With the approach of winter livestock producers should be thinking about a supply of roughage-and plenty of it-if you do not have a good supply on hand, it can be bought cheaper now than if you wait until later in the winter.

Roughage in some form should be available to livestock at all times. This doesn't necessarily up good blocking and went 75 mean it must be of the highest quality, but the higher the feeding value the better.

Roughage very low in nutritive value can be fed with success had recovered a Mough fumble if adequate supplement, about two pounds of cottonseed meal, is supplied each day. Cotton burrs, hulls and oat straw fall into this category.

WHAT FIXES GASOLINE PRICES?

How are the prices of oil products established? Who or what is responsible for them. Is the job done by human dictate or by some other force? The head of a mid-western oil company has answered those questions, using the oil indus-

try's most-widely used product, gasoline, as the example. He said, "It does not lie within the power of this or any other oil company to determine gasoline prices. Prices are made by markets, and all oil companies competing for a given market are under the same economic pressures. These eco-

fluctuations in the price of gasoline at the pump." If a company tries to sell at a price which is too high, he continued, "business will be lost to its competitors. If too low to cover costs of finding, transporting and refining the oil, the company cannot stay in business except at ruiuous loss.'

Then he observed that his own company had recently made a substantial cut in its gasoline prices at service stations—a cut which may cost it several million dollars. It took steps because it had to in order to meet the competiton-and because competitive forces had created a down cycle in the price swing.

Price changes, whether up or down, reflect the natural and irresistable forces of supply and demand in a free competitive economy.

NO SUBSTITUTE FOR GOOD MONEY

A study made by the National Association of Manufacturers of the colts of living and the purchasing power of the dollar contains food for serious thought.

Between the first of 1953 and July, 1954, the consumers price index increased only 1.5 per cent and the purchasing power of the dollar declined only 1.1 cents. In the two prior years, by contrast, the cost of living rose 10.4 per cent and the dollar's value shrank by 9.2 cents. The study states, "The leveling off of prices occurred after the discontinuation of price controls, while during price control, the cost of living kept climbing."

In short, when producers and retailers got back on an open competitive basis, free of governmental dictation, prices virtually stabilized after years of steady inflation. What will the adwocates of the controls say to that fact?

WELL-BEING OF NATION AT STAKE

Nation's Business recently summarized the coal situation, as it exists now and as it is expected to be in the future. The conclusions reached certainly show how difficult and serious the coal problem is.

Coal's long range future, says the magazine, is bright-output and demand probably will double in 20 years. But, it continues, "the present is dark." This year's bituminous production will be less than that of 1907. Mining employment is now below the 1890 figuure. Some 2400 soft coal mines have closed in the past three years.

It is obvious that if coal is to be capable of doubling production in 20 years, it must be a progressive, profit-making going concern in the meantime. It is equally obvious that skilled miners can't wait years for jobs to open up-and that if coal continues in a state of depression, young men won't enter mining in sufficient num-

The coal industry, the other basic industries which require coal, and government experts-all are searching for solutions to this dilemma. Success is vital to the security and well-being of the whole country.

GIVE \$50,000 TO YOUR CHURCH
