In addition, several hundred Americans will pay for their celebration with their lives.

All this because of accidents that need not happen.

Holidays have become horror days in the United States. In recent years many holidays have brought such a high accident toll that they assume the proportions of a national catastrophe. And this carnage need not occur. Accidents are not acts of God. They are acts of humans who foolishly bet their lives for dubious rewards.

The driver who speeds to get to his destination -what difference does it make whether he arrives 10 or 20 minutes later?

The youth who attempts to swim across the lake-what is gained by trying to show off in front of a crowd?

The father who can't deny his children the "pleasure" of fireworks-what pleasure will the child derive from sightless eyes?

Motor vehicle accidents lead the list of Fourth of July hazards. According to the National Safety Council, one out of two persns now living in this country has been or will be injured in a motor vehicle accident before he dies, unless our present accident rate is greatly reduced. And many of these accidents occur on holidays, when traffic is especially heavy

Second high on the Fourth of July accident list is drowning. Falls, fireworks and sunstroke and heat exhaustion, food poisoning and miscellaneous accidents also exact their toll.

Indepdendence Day tollsare not inevitable. They can be prevented. Police departments and other officials all over the country will be alert to prerent as many accidents as possible. But as always the size of the toll depends chiefly on the good sense of every American. Take it easy on the Fourth. Don't let Independence Day make you a dependent!







Texas now has its first grain warehouse bill. And for the first time, the farmer has adequate protection for his grain and field seed held in storage by a state licensed grain warehouse.

Long needed as a protective measure for stored bulk seed, the Public Grain Warehouse bill was passed during the recent 53rd legislative session. As a result, a depositor has his commodities insured against fire, theft, misappropriation, damage due to careless handling, or acts







Lids on Cabinet Door

ROUND-KNOBBED lids of cooking utensils may be neatly stored inside a cabinet door where they will be both accessible and occupying otherwise waste space. Here are directions for making this handy storage unit:

Measure the door and obtain a piece of Masonite 1/8" Tempered Presdwood which covers the interi-



or excepting for one-half inch on all sides. If the door is paneled, there will be room between the cabinet door and the Presdwood for the knobs to fit into openings the shape of large keyholes. If the interior is one plane from one side to another, it will be necessary to install a strip of lumber about one inch thick as a perimeter.

Lay out the round-knobbed lids on the Presdwood so that their positions may be marked. With a bit quarter inch larger than the knobs. Underneath each, with a keyhole saw, complete the oversized keyhole, forming a slot into which the neck of the knob will fit. The final step is to fasten the panel to the interior of the door with finishing nails. The panel may be left unfinished or painted.






