MORE FOOD FROM FEWER

ACRES

A spokesman for two national organizations advertising agents has flatly contradicted the idea that we're in for a derpression or any marked drop in business activity. To buttress his stand, he cited a number of changes which have taken place in the country and which, in his view, mean that the economy will continue to grow.

One of these has to do with a quiet revolution that has occurred in agriculture. He said: "Our farms have become mechanized. And they have Metter methods and are far more efficient. Al-Munugh our population has had a net shift of almost 6.000,000 away from the farms since 1940, there has been a 52 per cent increase of farm cutput per man-hours, resulting in higher living standards for both farm and urban people."

This tribute to the mechanized farm and to its wast influence on the well-being of the whole munty, is well deserved. Indeed, the machine, coupled with scientific soil utilization and conas reation techniques, is the best weapon we have against the spectre of eventual famine. Some 1,-MO new humans are born in this country each day. Buy 1960, we will have to feed about 180,lorngry mouths. And we will have to do it farm farm acreage which, all expect, will change but little if at all. That means that each acre must and only produce more, but must be zealously goarded for the future. More mechanization is the answer.

BLIND SELFISHNESS

A country editor recently observed that our present system of agriculture price supports, which has led to ever-mounting surpluses, is ceramsound and needs correcting. But, he conmued in effect, groups which are critical of it - deducing business and labor organizationse on much stronger ground if they show and some willingness to make a few financial sacrifices on their own hook. His point, in other words, is that almost everybody, not just the farmer, has been looking for profitable favors and preferential treatment.

There is much justice in this view. A parallel is found in the effort to cut government spending everyone is for it in principle, but cries with main when it theatens to touch him. And that Mindly selfish attitude could ruin this or any general attitude that can make or break a comcountry-morally as well as financially.

SOME THINGS DON'T CHANGE

The electric utility industry provides a striking example of the capabilities of private industry. Ralph A. Tudor, Undersecretary of the Interior, highlights the situation in these words: "For the past several years approximately three billion dollars of risk capital a year has gone into the electric transmission and distribution facilities of the country. It is fortunate that this has not been a part of our increasing Federal debt. It is expected that during the next two years, the investments will be even greater and thereafter we can only estimate but there is little doubt that demands for new facilities will be heavy indeed. The job is so big that investor capital must be encouraged and we propose to do just that."

This tremendus expansion program isn't costing the taxpayers a cent. As new installations go into operation, they are entered on the tax rolls and become heavy taxpayers themselves. The invested savings of many thousands of Americans make this possible. New electric energy has been created as needed. Jobs and opportunities have resulted. If government had undertaken the program, the result would be greater deficits or higher taxes, and further diminishing of the economic opportunities open to the private citizen -lost freedom for all of us.

Times have changed so very much. It's still up to free individuals and private enterprise to keep on building this country.



Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

AUSTIN-"In spite of the knowledge of its cause and spread, and of curative methods, tuberculosis is still a very serious problem not only in Texas, es," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"It is true that tuberculosis no longer is first on the list of killing diseases, as it was formerly, ing been reduced to eighth place in Texas, it still is responsible for more deaths between the ages of fifteen and forty-five than any other disease. And this fact exists even though the majority of tuberculosis patients could have their condition arrested if it were recognized and proper

"Treatment of the early recognized case is essential. It is of equal importance, from a public health standpoint, that the spread of this devastating infection be prevented. A more intelthousands of lives.

"When a diagnosis of active tuberculosis has been made, examination of all of the other members of the immediate family should follow as a matter of course. Tuberculosis runs in families, not because of any especial susceptibility to the disease, but because it is communicable, being usually transmitted through close and prolonged contact with the active case.'

To reduce the number of deaths caused by tuberculosis, Dr. Cox suggests periodic examination of all adults, a check-up by physicians of the known active cases and contacts, regular examinations of high school children, isolation or hospitalization of the active tuberculosis case, and a









