Munday Country Is Drenched By Heavy Rain For Three Days

Rain began falling here at an early hour Saturday morning and continued to fall almost continuously until late Monday afternoon, during which time the precipitation here amounted to 4.16 inches, according to the rain-gauge maintained by A. E. Whittemore. Falling slowly every particle of it went into the ground and it is said that the ground is wetter than it has been during the past four years, and will prove of great benefit to the farmers in permitting the sowing of winter wheat, oats and other small grains for pasturage and harvest.

Little damage is reported to cotton as most of the farmers were fairly close up on their picking as there was no wind at any time during the rain the damage was very small and the good that will come from the good season will far offset any damage that might have resulted to the cotton in the fields at this time.

Haskell Fair Boosters To Visit Munday Early Today

A delegation of Haskell boosters, accompanied by the Haskell Municipal Band, will visit Munday at 8:45 o'clock Friday morning, and will remain in the city about thirty minutes. The trip is being sponsored by the Haskell Lions Club and the big purpose of their visit here is to extend to the Munday folks a hearty invitation to attend the Haskell County Fair, which is to be held in that city October 16-17-18.

Abilene Pastor Plans Withdrawal From All Worldly Activities

Abilene, Oct. 8.—Dr. E. D. Salckel, pastor of the First Christian Church of Abilene for the past six and one-half years, announced today he was withdrawing himself from all worldly activities and said "from now on I will give my entire time to an attempt to develop a purely spiritual life."

He canceled his memberships in the Kiwanis Club, American Legion and Masonic bodies, including the Shrine and Knights Templar. He had his telephone removed because he said "its incessant ringing is a distraction with most of the calls unimportant and dealing with matters outside of my church."

"I have discovered," he said, in a statement, "that a preacher to work at his trade should give more time to study, preaching and pastoral calling and less to mere organizations and being a 'man about town.' The modern church is hopelessly over-organized and pitifully excited about matters extraneous to the kingdom of God.

"That is one reason why the quality of preachers has been deteriorating. They know increasingly by more about secular politics and budgets and drives but increasingly less about Christ. The average preacher has become the promoter of denominational organizations, highly organized and competing against one another. In my opinion the church and the kingdom of God are not synonymous. We have been emphasizing the church as an organization far too much and to that extent have departed from true Christianity. Christ was not interested in mere churches, Salvation is the reward or result of one's life and does not come by observance to mere forms, rites or ceremonies.

"My deepest instincts tell me a preacher is better off if he abstains from activity in politics, and my conviction in this respect is all the deeper in the light of my own past activities as an attempted political leader, in which I consumed time belonging to my

Many Attractions On Card of Haskell Co. Fair, Oct. 16-18th

Haskell, Texas, Oct. 3. — The outlook for the Seventh Annual Haskell County Fair to be held October 16, 17 and 18, is most promising with two more communities exhibiting than any previous fair. All space in the agricultural building has been allotted and the management is enlarging the poultry building to take care of the many additional pens of birds that have never competed before at this show. The Association is at this time planning the building of an additional brick building for next year, which is to be known as the Woman's Building which will house art, textile, culinary, curio and home demonstration departments. The entertainment features this year are to excel anything ever yet attempted by the association and will be a most diversified one, which includes a Coronation and Pageant, fireworks, rodeo, horse races, Indian ball games and bull fights intermingled with high class vaudeville and a change of their program daily.

Haskell Indians Break Moguls Winning Streak

Yes, folks, it was the greatest football game the Moguls have played in history. The Munday boys fought hard, played a good game and deserve praise. As one Haskell fan said, calling a certain Mogul's name, "that boy is a real sport, the best I have ever seen." The one speaking had a brother on the Haskell team. Just such games as last Friday puts a friendly feeling between two towns because the sportsmanship shown was great and the boys have won a victory after all even though they received the small end of the score.

To point out an individual star would be a difficult task, but in casting their eyes over the Mogul team one could not help but notice such men as Holder, Pruitt and Rayburn. Rex was hitting the Indians hard, fast and low and demonstrated to local fans that he is a real football player. Pruitt as usual, was performing nicely on the offense and in handling his teammates at quarterback, and a few times saved touchdowns being made by the Indians when he would come in from the safety position and throw them for only a small gain. John R. Rayburn, having been trained as a backfield man but at the last moment was shifted to right end, was certainly in the spotlight. Never did they gain around his end and most of the time they were thrown for losses. If space would permit I would like to mention every player and the way they performed. Certainly did the Mogul line look like a brick wall and was opening holes for the backs to travel through.

Fans, we certainly thank you for the loyal support at the game and we hope you were not disappointed in the brand of football the Moguls play. Just such support as you gave us Friday is what keeps the boys fighting every minute of the game. We invite you to be with us from now until the end of the season. Bank Notes of Sweden

Swedish bank notes offer practically insurmountable difficulties to counterfeiters, because of a secret process used in the manufacture of the bank note paper, at the present time, the Swedish riksbank, which has been in existence for more than 200 years, and is the oldest institution of its kind in the world, in 1735 purchased the munda mill for the manufacture of its bank-note paper.

Since then this paper has been manufactured by the Swedes who have passed along the secret of their craft from father to son. A number of processes, which are guarded by the strictest secrecy, are used in the making of the paper, and the bank notes are very carefully printed to avoid all possibility of forgery. Through certain chemical ingredients in the bank-note paper it can even, if burned, be identified from the ashes.

His Nom de Plume Not Original With Clemens

The name "Mark Twain" was first used by a noted Mississippi river pilot named Isiah Sellers, who used to write items for the New Orleans Picayune, in which he told of his adventures in a quality egotistical tone. The paragraphs usually began, "My opinion for the benefit of the citizens of New Orleans," they were signed "Mark Twain," which, like the parlance pilots, is a leadman's call, meaning two fathoms—twelve feet. Samuel Clemens, then a cub pilot, wrote a burlesque on Captain Sellers' articles, and published it in a rival paper over the signature "Sergeant Fathom." Sellers was so hurt by the burlesque that he never wrote another article. In 1867 Clemens was working for the Enterprise, published in Virginia City, Nev. He wanted a good pen name. While he was trying to think of a good one, he received news of the death of Sellers. This suggested to him "Mark Twain," the name Sellers once used, and he signed it first to a letter from Carson City to the Enterprise under date of February 2, 1863.

Test for Posture

An excellent test for correct posture, says Marguerite Agniet in the Parents Magazine, is to stand facing the wall in front of the thighs so that the palms point upward. Now notice which part of the body strikes the wall first. If it is the chest, well and good; if it is the head, it is not so bad, but if the stomach touches first, something is wrong. To attain correct posture stretch the arms above the head until the back is arched and the chest high. Then with elbows pulled all the way down, draw the hands down to the shoulders, head back. Now retaining the general position of the body, return the hands to the sides and you will find yourself standing perfectly. Exercises for correcting bad posture include pushing up with the arms from a reclining position and raising the trunk from the same position without lifting the feet.

Feared Census Taking

One of the deterring factors in conducting a count of the early Celts was superstition, says an article in the United States Daily.

In 1712 Governor Hunter of New York attempted an enumeration, but it was so inaccurate that he apologized to the home government and said that the inaccuracy was due to the superstition among the people that sickness had followed the last enumeration. Being so close to the New England colonists, these early settlers likened the enumeration to the sin that David committed in numbering the people, and they feared it might bring on the same judgment.

Origin of "Blue Blood"

Although blood has never been blue, the term "blue blood" has denoted aristocracy for more than 400 years. Shelves the Golden Book Magazine, which explains the origin of the term.

"Those who claim aristocratic descent have 'blue blood' in their veins, which is meant to be complimentary in a manner of speaking. The expression comes from Spain where, after the expulsion of the Moors, who were dark skinned, people with light skins claimed pure descent from ancestors who lived before the Moorish conquests. The light skins permitted the blue veins to show more vividly."

Dandy French Musketeers

A musketeer is a soldier armed with a musket, an instrument of earlier times, but the word is specifically applied to a company of gentlemen who were a mounted guard in the service of the kings of France from 1601 down to the time of the revolution. They were clad in scarlet, hence their quarters were called the "Maison Rouge." In France they followed the king on his hunting expeditions to protect him. In war they fought either on foot or on horseback. They were dandy soldiers, who went to war with curled hair, white gloves, and perfumed like milliners.

Author of Book Retracts Attack On Catholicism

The Times has received the following communication, which we publish herewith:

Mr. Kennedy:

At the request of the author of "Thirty Years in Hell" and for the benefit of those who do not wish to remain deceived, by all means I request that you publish the following affidavit of Bernard Fresenborg.

"State of Texas.
"County of Potter.
"Know All Men by These Presents,
"That I, the undersigned Bernard Fresenborg, an ordained Roman Catholic priest of the Diocese of Belleville, Illinois, having had the misfortune to become estranged from the Catholic Church about thirty years ago and having spoken and written things derogatory to the Church and having held a pastorate in a Protestant Church for a period of one year, and
"Whereas, a certain book entitled, "Thirty Years in Hell," bearing my name as its author, containing defamatory writing against the Catholic Church and the Hierarchy has been published and circulated, and

Test for Posture

Poultry Feeding Hints

By W. E. Jones, County Agent. Laying Mash and Scratch. Laying mash with cottonseed meal.

- 20 lbs. yellow corn meal or milo meal. 20 lbs. gray shorts. 20 lbs. wheat bran. 10 lbs. meat scraps. 12 lbs. cottonseed meal. 17 lbs. finely ground oats. 1-2 lb. oyster shell. 1-2 lb. salt. Laying mash (Big 5): 20 lbs. yellow corn meal or milo meal.

For scratch use most any grain that the farm may have. If more than one kind of grain is available say, wheat, maize and corn; these mixed in equal parts will give better results than using one grain alone.

When hens are in a run-down condition and are off feed first give 1 pound salts to each 100 birds in wet mash, then each day after give the above blood meal in wet mash, also two spoonfuls of red pepper can be added.

There is another egg wash using cottonseed meal which some poultrymen prefer: 20 lbs. gray shorts. 17 lbs. wheat bran. 10 lbs. meat scraps. 12 lbs. cottonseed meal. 15 lbs. alfalfa meal. 3-2 lb. oyster shell. 1-2 lb. salt.

(Approved by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Increased profits from turkey growing as the result of co-operative marketing of the dressed fowls has proved an incentive to farmers in the North Platte irrigation district in western Nebraska.

Turkey growers realize from 50 cents to \$1 for the labor of dressing. This represents from 15 to 20 per cent of the value of the turkey, and is fully three-fifths as much as the entire feed cost of raising and fattening the birds in the North Platte district.

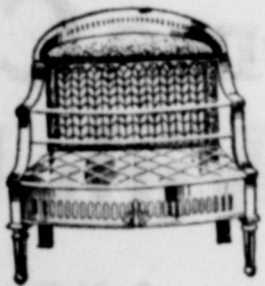
