### THERE'S ALWAYS A CHANCE

An old story tells of a salesman who attempted to sell a farmer a set of books on how to farm successfully. The farmer turned him down, saying, "I ain't farming half as well now as I know how!"

Be that as it may, farmers and ranchers are operating farms more efficiently and successfully than they used to, due both to work of their own, and to assistance and knowledge provided by organizations which have to do with the production and sale of farm products in one way or another.

An official of the Department of Agriculture has described improvements that have taken place in beef cattle production. Seventy years ago it took four and often five years for a longhorn to reach a weight of 1,000 pounds—now it happens in less than half that time. In 1953, fewer than 1,000 beef carcasses were condemned during inspection because of tuberculosis—25 or 30 years ago the number of condemnations ran from 50,000 to 70,000 animals.

Believe it or not, the atom may even affect the meat business of the future. "Pasteurization" of meat through exposure to gamma rays has been accomplished on a laboratory scale of the American Meat Institute Foundation. The studies, which were supported in part by AEC, have shown that shelf life of pre-packaged meats may be extended five-fold by radiation doses with little, if any, production of off-flavors, odors, or discolorations. This process is not ready for practical use and many difficult scientific problems must be ironed out. But it may be an indication of things to come.

In agriculture, as in any enterprise, change is always going on, to the benefit of all.

### THE KEY

"Medicine has bloomed under the beneficent warmth of freedom," said Dr. Walter B. Martin, the new president of the American Medical Association, in his inaugural address. "It has bloomed and borne fruit as witnessed by the great advances in the last fifty years in the science of medicine and its application to the prevention and control of disease."

In that half century diseases that once scourged mankind have been conquered. Child-bearing has been freed of most of its dangers, and the death rate from childbirth is now less than one in 1,000. In every field of medicine, curative and preventive alike, there has been striking progress—as is evidenced by the fact that 20 years have been added to the span of human life in this country.

Now, as Dr. Martin also pointed out, the emphasis of medicine is shifting. Here he made this significant statement: "More and more we are concerned with the chronic and degenerative diseases of an aging population. The genius of medicine as expressed through research, teaching prevention and treatment prolonged life to such an extent as to create these problems in their present magnitude. The same genius if left unhampered to operate in a free society can also solve these new problems."

In medicine, as in all other professions and enterprises, freedom is the key that opens the door of achievement.

### GOVERNMENT CAN'T "GIVE" ANYTHING

The Dawson, Minnesota, Sentinel, speaking editorially, said this: "It is about time that the average American citizen does some hard-headed thinking tax-wise. If we want tax reduction, we will have to demand less from government and again start doing things for ourselves on the local level."

That certainly is incontestable, and it should be as apparent as sunshine to everyone. Yet years of reckless spending conditioned many people to the insane idea that government can "give" us all manner of things, from community swimming pools to old-age security. Actually, government can only spend what it first borrows or takes from us in taxes—and we always get back less than we are forced to contribute.

## ONE BIBLE FAITH

### What is the One Faith?

The faith of God's word is the "ONE FAITH." When Abraham believed what God told him, it is said that he "Believed God." (Gen. 15:1-6.) "For what saith the scripture? Abraham believed God, and it was counted unto him for righteousness." (Rom. 4:3.) "Was not Abraham our father justified by works, when he had offered Isaac his son upon the altar? Seest thou how faith wrought with his work, and by works was faith made perfect? And the scripture was fulfilled which saith, Abraham BELIEVED GOD, and it was imputed to him for righteousness; and he was called the friend of God." James 2:21-24.) believing God is believing that all things will be even as God hath said they will be. (Acts 27:25.) The "ONE FAITH" comes by hearing the word of God. (Rom. 10:17.)

Molly Bailey's Circus! Maybe you've heard your father and mother or your grandparents tell about attending this famous show. In the Front Enterprise some years ago, Mike Campbell wrote about Molly Bailey and her circus:

Born in Arkansas many years before the Civil War, she grew into womanhood there and shortly after her husband marched away with the boys in gray, Molly herself became a Confederate spy. It was not, however, until after the war that Molly Bailey, known throughout Texas as "Aunt Molly," went into the circus business and by that time she was a widow with several sons who performed in her show. For almost 50 years "Aunt Molly" and her circus toured Texas, and in all but one or two of these years, she moved her show on wagons drawn by draft horses.

A woman of very keen business judgment, "Aunt Molly" literally ran her show from "top to bottom." She did all the hiring. She did all the firing. She handled all the money, the buying, the routing—and everything else that was done in the managerial line. However, she was not a performer herself. Oldtimers who remember

"Aunt Molly" will recall that she never forgot a face or a name and that her routine, when she entered a town, never varied from year to year.

She had a small show; she played only "one night stands", in small towns and she "back-tracked" year after year, appearing in the same communities. As a result, her acquaintance was wide and people had a universal respect for her.

Mrs. Bailey wasn't stingy, but she was thrifty. Yet she didn't make money her principal goal. Throughout the almost half-century of her circus business, she kept her prices at a minimum and no visitor to her lot was ever "gypped" by "grifters" who in those days, leached on almost every circus in the land.

A woman of great honesty and high moral principles, she kept her show and its personnel absolutely clean.

"When 'Aunt Molly' reached a town in which she was showing, she left the lot as soon as equipment was landed there and made a "sashay" through the business district.

She called at every business house and the owner and employees were glad to see her. She was "Aunt Molly" to all of them; they were "Bill" and "Jim" and "Joe" to her. She made purchases at every business place, if no more than an apple at the grocery store and a spool of thread at the dry goods establishment. She inquired of every family from grandpa to the children and she was a regular Walter Winchell when it came to keeping track of new arrivals both past and future. Because she was so popular,

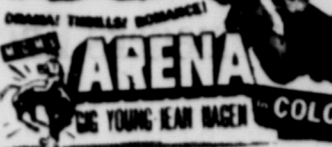

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## News From The U. S. Congress

Congressman Frank Ikard

There is action taken in Congress on many bills that we never hear much about in the paper. It seems as though most of the comments on Congressional action are made concerning taxes, defense, agriculture, or foreign affairs. Some of the things that have been done in other fields so far during this session deal with the matter of governmental reorganization. Several changes have been made by the President under the provisions of the Reorganization Act of 1949 which permit him to submit to Congress certain organizational changes within the Executive Branch, if not objected to within a specific time, automatically become law.

First of these recommendations to take effect was the creation of a new department of government called Health, Education, and Welfare, headed by a secretary who is a member of the President's cabinet. This department replaced the old Federal Security Agency and became effective April 11, 1953.

In June of last year the Department of Defense was reorganized. The purpose of this reorganization was to improve the machinery of military planning for our national security by strengthening the civilian control over the military. This plan provided for six new assistant secretaries of defense, bringing the total assistant secretaries to eleven. At this time there is a bill pending which would create six more additional secretaries, two for each of the three services.

Last August the Foreign Operations Administration was set up. This Administration has control over many programs which were previously spread through several agencies of the government. This new administration is set up by a Director, Deputy Director, and six assistants.

The Congress also extended the President's authority to fix allocations and priorities for defense materials and to grant defense loans and subsidies. Another important item in conjunction with our national defense has been the approval of the Military Works Program which deals with our bases both overseas and in this country.

The emergency authority for the Civil Defense Administration which would have expired the last day of June of this year was repealed, and the National Civil Defense set-up was strengthened by allowing the District of Columbia to enter into civil defense contracts.

In action that was not contested, the Congress adopted the insertion of the words, "under God", in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

The Congress also established an Air Force Academy which has been located near Colorado Springs, Colorado. The first class of this Academy is to enter in July of 1955.

A new Federal Aid Highway Program was adopted which authorized a total of almost a billion dollars for highway construction during 1956 and '57.

These are just a few of the things that I thought might be of interest that have been considered by the Congress that have not always made the headlines. Of course, there have been many more which there is not room to mention here.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 2a of Article VI and by amending Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof, who are otherwise qualified electors, and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the county in which the voter resided at the time of entering such service, providing for submission of the proposed amendment to the qualified electors, providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be repealed and that Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to wit:

"First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

"Second: Idiots and lunatics.

"Third: All paupers supported by any county.

"Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislature may make.

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37** proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section to be designated Section 51g, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended, providing the Legislature may appropriate funds for the purpose of carrying out such agreements and may authorize the obligations necessary to obtain such coverage, prescribing the form of the ballot, providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

**RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 51f, to be designated Section 51g, to read as follows:

"Section 51g. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended. The Legislature shall have the power to make appropriations and authorize all obligations necessary to the establishment of such Social Security coverage program."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine and each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State

and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-executing without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of Texas so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof, who are otherwise qualified electors, and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the county in which the voter resided at the time of entering such service; and for the repeal of Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution, which now permits qualified electors in military service to vote without payment of a poll tax in time of war."

"AGAINST the amendment of Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of Texas so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof, who are otherwise qualified electors, and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the county in which the voter resided at the time of entering such service; and for the repeal of Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution, which now permits qualified electors in military service to vote without payment of a poll tax in time of war."

Sec. 5. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

## Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Henry A. Holle, M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

It took just three and one-half hours for the state disaster relief organization, operating through its control center in the bomb-proof basement of the new Department of Public Safety building in Austin, to assemble a complete 60-bed hospital set-up and arrange for airlifting it to Piedras Negras, Mexico, the border town so tragically stricken during the late-June flood disaster on the Rio Grande.

Word of the need was received at the control center about 7 p. m., June 30. By 10:30 p. m. the last item had been located and slated for airlifting via U. S. Air Force planes.

It began with a telephone call from Eagle Pass, Texas, to the desk of the health department representative at the control center. The caller reported a wave of heat stroke and diarrhea, created by exertion of salvage work in the death-like calm and extreme humidity which followed in the wake of a 22-inch rain.

Needed immediately were beds, mattresses, linens, solutions of salts and nutrients to replace salt and body fluids lost to perspiration, vomiting, and diarrhea. Sulfathiazole, needed as a treatment drug; typhoid vaccine for a vaccination program; and tubes, needles and various accessories were also requested.

Dr. T. E. Todd, State Department of Health representative on the control center staff, immediately contacted the State Health Department Biologics Division, where a shipment of individual typhoid shots was readied.

Being the only physician present, Dr. Todd estimated amounts of intravenous fluids needed and decided on types to be sent. He recommended that in addition to the sulfathiazole, injectable slow-absorbable penicillin and a generous supply of the newer antibiotics be included. The penicillin was to be used for children and adult vomiting cases.

His recommendations were relayed across the table to Marvin R. Warren, Federal Civil Defense Administration representative, who got them from a civil de-

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting the Governor, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and the Secretary of State, providing that such salary shall not be fixed in an amount less than that provided in the Constitution on January 1, 1953, fixing the per diem of the members of the Legislature at \$25.00 per day for 120 days only, providing for the submission of this Resolution to a vote of the people, and directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 3 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 3. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture."  
Sec. 2. That Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified, and shall receive the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."  
Sec. 3. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office shall each hold office for the term of two years and until his successor is qualified, receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, reside at the Capitol of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive for their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for services performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."  
Sec. 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14** proposing an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the qualifications for grand and petit jurors shall not be denied or abridged by reason of sex, providing for an election for the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 19 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereinafter to read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualifications of grand and petit jurors, provided that neither the right nor the duty to serve on grand and petit juries shall be denied or abridged by reason of sex. Whenever in the Constitution the terms 'men' are used in reference to grand or petit juries, such term shall include persons of the female sex as well as the male sex."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon, or in counties using voting machines, such machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to require women to serve on juries."  
Each voter shall cast his vote for or against such Constitutional Amendment either by marking out one of said clauses on the ballot and leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, or by placing an 'X' in an appropriate blank by the side of the clause on the ballot expressing his vote. This latter method to be used in all instances where voting machines are used and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the voters are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have notice of same published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws, and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and when required, lay the same and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or other House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."  
Sec. 4. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto which shall read as follows:

"Section 4. The Legislature shall not fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office or Secretary of State at a sum less than that fixed for such officials in the Constitution on January 1, 1953."  
Sec. 5. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per day for the first 120 days only of each session of the legislature. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session."  
Sec. 6. Said proposed Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendments shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendments to the State Constitution providing that the salaries of the Governor, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the State Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and the Secretary of State, be fixed by the Legislature, and that the per diem of the members of the Legislature be fixed at twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per day for 120 days only."  
And those voters opposing said proposed Amendments shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendments to the State Constitution providing that the salaries of the Governor, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the State Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and the Secretary of State, be fixed by the Legislature, and that the per diem of the members of the Legislature be fixed at twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per day for 120 days only."  
If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendments, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 7. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby authorized to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.


