

State Meeting of Farmers Union Here During July

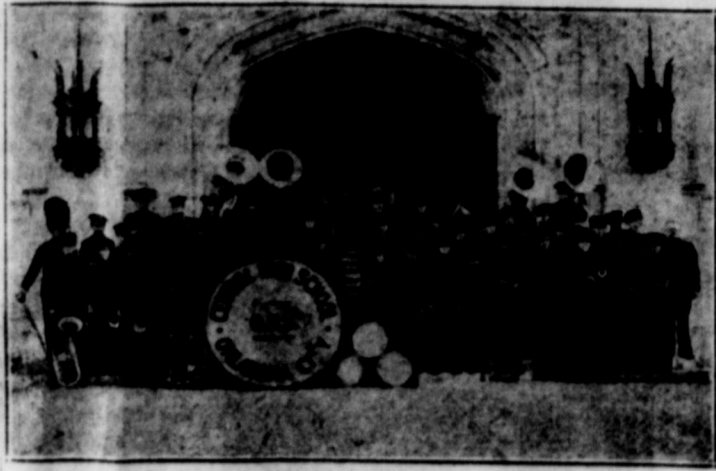

I can just see a bunch of beer bellies as they check over the returns of the wet east and how they would like to be further east than they are—even as far back as Al's East Side.

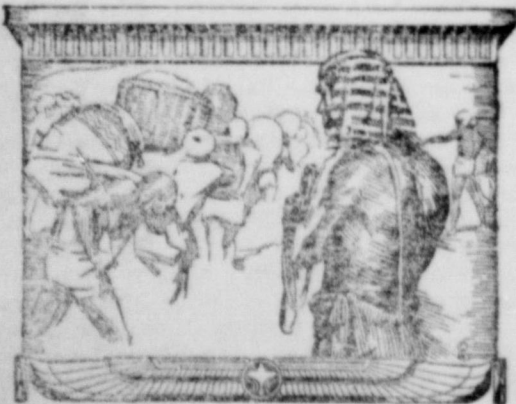

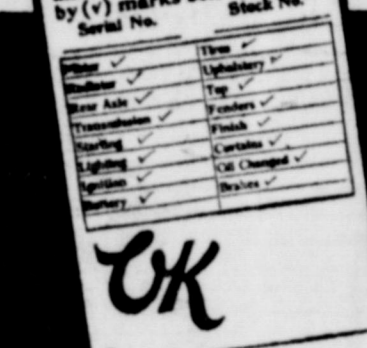
