ANOTHER BLOW TO SOCIALIZED MEDICINE

After a year of intensive study and work, the President's Commission on the Health Needs of the Nation has issued its report. And one thing is certain-it won't please the advocates of socialized medicine or any variant thereof.

The report turns thumbs down on socialized medicine, and points to the need for retaining the traditional relationship between physician and patient. It states that the big objective should be to further improve and extend volunary, privately financed prepaid health service. 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

Results Of 1952 Corn Tests **Are Announced**

four newest yollow corn hybrids, Texas 24, 26, 28 and 30, all developed and released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, made outstanding records in tests conducted during 1952 at 21 widely scattered locations in Texas. Texas 26 and 28 had the highest yields when all locations were considered. Texas 30 and 24 yielded only slightly less and in freedom from damage by insects and diseases

According to the station agronomists, these four hybrids the older Texas hybrids. Seed supplies last year were adquate but the agronomists point out that a shortage may occur this year because of reduced seed output caused by the drouth.

In commenting on the 1952 tests, the agronomists, say the season was extremely variable in different areas of the state. In only one section-South Texas-were growing conditions above normal. Test stations in this area reported outstanding yields. The average of all tests at Lockhart was the highest in the state, a very respectable 88.9



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

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

State's Draft Call For March Is Highest In Years

AUSTIN-The biggest state draft call in two years-calling for the induction of 2,989 men in March was announced Tuesday by state Selective Service headquarters.

Brigadier General Paul L Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said that more than 6,800 men also would be examined in March to keep the state ready to fill future calls.

Local board quotas for the March induction call will be figured and placed in the mail on or about February 10, the state draft director said. The March quotas for physical examinations are scheduled to be sent to local boards Tuesday

General Wakefield said that local boards will be authorized to induct men in March down to the age of 19 years and 9 months and examine men down to the age of 19 years and

Not many men below the age of 20 will be inducted in March, according to the state Selective Service director. Local boards will be advised to fill March calls to the greatest extent posse with men 20 or older

"I believe only a small percent age of those inducted in March will be below the age of 20," General Wakefield commented. "Latest available figures from our local boards show only 536 men below 20 who are examined and acceptable. Of course, this number will grow between now and March.

The state draft director said that present inductees for the armed forces are replacements for drafted men who are now getting out after two years of

Texas has inducted more than 52,000 men since beginning of hostilities in Korea and has examined more than 125,000 during the same period.


