### GOOD NEWS FOR THE COMMUNISTS

If a survey made by the Opinion Research Corporation among seniors in 86 high schools, scattered across the country, is correct, there is something alarmingly wrong with American ed-

According to the results, 82 per cent of these students do not believe we have competition in business: 60 per cent feel owners get too large a share of the profits; 61 per cent reject the profit motive as necessary to the survival of our free system; 55 per cent accept the classic communist doctrine of "from each according to ability, to each according to needs," and 60 per cent think a worker should not produce all he can.

This should make the men in the Kremlin and our other ideological enemies happy. For, if such views are widely held and acted upon by our citizens of tomorrow, we will destroy this nation from within-which is what the Communists want beyond anything else.

### WIN, PLACE, AND SHOW

Who profits most from the operations of American corporations? Some figures from the U. S. Department of Commerce provide an answer.

Last year, American corporations paid out \$165,800,000,000 in wages and salaries to the people who provided the human energy used in the production of goods and services. They paid \$17,200,000,000 to government in taxes-money that built roads, supported schools, helped main tain the military establishments, and did a thousand and one other jobs. They had a total profit of \$17,800,000,000. Some \$8,000,000,000 of this was retained in the business to pay for expansion and other job-creating activities. The balance went to the stockholders-the people whose savings made the existence of the corporations possible.

So, in dividing up corporate income, the workers come first, the government second, and the owners third.

### A DEMAND

It's always refreshing when a top man in government champions a principle that is strictly in accord with American traditions.

Director of the Budget Hughes did that when he said: "We remain convinced that the best interests of the nation as a whole do demand the termination of unwarranted government competition with business.'

In plain language, government in business is socialism-and socialism, carried far enough, always ends in tyranny and the death of liberty and human dignity

It has been observed that the possibility of soaking the rich to pay the cost of government went out with prohibition and Empress Eugenie

If the federal government took every nickel of individual taxable income above \$10,000 a year, the amount collected wouldn't pay its bill for one month. If it took all taxable income above \$4,000. it would get only a fifth of what it is spending

We just haven't got enough rich or middle income people to soak, and those we have are soaked to the hilt already. So the lower incomes must carry a great part of the burden.

### TIME-FOR DEFENSE

Switzerland now has about 83 per cent of the American watch market. The top military people have warned that, in the interest of national defense, what remains of our own watch industry must be preserved and protected. Secretary of Defense Wilson recently said a study showed that "the entire horological industry was essential to the mobilization base."

The reason is that the precision parts we find in watches also are required in the manufacture of timing devices used in modern weapons-Abombs, Nikes, fighting planes, and so on. One B-36 has 3,000 jeweled bearings in its instruments.

All of us would do well to think of this when we buy watches. It's vital that we keep our watchmakers at their benches.



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


