### LARGE VOLUME-LOW PROFIT

Time magazine recently devoted a feature article to the problems involved in the distribution of goods—an enterprise which requires the work of some 20,000,000 people, or one-third of our entire labor force. Time's conclusion was: "On both ends of the distribution chain, manufacturers and merchants are coming to realize the same thing: the only way to cut down distribution expense is to organize it on the same large-volume, low profit principle as distribution."

As a matter of fact, distribution has made enormous strides in this direction, and it is currently working on innovations which it hopes will result in longer strides still. The pioneers here were the chain systems.. The basic chain idea, which never has been changed in its essentials, was that if enough goods could be moved, even though the profit on each item was very small, a satisfactury total profit would result and seller and consumer would both benefit. At the beginning. many thought that idea was not only very revolutionary but downright crazy. They said it would never work. Actually, it was as rousing a success as anyone could imagine, and it has been a far more important factor in building American living standards than many of us have given it aredit for. No one knows how many billions of dollars the practical application of that one idea has saved the American people.

At the present time much attention is being given to mechanized, labor-saving methods of tandling goods, both in warehouses and in the retail stores. The country's retailers, like its producers, are ever in search of better and cheaper ways to do their jobs.







The events of the last few weeks in Indochina, Geneva, and elsewhere around the world have pointed up more than anything else our need to let our friends in the world know that we seek no territory, no colonies, and no preferential treatment for ourselves. If we are to accomplish this result that we all so greatly desire, we must, above everything else, have our government devoted to a bipartisan or actually a nonpartisan foreign policy. This country can never successfully have a foreign policy that is a Democratic policy or a Republican policy. In dealing with foreign countries, we can only deal on an American policy. It must be made clear to everyone else in the world that all of us, Democrats and Republicans, first as Americans think alike, as far as foreign affairs are concerned. Problems that confront us in the world cannot be settled or solved without their being approached by a unified American people. We have. I believe, made some progress toward reaching the nity in foreign affairs that we must have. All indications are now that even more progress will be made in this direction within the next few weeks since the leaders of both parties have indicated their desire to get together in this vital problem. I hope that this unity can be established within a very short time so that our world policy can begin to make progress instead of being slowed down by

Bears out our observations of the past few week that culling of herds is being done earlier this year with dry cows and culls, including many marginal dairy producers being cashed out. Probably they are bringing lots more dollars now than they would a few weeks later.

Best fat cows drew \$13 to \$15 two loads of Triangle cows from the Tom Burnett Estate at \$15. Best fed cattle were from I. S. Scott, Castro County, there steers weighed 880 at \$24.75. Scott is a top feeder, has often topped the market in the past.





TO THE TAXPAYERS OF MUNDAY SCHOOL DISTRICT:

Due to circumstances beyond the control of the Board, it seems that a slight increase in the evaluation of property in the Munday School District is necessary. An emergency made it necessary to enlarge our Negro school building, erect a bus shed, and make other emergency repairs that cost the District more than \$25,000. All this was done without a bond issue or without an increase in taxes. The Board hoped to be able to absorb this expense over a short season with surplus funds. But since this expense was incurred several things have happened that have upset this plan.

In addition to the above problem of expense, the State has increased the amount of its Foundation Fund and at the same time increased the Per Cent charged to Local Districts. Where the per-cent was formerly 17% it is now increased to

In face of all the above, it is very probable that this could have been absorbed if the Munday School District could have kept all the territory it held at one time intact. It is very probable that we will lose a part together with a large amount of evaluation if present efforts are successful. The Board has come to a definite decision that an increase of not more than 5% is much better than running the schools on a deficit.
