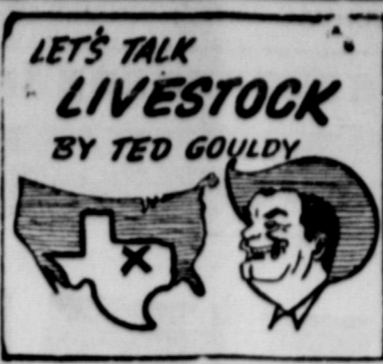

### CATTLE FEEL EFFECTS OF NATION'S HEAT WAVE

FORT WORTH — The high temperatures that have gripped large portions of the country had an adverse effect on cattle trade Monday. Stocker and feeder interests at out-of-state points, especially in sections of the Cornbelt that have been sizzling under 100-degree plus temperatures, reported movement of stockers to the country very slow.

The blistering heat was causing some concern as to the corn crop prospects in some important areas and forage definitely deteriorated badly in many sections where Texas cattle are shipped every summer.

The better kinds of calves sold at \$16 to \$18 at Fort Worth Monday and yearlings around \$15 to \$17.50 on the good kinds but order buyers reported sales slow out of second hands and shipping orders were behind a week ago with most dealers.

Canners, cutters and bulls fared well and drew generally steady prices, some cutter cows selling to better advantage than at last week's close. Fat cows were weak to lower as all packers exhibited a marked aversion to follow.

Fat cattle were generally steady. I. S. Scott, Castro County, marketed a load of choice steer yearlings at \$21.50 and Marvin Beauchamp, Moore County, cashed two loads of good and choice heifers at \$20.50 that averaged 752 pounds. Beauchamp reported these heifers weighed 775 pounds prior to shipment—and he said had he sold them at home and taken a three per cent shrink, it would have made pay weights 751 pounds against the 752 they weighed at market. John Butterly, Oklahoma, had two loads of steers at \$19.25 and Roscoe Edwards, Montague County, sold two loads at 1,139 pounds at \$20. The Garner steers from Coleman County, drew \$20.25 and Leslie Fry, Burnett, had some

fat heifers at \$21, with a few out.

### HOGS STEADY, WHILE SOWS SELL LOWER

Top grade hogs sold at \$24.25 at Fort Worth Monday, steady with the close of last week. Sows were 5 cents to \$1 lower, selling at \$14 to \$18.50.

Les desirable hogs either from a weight factor, or from their lack of finish or undesirable meat types, sold from \$21 to \$24. Typical of the good hogs was a load averaging 251 pounds from Arlington State College, Arlington. These hogs brought \$24.25, the extrem top being a little heavy.

We are in no position to say whether their stay at Arlington State and subsequent exposure to some higher learning made them more attractive to the buyers. At any rate, like most Arlington State products, they were first class!

### STEADY PRICES PREVAIL ON SHEEP AND HOGS

The sheep and lambs were considered somewhat less attractive from the standpoint of quality on Monday, and as was the case with all livestock that day, they took on universally liberal amounts of alfalfa and water. Prices were considered fully steady on all kinds.

Good and choice fat lambs cashed at \$17 to \$19, and were quotable above that range slightly. Common and medium kinds cashed at \$10 to \$15 and culls sold around \$8 to \$10. Medium and good kinds of stockers and feeders drew \$12 to \$15, a few good to choice feeders to \$15.50. Slaughter yearlings earned \$9 to \$12.50 and slaughter muttons of the aged variety sold from \$6 to \$9. Slaughter ewes again sold around the \$3 to \$4 range and old bucks crossed the scales at mostly \$3.

### ANGUS FEEDER SALE SET FOR SEPT. 3

The Texas Aberdeen-Angus Association will stage a feeder and stocker calf sale at Fort Worth Livestock Market Sept. 3. The offerings will include loads, half-loads and numerous smaller lots. Glen Toie, secretary of the Association, says that there will be many good club calf prospect in the smaller lots.

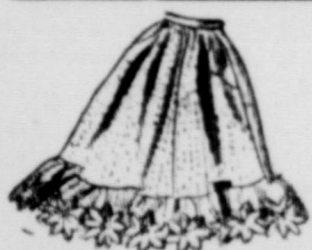

### News From The U. S. Congress

Congressman Frank Ikard

This week the House passed the following Resolution: "Resolved, That the House of Representatives reiterates its opposition to the seating of the Communist regime in China as the representative of China in the United Nations or any of its specialized agencies and supports the President in his expressed determination to use all means to prevent such representation."

It is hoped that the effect of this Resolution will make it clear that the House does not favor a procedure which would let Red China force its way into the United Nations by aggression. If the United Nations is to remain effective at all, it certainly cannot be subjected to the pressure of outlaw nations that would force themselves into membership by aggression and war.

The Committee on Government Operations, of which I am a member, is at this time holding hearings on several different bills that would prevent the government from continuing to operate businesses that are competitive with private firms and would also prevent it from going

into any new enterprises that are not absolutely necessary for the National defense. It would be surprising to know just how many businesses that the Government operates which are competitive with private business. Even though these hearings come extremely late in the session, I hope that we may be able to report some constructive legislation in this field and get it enacted into law before adjournment.

Even though the leadership of both parties still say that we will probably adjourn by the 1st of August, as this date grows nearer and you think of the fact that the Congress still has finally to act upon the agriculture program, social security, a tax bill, and many other pieces of major legislation, it becomes more improbable that adjournment will come by that date.

The Administration's proposal for a so-called "health reinsurance plan" was recently defeated by a margin of over 100 votes. I voted against the bill because I felt that the bill within itself was ineffectual and would not really accomplish anything. Also it would have created just one more bureau and would have been a movement on the part of the Federal Government to get into the field of health, and I feel that there is little doubt that once they get into that field, the next step would be to move into a generally government controlled health plan which would not be desirable.

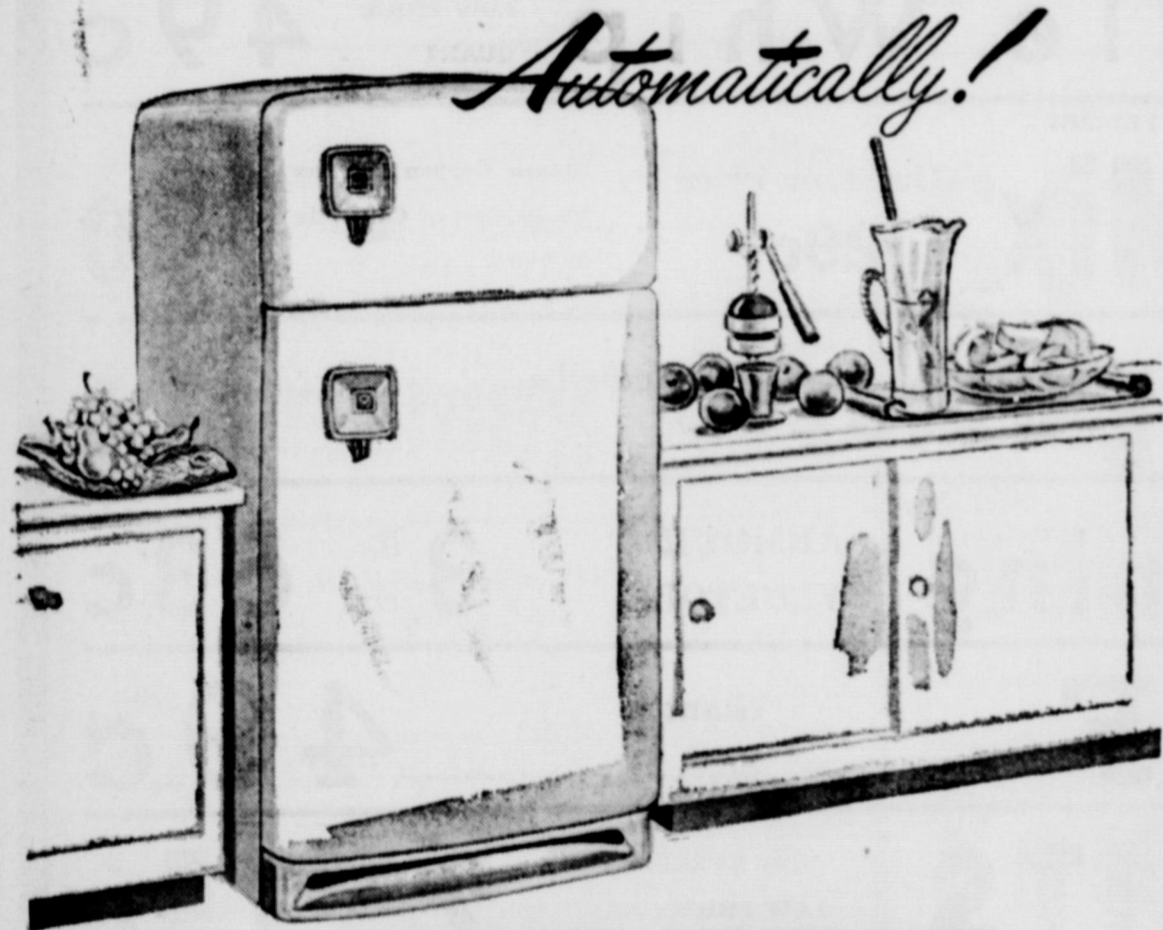

## Program To Save Lives On Highways Is Summer's Goal

Captain K. B. Hallmark, Jr., Commanding the Wichita Falls District of Texas Highway Patrol, has announced the recent signing of a joint declaration of war on traffic deaths by the governors of 24 northeastern and southern states, including Governor Allan Shivers of Texas.

Designed to curb the normal summertime rise in highway fatalities brought on by greatly increased vacation travel, the safety program—designated as a "SLOW DOWN AND LIVE" campaign—started on Memorial Day and will extend through the Labor Day week end.

The joint declaration, which was signed by Governor Shivers and the other state heads from Maine to Texas, says in part: "We are convinced that the many courteous, cautious drivers suffer at the hands of those who are obsessed with the 'in-a-hurry' complex. This state of mind manifests itself in excessive speeds, in speed too fast for conditions, in following too closely, in failing to yield the right of way and in improper passing."

Captain Hallmark said that the sole purpose of the program is the saving of lives on the highway. "We are determined," he stated, "to achieve this end

through stepped-up enforcement of the traffic laws which have been designed and enacted for just that purpose."

"Residents and visiting drivers alike," Hallmark said, "have been put on notice that the states participating in this program intend to make their highways safer for all who use them during this vacation season. It remains for the individual driver to change his own bad driving habits and to make 'SLOW DOWN AND LIVE' the 1954 watchword of the highways."

Hallmark further says, "in carrying out the above order in the 12 North Texas counties comprising District 16 of the Texas Highway Patrol, the patrolmen in this district in June filed 25% more speeding cases than in May and warned 21% more speeders than in May of this year. I have called on these patrolmen for even more effort towards curbing speeders during the remainder of the summer months."

"The traffic situation and our attempts to control traffic and prevent deaths is no game to any member of the Highway Patrol and speeders cannot expect us to show ourselves and

give them a chance to slow down. We believe that the speeder on our highways today is a potential killer and we will gauge our attempts to apprehend this, "Traffic Criminal" accordingly. I have instructed my men to use every ruse they know to attempt to apprehend those people who are potential killers and if one of my patrolmen can go to court and prove that the driver of a car was speeding that speeder can get no sympathy from me by claiming that the method used to catch him was 'unfair'. As far as I concerned nothing is unfair to catch a speeder as long as the officer stays within his legal bounds apprehending him.

We have very few men in this district (all too few) to attempt to stop speeding, but we are going to continue to try to make speeding unpopular and unprofitable to those whom we apprehend. Yes, 'SLOW DOWN AND LIVE AND SAVE MONEY.'"

## Knox Prairie Philosopher Comes Out With Solution To Problem Of Flexible On The Rigid Price Supports

Edleor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek has what some people may call a hair-brained idea this week, but that's his lookout, not ours.

Dear Editor: As everybody interested in farming knows, there is a big argument going on in Washington over price supports. One side wants flexible or lower supports, the other side wants rigid or higher supports.

As I understand it, this argument has been going on ever since somebody thought up the idea of a farm program and the way it looks to me it never will be settled at the rate we're going. Every year the argument



comes up again, and it will continue as long as a farmer finds he can't make a profit selling for less than it costs to produce and politicians find there's votes in such a situation.

I have been thinking this situ-

ation over for a long time and have hit on an idea that ought to satisfy everybody.

One group for example says it's wrong to guarantee a price for farm products, and in this country a man is entitled to his beliefs. The other group says it's not wrong, it's right to be able to know when you plant what price you'll get when you harvest, and they're entitled to their belief, too.

Therefore, what Washington ought to do is establish two Departments of Agriculture, one favoring price supports, the other opposed.

Every year let the farmer decide along about the first of January which Department he will want to operate under for that year.

If he chooses the price support division he can sell under that system. Any farmer who thinks it's wrong to get a guaranteed price, he'll join up with the Department of Agriculture No. 2. Any farmer who thinks the other way, he'll join up with Department No. 1. This will give freedom of thought and action to everybody.

I haven't worked out all the marketing details, that'll come later, but the thing I'm working on now is the question of price supports out of politics.

Since some Republicans are in favor of supports, some opposed, some Democrats are in favor, others opposed, the two Departments won't necessarily follow party lines, and whatever administration is in charge will still have the privilege of appointing both Secretaries of Agriculture, however you want to put it.

This country is too big to have everybody thinking alike. Let's

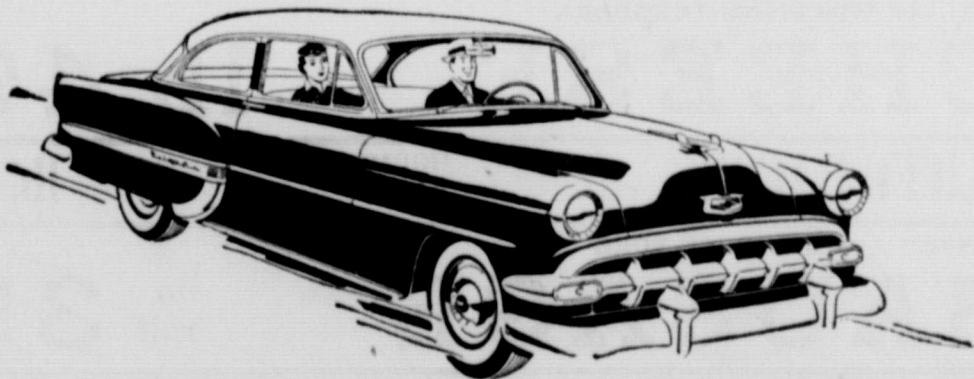

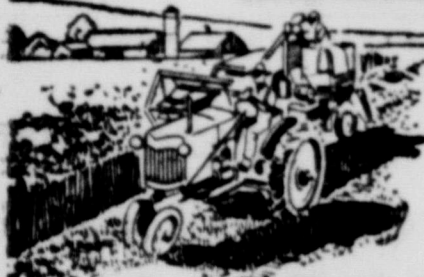
