#### AN INFERIOR POSITION INTHE WORLD

At the end of June, the Soviet Council of Ministers announced that the world's "first electric station utilizing atomic energy" was in operation somewhere in Russia. Press reports indicate that it s a working pilot model.

As a result, Chairman Cole of the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee emphasized the wegent need for a new atomic energy bill which will open the way to private industry to develop peacetime power from nuclear sources. If Congress adjourns without passing such legislation, Repreentative Cole said, "It will mean we are deliberately exposing ourselves to an inferior position in the world. . . .

It now remains to be seen whether that small group in Congress which wants an iron-clad goveroment monopoly of pea time atomic development, and is determined to exclude private enterprise by hook or crook, can block this vital legislation-legislation which has been endorsed by the President, present and past AEC officials, top physicists and egineers, and so on. Few development could make our enemies behind the tron curtain happier. For, in the long-run world struggle, leadership in atomic development as a source of industrial energy can be as important as leadership in the creation of atomic weapons.

The bill permitting private enterprise entry into the field has been approved, 18 to zero, by the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy. It should be made law at once.

#### THE AVERAGE STOCKHOLDER

One of our biggest manufacturing companies recently made a survey of its stockholders. It found that 56 per cent of them had incomes of less than \$5,000 a year—and that only 10 per cent had incomes above \$25,000. The average income of that 56 per cent was a little less than \$2,800.

In all probability, the situation in any large company would be about the same. It's certainly time we abandoned the totally false ideas that stock ownership is practically the exclusive privilage and perogative of the rich-and that the mings of industry are distributed among the wealthy few.

Congressman Frank Ikard

It now is almost a certainty for allowing me the opportunity that Congress will not adjourn to serve them as their Congressbefore some time around the man for another term and to middle of August.
