



News From The U. S. Congress

Congressman Frank Ikard

This week saw action in the House on two important pieces of legislation First was the Mutual Security Act which was considered on Monday and Tuesday. As it finally passed, Act authorized approximately \$110,-000,000 less than was asked for by the Administration and contained a provision to bar participation under the program set by the Act for any nation in the Western Pacific or Southeastern Asia that joins in a non-agression pact with Communistic countries. I am sure you know that the British had proposed such a non-agression pact for the countries in those areas of the world.

The House also adopted this week legislation setting out the farm program for next year. The House defeated a proposal to adopt the flexible support system proposed by Mr. Benson, the Secretary of Agriculture, on basic crops which would have provided for flexible parity between 75% and 90%. It also rejected the recommendations of the Agriculture Committee which were that 90% of parity be retained for one more year. The plan finally adopted by the House was a compromise version of the flex-ible farm price support plan by putting flexible supports between 821/2% and 90% of parity on the basic crops for next year. The Agriculture Bill now has to go to the Senate for approval, and I am sure that it will not pass that body in the same form that it passed the House; therefort, it then will have to go to Conference Committee, and the report of the Conference Committee will have to be approved by both Houses. Therefore, is is impossible at this time to say just what the final price support structure will be. However, it is almost a certainty that it will be some kind of flexible price support program that will attempt to reach a compromise between the plan presented by the Secretary of Agriculture and tee on Agriculture is the House.







[]NTIL a major repair can be made, a small leak around pipe fittings or "sand" holes in a pipe can be stopped by wrapping the area firmly with common cotton twine, as illustrated in Family

The twine is wrapped in parallel coils which do not overlap any-



where. Keep tension on the string as you wrap it in close coils. Make three or four layers about an inch width, and hold it, finally, with few turns of a second bit of

This temporary repair works be-ause wet twine shrinks and rust articles and sediment are caught nd help seal the leak.

The same system may be used mend a leaking garden hose. lowever, the length of the wraping should be increased to about wo inches.
