Federal Income Tax

NO. THREE

The Revenue Act of 1941 pro vides a simplified method of com puting ncome tax in the case of individuals whose gross inco is derived wholly from salary, wages or other compensation for personal services, dividends, interest, rent, annuities, or royalties, and does not exceed \$3,000. A new Form 1040A has been no vided for taxpayers who are entitled to and elect to use such method. T table on the r sde of this Form shows the aomunt of tax on increasing amounts of gross income after the proper allowance of \$400 for each dependent, it any.

The tax under the simpli method is the same for each \$25.00 block of gross income and the taxpayer need only ascertain in which block his gross income (less allowance for depend ents) falls to determine his tax. A flat reduction of 10 percent has been made in arriving at the amount of tax shown in thetable for deductions such as charitable contributions and taxes paid, so that the taxpayer who uses this method does not list these but get an automatic deduction of 10

Under the simplified method .25 the status of a person on the .50 last day of the taxable year is the governing factor in determin QUOTA ing the exemption level (\$750 for SHORT single persons and married per-\$99.90 sons living with husband or wife \$66.15 and \$1,500 for married persons living together) as well as the credit for dependents.



News From AAA Office

BEEF CATTLE SITUATION

There seems to be considerable misunderstanding concerning the need for beef marketings and it is felt that the information contained in the following letter from the secretary of agriculture, Claude R. Wickard, will be of interest to many beef producers. To the Chairman, U. S. D. A.

Defense Boards:

"There is danger ahead for beef cattle producers if heards continue to increase. This, together with the fact that abundant supplies of food are needed for national defense indicate that increased marketings of beef cattle aand calves in 1942 will benefit not only cattlemen but the National Defense Program as well.

"The number of cattle and calves on farms has been increas ing rapidly for the last four years The number now is not far below the record peak of 74 million head just prior to the disastrous drought of 1934. At the present rate of increase we will have 74 million head or more in another

"The danger of another period with excessive numbers and several years of ruinous prices cannot be headed off without increased marketingi of cows and heifers. Farmers and ranchers have held back cows and heifers for the last four years in order to increase herds.

"There are four things which beef cattle producers should do now to make their position secure:

1. Market more cows and heifers to prevent further increases in cattle numbers. The goal for cattle slaughter for next year can not be reached unless a larger proportion of breeding animals are marketed.

2. Pay off indebtedness now while prices and demand are good so as to avoid the danger of hav ing to pay big debts at low prices later.

3.Improve breeding herds by cul ling out and selling undersiable animals while demand is good.

4. Keep Livestock numbers in balance with normal feed supplies Range conditions and feed supplies in the West have been unusually good this year. Drought can cause a lot of loss if there is no feed reserve available, or if ranges are over-grazed.

"The 1942 Farm Defense Program goals call for slaughter of about 28 million head of cattle and calves compared with a probable slaughter of about 26 million head of cattle and calves com pared wth a probable slaughter of about 26 million head this year. Meeting this goal in 1942 will make the long-time position of the cattle industry more secure and help supply the increasing need for meat.

"It is essential in this time of emergency that the Nation's wor kers and armed forces have an abundance of meat, and beef and veal will be needed in larger amounts as demand ncreases.

"Consumers will have more pur chasing power next year than they have had for a long time and larger quantities of beef can be sold wthout depressing prices. By increasing slaughter next year, pro ducers can take advantage of the opportunity to sell on a good marketingmarket and prevent ex cessive marketings at some later time when prices and demand may be as good.

"The extent to which producing areas and individual producers can or chould contribute lived there until he was 21 years to the 1942 beef and veal slaughter goal will cary greatly A flat percentage increase in marketing cananot be expected from the can individual producers wthin an area be expected to increase mar ketings by the same proportion. But the total marketings which should be made are shown in the State goals. Mettng these goals will serve the best interests of the cerelylotiflcnotAssi cattlemen and the Nation."


