Non-Clogging Gutters

SIMPLE, inexpensive way to keep leaves from clogging your gutters and getting into the downspouts and drainage system is to install some small rolls of half-inch galvanized mesh wire. Buy a piece 30 or 36 inches wide


and cut it into pieces 6 inches by 9 inches. Each is rolled into a little



cylinder until the edges touch. Fasten the edges together with copper wire, hairpins or small pieces of non-rusting electric wire, says Family Handyman.







Repanel Old Door

DON'T discard a door just because the wood is dented and battered beyond repair! It can be salvaged without great trouble or

Place the door on saw horses and remove the hardware. If it is a panel door, cut some vents in the top, bottom and center cross-pieces. Now lay across the door a panel of Masonite 12" Tempered Presd-



wood and fasten it with temporary brads so that it is flush with one

side and end. Then saw off the excess at the side of the door, so that the Tempered Presdwood is even with the door edge all around. Lightly bevel the exposed edges of the hardboard with a file or sandblock.

Next, turn the panel over and apply waterproof adhesive. Then fit it to the door and apply several brads to hold it firmly while it sets. The same procedure is followed with the other side. Prime and paint the door to match or contrast with the room's decor. Refit the hardware and the door jamb and rehang the door.





Sides should be dressed lumber, white pine or poplar. Slides for the trays may be cut with a dado saw, spacing the $\frac{1}{18}$ " slots about $2\frac{1}{2}$ " apart. To form the rest of the



cookie bin, nail or screw Masonite 1/8" Tempered Presdwood to the top, bottom and back. The slides are made of the same smooth, longwearing material, which does not retain odors and is easily kept

At the front of each slide attach a piece of half-inch wood, on edge, with screws. Have each "lip" extend to the extreme on either side and fit snugly against the bottom of the slide immediately above. This provides a practically air-tight cover for each slide. Attach a pull to each. Attach a similar piece of wood to the opposite end of each slide to prevent cookies from spill-

To assure a first-rate joint where the top and back meet, place a length of wood one inch square inside and fasten the Tempered Presdwood to it.





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

Laying hens need 13 to 14 hours of light daily to keep up top egg production, says John H. Quisenberry, head of the poultry department at Texas A. & M.

One 40-watt bulb for each 200 square feet of floor space is sufficient. Shallow reflectors make the lights more effective. Start using light now, he says, and increase the lighting period as the days become shorter. Perches, feed hoppers and water troughs should be lighted, too.

Quisenberry recommends early morning lights. All night lights are satisfactiry, he adds, but egg production is not increased after 14 hours.
