Congressman Frank Ikard The House unanimously adopt ed a measure which would exempt gasoline and diesel fuel and other fuels from Federal excise taxes last week. The bill that finally passed the House was one that was written by the Commit tee on Ways and Means after the hearings that had been held on the bill that I introduced and others that would have had the same effect.

It has again been proposed that first class mail rates be increased so that a stamp for an ordinary letter would cost four cents in stead of the present three cents. First class mail has historically made a profit for the Post Office Department, and it would seem that it would be better to thor oughly investigate the possibility of raising the other classes of mail before increasing the only one that has ever made a profit.







> The Special School Milk proram, now in its second year of peration, is designed to increase ne consumption of milk by the school children, both in schools having feeding facilities and in other schools where space limitaions or other factors prevent the establishment of food preparaion and service facilities. At mid December, 62,000 schools had been approved for the program. Latest reports on actual consumption are for October. Fiftyfour thousand school were oper ating in the program. In that nonth, approximately 162 million half pints of milk were consumed nder the program.

The United States Department f Agriculture estimates that 16 million school children were drinking milk in October under he program, and consuming milk t a rate of 17.8 million half pints day.
