WHICH WILL IT BE?

In a recent speech, Senator Hugh Butler of Nebraska dealth forthrightly with the price control controversy. He said, "I would suggest that it is time our nation fact boldly up to the issue of price controls and decide whether we intend to have a free economic system or a controlled economic system from now on. . .

"These price controls are supposed to be temporary, yet we know from experience that supposedly temporary legislation every frequently is allowed to become permanent. National emergencies seem to have become the noraml thing

in Washington. "The excuse usually given for these controls is that they are necessary to counteract inflationary pressures. Actually, these so-called inflationary pressures are caused by the gigantic in-

crease in government spending." Controls are a form of political buck-passing. In effect, they say that retailing, manufacturing, agriculture, labor and other groups are responsible for inflation, and so they must be controlled by flat. What they never say is that these and other groups are the victims of inflation, rather than its creatirs. The whole inflationary spiral was caused by the insane spending of the government. The whole inflationary situation is maintained and fattened by the insane spending of the government.

Senator Butler is right. We must choose between a free economy-or an economy in a political straightjacket which will ultimately undermine representative government. And we must make that choice soon.

PROFIT CAN BE TOO LOW

Under the competitive system, the profits per dollar of sales earned by all kinds of stores has been very low-much lower than most consumers realize. This is all to the customers' benefit and is one of the fine fruits of low-cost mass distribution. However, if profits are forced down too low, the inevitable result will be poorer service, reduced operations, and stagnation. Nobody does his best when he must work for nothing or next to nothing.

Today, many retailers face a critical profit situation, due to OPS policies and orders. A short time ago a food chain association submitted to an OPS official a certified public accountant's report on what has happened to 32 of these organizations, all ofthem typical of the industry. Sales increased 14 per cent in the third quarter of 1951 as compared with the same period a year ebore. Yet net earlinings after taxes, decreased more than 67 per cent, and amounted to only 41/100 of one per cent on each dollar of sales. As the letter accompanying the report said, "For an industry that historically operates on a net profit of 1 per cent to 2 per cent of sales, you will agree that less than 41 cents for handling \$100 worth of merchandise through warehousing, transporting and retailing functions is dangerouly low."

A comparable situation exists in retailing operations other than food-and it exists for independent stores as well as chain systems. No retailer is asking or demanding exhorbitant profits-indeed, when competition is open and free, that is automatically made impossible. But government policies which take almost all of the profit out of progressive and essential enterprises menace everyone with a stake in the strength and welfare of America.
