#### FIASCO AVOIDED

One of the best editorial commentaries on the cattle situation recently appeared in the Wichita Eagle. The paper pointed out that cattle prices had improved materially, from the extreme lows that were touched not long ago. And government assistance, it observed, was limited to such stimulations as helping improve the cattlemen's credit position, and supplying cheap feed.

Then the Eagle said: "But what if the government had yielded to the loud outcries for purchasing cattle at parity? Experienced stockmen say the government would have owned most of the cattle on the ranges. There woul have followed an artificial shortage of beef, vastly higher prices, and other fiasco of the price support program. It is noteworthy that no established, responsible cattlemen group is demanding such a step . . . Never, not even in the depression thirties, have the cattlement asked supports. They are fearful of the controls which accompany them . . . .

"The whole support program, with accumulating surpluses and shrinking markets, has raised heavy doubts."

When government uses the taxpayers' money to aid any group, government will make the policles and do the bossing-and in the long run both producer and consumer will be hurt. All of us can profit from the example the cattlemen have been setting.

#### THE NEWEST IDEA

The Fairport, New York, Herald-Mail recently said: "Our country with its idea of individual liberty as stated in the Declaration of Independence is still the newest idea in the world . . . . Many of us in our own country fail to understand fully the essence and the newness of the American idea.'

### DON'T FORGET LOCAL GOVERNMENT

When we talk of taxes, most of think of the federal government. That's natural-for federal taxation constitutes our greatest tax burden. But we will make a bad mistake if we overlook government at the other levels. During the last fiscal year, says the Tax Review, state tax callections broke all previous records, reaching a high of \$10,542,000,000. And local tax collections also scaled a new peak, estimated at \$10,200.000. This means that the combined state-local tax load came to \$133.16 for every man, woman and child

in the country. The moral is plain. We must fight against wastefully and excessively costly government everywhere-not just in Washington, D. C.

#### A LESSON FROM EAST GERMANY






A sign on the Fort Worth-Jacksboro highway, "John, the Sole-Saver."

Continued progress along this line may eventually provide farmers and ranchers with healthier and higher meat producing animals. Cattle grubs, alone, have been estimated to cause a loss of \$100 million each year through annoyance of animals and damage to meat and hides. Losses caused by screwworms are estimated to be about \$25 million each year.






