

WATCHING THE PENNIES

In a recent forecast of business conditions to come Robert Babson wrote: "With purchasing power holding well, demand for food products and soft goods will remain at a brisk pace. The public, however, have learned something about watching their pennies. They have become more price -conscious." Mr. Babson then predicted that the best sales records during the last half of this year will be made by the low-cost mass distributors, including the food and variety chain sys-

The recent experience of retailers as a whole has been interesting and significant. Dollar volume has been somewhat down, as compared with equivalent periods a year before. But the physical volume of goods moved has been heavy, and in some fields has shown an increase. This is a tribute to the aggressiveness and adaptability of retailers. They've fully recognized the obvious fact that competition is much tougher now than at any time since the last world war. And they have offered the choosy consumer more attractions and inducements in many forms-lower price, better quality, more varied stocks, new items, and so on.

Over the months and years to come, the state of the nation's economic health will be determined in large part by what goes on in retailing. The factories wouldn't maintain their production and employment long if the goods didn't flow across store counters into the hands of the ultimate consumer. It is pleasant to report that almost all the economists, like Mr. Babson, are optimistic as to retailing's future prospects.

The head of the world's largest department store recently observed that the day of the dictatorial, table-thumping boss is gone. Commenting on this, the Tribune, of Medford, Mass., said: "The true executive defines the personality of his business and imbues with it all who have a part in shaping that personality. He is a leader, not a

A retailer who tried to run his establishment like a slave-labor camp today would soon find himself out of help. And he'd soon find himself out of customers, too-for friendly, intelligent training and direction, not brow-beating, develops the efficient and productive type of employe every store needs in our competitive commercial world.

MASS-DISTRIBUTION IN ACTION

A wealth of evidence proves that retail competition has become intensely competitive, and that retailers of all kinds and sizes are wooing the consumer with the utmost ardor.

An interesting example is found in a Wall Street Journal news story. Traditionally, retail business lags during the summer, especially in areas where the weather is hot and humid. This year merchants in New York, Chicago, Detroit and elsewhere are going to extraordinary efforts to boost summer sales. Promotion is being stepped up, bargains are being advertised, prizes and premiums are being offered, and so on.

The time has passed when all a merchant had to do was open his doors, sit back, and wait for an eager public to rush in and empty his shelves.
