## Time to MailChristmas Gifts to Men Overseas

The War Department has issued a sincere plea to persons mailing overseas Christmas packages to send them now in order to insure our soldiers getting their packages on

Although there is a full month between September 15 and October 15-the deadline for overseas Christmas mailing-without the usuel written request from the soldiers, everyone should mail early to avoid lastminute rush mailing and avoid the possibility of the packages not reaching thes oldiers overseas in time for Christmas.

Christmas packages cannot weight more thn 5 pounds when wrapped, cannot measure more than 14 inches committees in particular for their in length and 36 inches in length and girth combined. Each package should bear the eddorsemet, "Christmas Gift Parcel," but this can in no wise resemble a postage stamp or

Every package should be addresed completely, clearly legibly, printed if possible with a substance that will not mar, smudge or otherwise run. Every address should include the full name of the soldier, his rank, his The name of the outfit with which he is serving should be on the second postmaster through which the package is routfed should be on the fourth line. Eeach package should be wrapped very securely.

Prohibited articles include intoxicants, inflammable materials including matches of all kinds and lighter fluids, and poisons or compositions which may kill or injure another or damage the mails. Do not send peri-
