





Weekly Health LETTER Issued by Henry A. Holle, M. D., State Health Officer

AUSTIN-This is the time of the year that usually marks an increase in the incidence of whooping cough. Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, said today that strenuous efforts should be made to control the spread of this debilitating childhood disease.

"The only source from which whooping cough may be contracted is'another case of whooping cough, and isolation of cases must be universally practiced to prevent its spread," Dr. Holle stated.

"The infectious agent or germ of whooping cough is transmitted by droplets expelled in coughing, sneezing, or speaking," he declared. "The discharges from the nose and throat are dangerous; the need for early recognition and careful isolation of

whooping cough is obvious." The first sign of this disease persists night and day and tends to become increasingly severe. This disease is fully developed when vomiting of food and whooping accompany the parox-xysm of cough. Dr. Holle stressed the fact that children who have whooping cough should not

attend school or come in contact with other children, until three weeks after the appearance of typical signs of the disease. "Prevention and control of
