RHINELAND HAPPENINGS

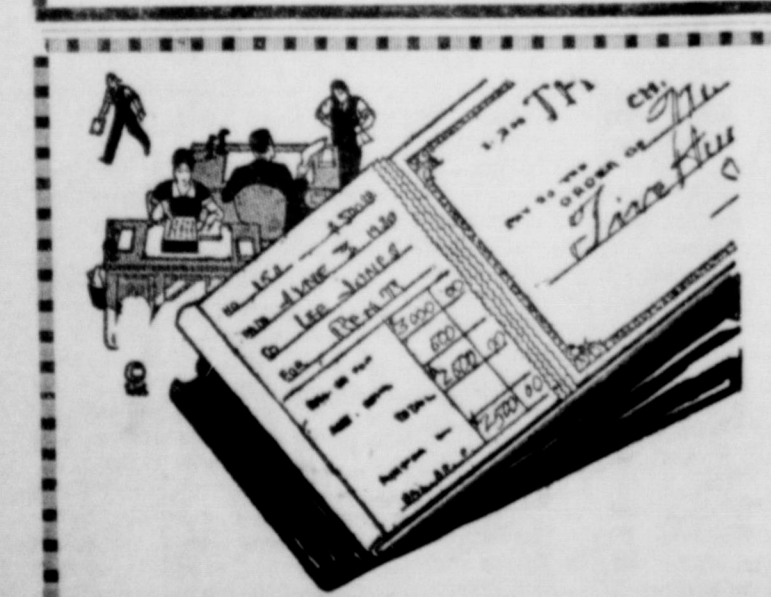

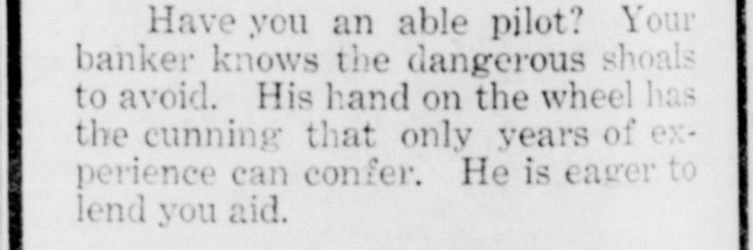

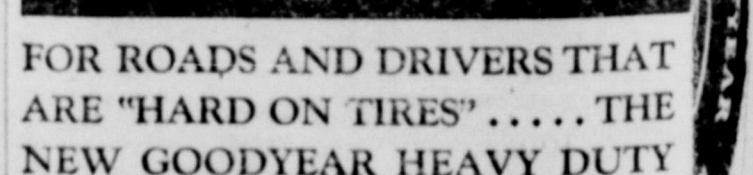
