GOOD NEIGHBOR** — Austin attorney J. Manley Head has stepped into the role of Texas' No. 1 "good neighbor."

The former legislator has been named chairman of the Texas Good Neighbor Commission.

Head served four years in the House of Representatives and in the Senate from 1936 to 1941. He is a former executive of the Texas Motor Bus Association. **CHIROPRACTIC OFFICERS NAMED** — New officers of the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners have been elected.

Dr. G. M. Brassard of Beaumont was chosen as president and Dr. Walter H. Fischer of Temple has been named vice president.

**WATER STAFF** — Hydraulic engineer Lewis B. Seward has been added to the staff of the Texas Water Commission.

Chief Engineer John J. Vandertulp said that Seward will

work with the water resources planning division.

## Bookmobile Shy Of '61 Record

"From a purely statistical viewpoint the Tri-County Library demonstration's December circulation total is approximately 750 shy of December, 1961, due to the fact that only one trip was made to most stops in Taylor county," Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director and librarian, Texas State Library, noted.

"However, one can take another look at the comparison and announce 'new records for the month in Callahan and Shackelford counties,'" the State Librarian explained.

Callahan patrons checked out 1,311 books and recordings this December and only 768 a year ago; Shackelford readers requested 614 volumes for a gain of 44 over the same period in '61.

Shackelford and Callahan counties also showed an increase in circulation over the November, 1962 totals.

"Naturally state and county officials are pleased when circulation figures reach new heights," Dr. Winfrey remarked, "but we are not discouraged when one area shows a slight decline because of the human and physical factors involved. Our purpose is to provide library service to patrons in the Tri-County area in such a manner that the service will be continued indefinitely."

Commissioners of the Tri-County library demonstration, composed of Shackelford, Callahan and Taylor counties, have already approved the continuation of mobile library service to

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## Clyde Election Set For Saturday

The residents of Clyde will go to the polls Saturday, January 19 to express their desires as to whether or not they want a city park, and if so, where it should be located.

The election is the culmination of a lot of thought and effort on the part of the Clyde Parks Board, working in conjunction with the Clyde city council. Members of the board and of the council expressed the belief that a park was very vital to the continued growth of Clyde, and a necessity for the growing youth program of the community.

The council and the board were convinced, after a thorough study of the question, that a vote was needed in order that the desires of the people be known.

The Saturday election gives the voters the opportunity to express themselves on the park and also on a site for the proposed park. The ballot will be of the "for" or "against" nature. Should the voter choose to vote for a city park, he will also have the choice of selecting one of three proposed sites. Or if the

voter thinks of a site more suitable to him, he may write the location in on the ballot or ask the council to name another site.

Three sites were recommended to the council for the park. The location and price of the sites are as follows: The Clyde Bradford tract located 1/2 mile north of Highway 80 West, facing FM Road 604. The tract contains 40 acres and is priced at \$10,500. The C. O. Ralford tract located on old Highway 80 just around the deep curve south of town on the north side of the pavement. The tract contains 21 acres and is priced at \$10,000. A house and a well are included in the price. The J. T. Holmes tract is part of the old Bryant place and is located immediately south of the home of Mrs. Faye White and is located west of old Highway 80. All utilities and sewer facilities are available. The tract contains 11 1/2 acres and is priced at \$11,000.

Members of the parks board and of the city council said that the issue was of great importance to the community, and they urged every eligible person to go to the polling place in the city hall between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. to cast their vote. It was the expressed hope that a large majority of the citizens would express their wishes in the matter. Members of the board are Arnold Connel, Doug Bonine and Knox Waggoner.

During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Anderson will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on the farm instruction, according to Mr. Rock.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Lancaster, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Rock. An enrollment fee of \$2 will be charged; no fee will be charged for wives accompanying their husbands. Farm Management Short Course Certificates will be presented to each farmer and/or wife who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Anderson states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled, but he expects to cover such subjects as agricultural outlook, keeping and using farm records, income tax management, how social security affects farmers, financing your farm operation, and planning the use of farm resources.

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## About Your HEALTH

One of the chief contributors to modern American society is the institution known as baby sitting. One noted authority estimated 35 per cent of the buying power attributed to teenagers come from baby sitting salaries.

It wasn't too long ago, that unless mother and father had a handy grandma' around, they stayed home or took the children with them. Just as freedom has come to other oppressed groups — grandparents no longer get stuck endlessly, because

more often than not, they are also out enjoying themselves.

As a result baby sitting has grown into what amounts to a major industry — practiced, all too often, by inexperienced and sometimes unqualified young people.

Whether the youngsters are six months old or 10 years old, parents leaving them want to know the sitter is someone they can trust.

It must be someone the parents know is responsible and sufficiently mature, one who

will like the child and get along with him. This calls for a study of the sitter's references if he or she is not already well known to the family.

To be in charge of one or more children and the home they live in is a serious business. Careful arrangements need to be made between the parents and the baby sitter.

Both the parents and baby sitter have obligations in preparing and carrying out the agreement.

Parents should make the request well in advance. A thorough briefing should be made to the sitter — preferably written — telling where the parents will be including phone numbers, and the expected time of return.

The sitter should meet the child while he is awake, especially on the first visit. The layout of the home should be explained and emergency numbers listed.

The sitter should be alerted for expected visitors or deliveries otherwise the doors and windows should remain locked. Finally the parents should have the correct change available to avoid

confusion and provide safe transportation home.

The sitter's responsibilities are similar. She should keep awake — even if parents allow napping, follow parent's views on TV, phone, snacks and visitors, and make periodic checks quietly on sleeping children.

Full information on food, habits, rituals and nicknames should be obtained. Sitters should understand basic first aid and learn to suspect illness in a child. Safety should be a sitter's first consideration. (A weekly feature from Public Health Education, Texas State Department of Health.)

### Shop Early For Inspection Stickers

AUSTIN — Col. Homer Garrison Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today urged Texas automobile owners to "do their shopping early" this year to reduce the last minute rush for inspection stickers.

All vehicles coming under the provisions of the Texas Vehicle Inspection Act must secure the 1963 Inspection sticker by April 15, 1963. After that date, vehicles not displaying the new inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and the operators of those vehicles will be subject to arrest, Garrison said.

He reported that approximately one half of the inspection period has expired and about one fourth of the vehicles in the state have been inspected. Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, he added, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

"There are approximately 5,000 authorized inspection stations in the State and they are ready and capable of handling the inspection stations in the State and they are ready and capable of handling the inspection of all vehicles without delay if the owners of uninspected vehicles do not wait until the last few days before the deadline," Garrison said.

Governor - Elect John Connally, making his first appearance after the election, spoke to the Council's Board of Directors at their November meeting and re-emphasized his strong stand for a much - needed Tourist Program in Texas. Governor Connally said "It is essential that we have aggressive, substantial efforts in behalf of the Texas Tourist program and I therefore pledge my support to the Texas Tourist Council, which is doing such vital work in this area."

Council President Jim Gaines called for state-wide citizen support as he announced plans for an intensive membership campaign to begin in January, 1963. Gaines said "while Tourism is the nation's third largest industry, it ranks thirteenth in Texas." "Tourists spent 440 million dollars in Texas last year," Gaines added, "but that figure is down 100 million dollars a year since 1957." The Tourist dollar is an important part of the economy of every city and town in Texas, Gaines pointed out. "With strong grass roots support of the Texas Tourist Council and its legislative program," Gaines added, "Texas can take its place as the Nation's number one tourist spot."

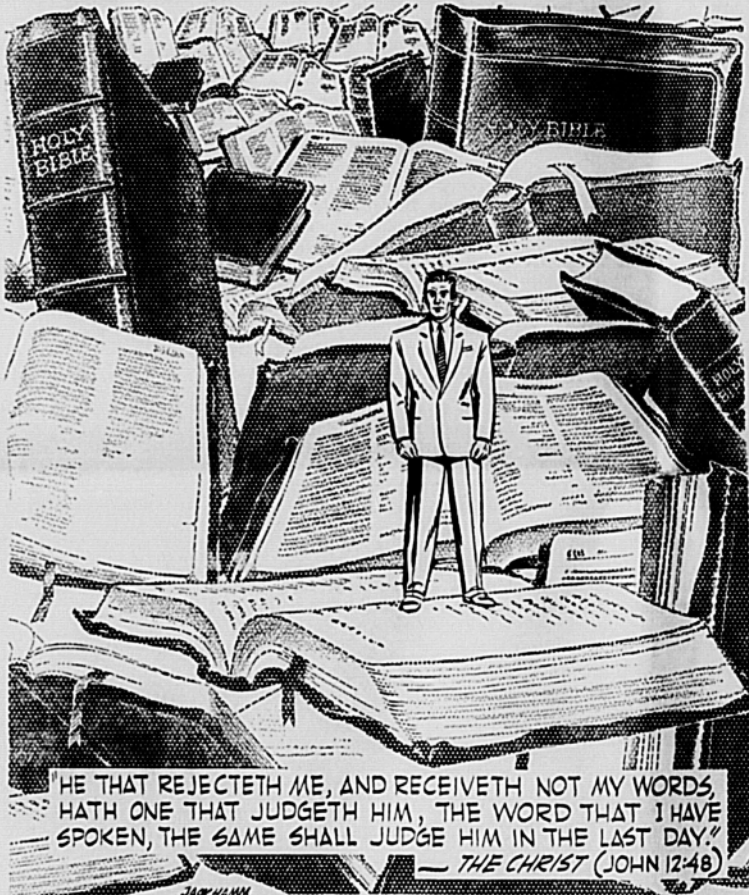

Permanent offices of the newly organized Texas Tourist Council have been established in Austin in the International Life Building and the executive officer of the association has been named. Bill Stinson of San Antonio was appointed Executive Vice President and General Manager of Texas Tourist Council. The announcement was made at the November board meeting by Council President James M. Gaines of San Antonio.

The Texas Tourist Council was organized as a result of a meeting to determine what could be done to stop the decline in the flow of tourists to Texas which has been on a steady decline since 1957. It was decided at that meeting that an active citizens organization was needed to push for a strong state supported program. In early 1962 board of directors was named, a constitution and by-laws drawn up and adopted, and the organization was chartered under Texas law as a non-profit corporation dedicated to the stimulation of the tourist trade in the State.
