



"REMEMBER THE ALAMO"

"Pop, pop, pop! Bom, bom, bom! Throughout the day. No time for memorandums now. Go ahead! Liberty and independence forever!

So wrote Davy Crockett as the last entry in his diary on March 5, 1836, the day before he and about 170 other Texas patriots under command of 25-year-old Lieut.-Col. William B. Travis perished in the Alamo.

After being besieged for ten days by the Mexican Army under General Santa Anna, the Texans fought until only six including Col. Travis were left alive. These six surrendered and were butchered on the spot.

On March 20 another Texas force of about 300 men under Captain James W. Fannin was forced to surrender to Santa Anna at Goliad, under promise of honorable treatment as prisoners of war. One week later, on March 27, every man of Fannin's command was murdered in cold blood by Santa Anna's orders.

Revenge came to the Texans on April 21, when 738 men under General Sam Houston, with "Remember the Alamo" as their battle cry, wiped out Santa Anna's army of 1,400, killing 630 and cepturing 730 including Santa Anna himself, at San Jacinto. Houston's loss was only 7 killed and 23 wounded.

Thus the independence of Texas was won 91 years ago, after we months of fighting and massacre, in which nearly half of the men engaged on both sides lost their lives.




