**FERTILIZERS AND PESTICIDES**

Farming and ranching gets just a little more complicated each year.

In these days of stepped-up production, higher crop quotas, advances in mechanized equipment and changing economic conditions, the farmer and ranchman has to keep constantly re-adjusting his seasonal plans if he is to operate at a profit. In addition to keeping pace with day-to-day developments, he has to look ahead and anticipate future conditions that may have a bearing on his situation.

A crystal ball might be a big

help in this respect. But since few, if any, of us have this advantage, then a little planned thinking is the next best method.

One thing is certain this season. Due to a mild winter, Texas may face one of the worst insect infestations in the last 20 years. And, of course, we must constantly practice those conservation measures which will keep our soil in top-notch shape.

A heavy volume of pesticides and fertilizers are expected to be needed this year to support the high-level farm output. Farmers are urged to order their supplies well ahead of the time for applying these essential

production materials. A last minute rush would tax industry's ability to fill orders and the channels of transportation from factory to farm.

Total requirements this year for pesticides, including insecticides, fungicides and herbicides are expected to run about nine per cent higher than in 1950-'51. On the whole, supplies should be equal to the demand and prices

generally are not greatly different from those of a year ago.

The United States Department of Agriculture reveals that supplies of pesticides containing copper and sulphur may not be sufficient to fill all demands but alternate materials will be generally available. Lead arsenate supplies, critically short earlier in the year, are improved. Farmers should be able to get sufficient quantities of weed killers such as 2,4-D and 2,4,5-T.

A generally strong demand for fertilizers has put pressure on the nation's soil building supplies. Fertilizers on the whole are slightly more plentiful although a little less phosphate is expected to be available than last year. Because of a high demand for ammonium nitrate and phosphates, those supplies will be somewhat tight.

Potash will be fairly plentiful.



At least three Texas publications Gained big national circulation. One was the "Iconoclast" edited by W. C. Brann; another was "Texas Siftings," edited by Knox and Sweet; the third, your columnist had never heard of till he read an article written by the Frontier Times' editor, J. Marvin Hunter.

Citizens of Texas and throughout the South in the 80's remember the old "Sunny South," published at Brownwood by two brothers. They were practical printers and published the Brownwood Banner. They launched the "Sunny South" as a story paper, carrying advertising matter for firms all over the United States. It was published twice a month, containing illustrations, and its circulation grew by leaps and bounds from the very start despite the fact that it was printed in what was then a mere village, 60 miles from a railroad.

Within a short time, its circulation ran up to 40,000 copies per issue, and, two years later, its circulation was 150,000 copies. It was filled with advertisements of patent medicines, puzzles, fortune tellers, sleight-of-hand tricks, sewing machines, farm implements, and many other things.

What gave the paper such tremendous circulation was a lottery originated by the publishers through extensive advertising. Regular drawings were held and the prizes were almost everything from cheap watches and gold plated rings to 160-acre farms, and the public seemed to catch the gambling spirit and responded to such an extent that it required a force of ten persons to mail out the prizes and take care of the correspondence. The little postoffice at Brownwood was swamped with the tremendous mail that came in and went out.

The mail contractor, who car-

ried the mail between Brownwood and Eastland, went broke having to provide extra facilities for carrying the bags of mail, as it required extra hacks to carry the loads. On one occasion, the stage was held up and robbed, and when the robbers went through the sacks containing the prizes being sent out by the "Sunny South" they found a lot of cheap jewelry, and amused themselves by throwing the nickel-plated watches against the side of the mail hack.

A fine two-story building was

erected for the "Sunny South," and the business grew to such an extent that about 50 people were employed in its several departments. Brownwood got too small for such a successful enterprise, so the brothers moved the "Sunny South" to Waco. Court difficulties wrecked the business and the "Sunny South" ceased to exist.

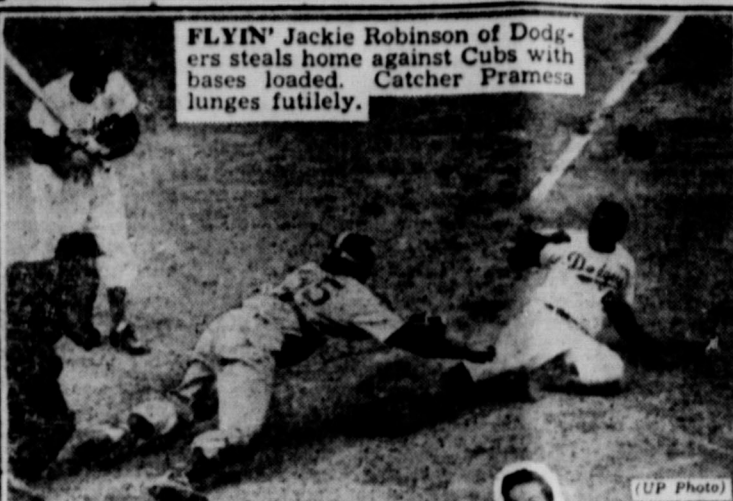

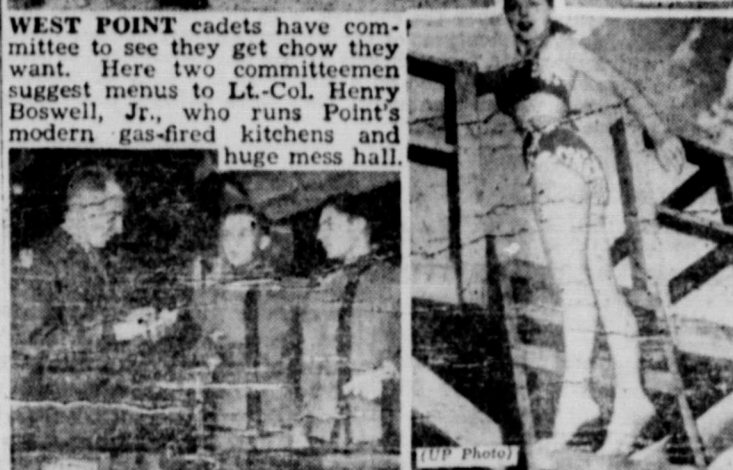

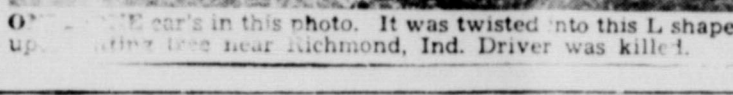
**FLYIN'** Jackie Robinson of Dodgers steals home against Cubs with bases loaded. Catcher Prames lunges futilely.

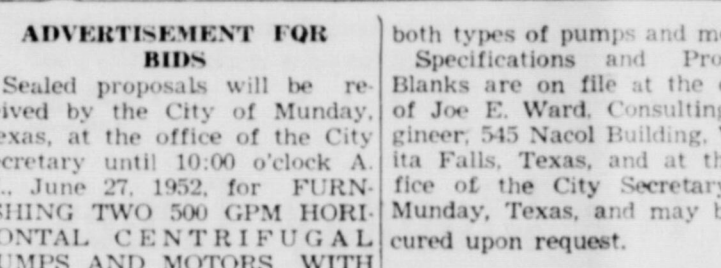

### Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox  
M. D., State Health Officer  
of Texas

**AUSTIN**—A public hearing on atmospheric pollution, the first of its kind ever held in Texas, is scheduled for June 25-26 in Houston at 9 a. m., the State Department of Health has announced.

The hearing, to be held in the Baylor University School of Medicine auditorium, is for the purpose of allowing industrial plant managers and the public to see what can be worked out on pollution abatement.

State Health Department engineers will moderate the discussion. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, said Texas has no specific anti-pollution laws, and "no standards to go by." The ultimate goal, he said, is to develop a control program.

"We'll need some enabling legislation to set up a program," Dr. Cox said. "The complicated problem in Texas will require a lot of support from both industry and the public."

He said industry has indicated just as great a desire to do something about the situation as has the public.

About 85 per cent of all air pollution complaints coming to the State Health Department's attention come from the Houston ship channel area, which Dr. Cox tagged as the reason for having the first public hearing then.

This is the first in what health department engineers hope will be a series of meetings on air pollution abatement. Potential pollution problems will increase with Texas industrialization, the

health officer declared. In addition to inviting industrial leaders and complainants from Houston, a representative from the governor's office and the attorney general's office have been asked to be on hand.

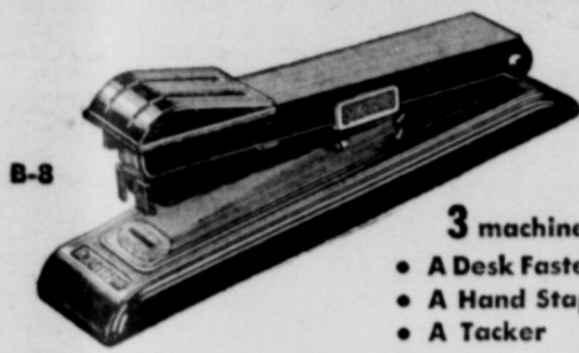

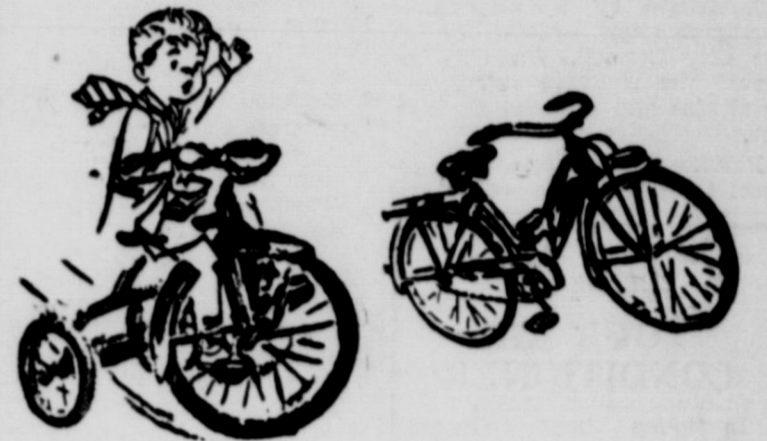
