Austin-Texas cancer clinics diagnosed 1,526 cases of cancer in varying stages of development during 1955, the State Department of Health has reported.

The report was contained in a summary of activities of 11 cancer diagnostic and treatment centers operating in Texas which get financial support from the State Health Department. Of the total number of cases

diagnosed, 1,047 were localized tumors, 342 showed evidence of 'regional matastases' (spread to adjoining body area from the original site), and 139 showed remote matastases. The report said 1,312 cases of

From A COUNTRY KITCHEN



An Old-Fashioned Dessert

Because of the nourishment in good bread, old-fashioned bread pudding is an especially good family dessert. It was a favorite dessert

at grandmother's and was varied with spices of apples—usually dried apples.

In fact, bread pudding goes far back in cooking history. In one of my old cookbooks, published about 100 years ago, is the following simple recipe: "A well-baked loaf of stale bread may be tied in a linen cloth, and boiled or steamed, which, with a good sauce answers well."

for a plain pudding."

Our housewife today starts with grandmother's basically good recipe, but she has the advantage of modern processed food—from peanut brittle to frozen or canned peaches—for providing variation.

I use the following basic bread pudding recipe: Break 5 slices of day-old white bread in small pieces into 1½ quart size casserole. Scald together 2 cups milk, 3 tablespoons butter, ¼ cup sugar and ½ teaspoon salt. When scalded mix with 2 slightly beaten eggs. Add ½ teaspoon vanilla. Pour over bread pieces. Bake at 325° for 45 minutes to 1 hour. Serve hot or cold. Will serve 4 to 6.

This pudding can be very good served with a simple sauce such as a lemon sauce. Children love it with jelly or jelly melted in the sauce pan and poured over it hot. I make my lemon sauce as follows: for a plain pudding.

Lemon Sauce

2 tablespoons cornstarch 1% teaspoon salt 1% cups boiling water

tablespoons butter 4 tablespoons lemon juice grated rind of 1 lemon

Mix together sugar, cornstarch and salt. Add boiling water. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thick and clear. (About 5 minutes). Remove from heat, add butter, lemon juice and rind. Serve







News From The U.S. Congress

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Congressman Frank Ikard

In addition to the farm bill, the House this week considered the authorization for military construction for the next fiscal year. This bill was favorably acted upon and among its other provisions it provided that to support the construction requirements of the Air Force in accordance with its present program, military construction at Sheppard Air Force Base was authorized in the amount of \$6,842,000. These funds, of course, were made available at a future date and will provide for a hospital and medical facilities and housing and community facilities at Sheppard. When the funds have been appropriated and the plans completed., the detailed information concerning each of the various projects at Sheppard will be announced by the Corps of Engineers of the Army which acts as the construction agency of the

Next week the House will consider two pieces of legislation that we have previously discussed here one of which is the bill that would expand the upstream flood control program which was introduced by Congressman Bob Poage of Waco. This bill would expand an already effective proream for better conservation of water. It has provisions in it that will also be most helpful to municipalities seeking new sources of water. The other bill that will be considered is the one that provides for a great expansion of the Federal highway system and HOW TO CLEANSE FRESH FOODS OF FALLOUT



TIP TO HOUSEWIVES on how to cleanse fruits and vegetables of radioactive material if they became contaminated is provided by radiological expert and housewife Dr. Rosalind Yalow of the U. S. Veterans Hospital, New York. At a demon-

Housewives might have to handle radioactively contaminated fruits and vegetables as gingerly as a newborn baby for a time if their food stocks are ever exposed to fallout.

Under those circumstances, radiological expert Dr. Rosalind Yalow, a housewife and staff member of the New York Veterans Administration Hospital, emphasises that a housewife would have to take special precautions to avoid contact with radioactive particles in preparing food.

FRESH FOODS most likely to be exposed to fallout contamination would be those coming directly from home garden plots, open fruit stands, or left near an open window in a fallout area. Fruits and vegetables left on open pantry shelves would have more of a chance of being contaminated than those in closed cupboards or

This so-called "contamination" would affeet only the surface of fruits and vegetables unless, through careless peeling or washing, a housewife allowed the center of the fruit to ne contaminated.

Dr. Yalow had the following tips to avoid this 1. Use fruits and vegetables which were prewrapped, or kept away from the open air such as they would be in a refrigerator.

stration during a Radiological School sponsored by the Federal Civil Defense Administration, she showed how to prepare fruits or vegetables for eating when the outside is "contaminated" by fallost particles.

2. When washing produce, use running water if possible, providing it comes from a covered source such as a well or a known uncontaminated supply. If running water is not available, be sure the water used to wash the vegetables is changed

3. Fruits and vegetables with thick skins, such as bananas, or those that may be easily washed, such as apples, would be preferable. A housewife would be wise to handle these foods with disposable towels during cleansing.

WITHOUT SPECIAL "know-how" and care, Dr. Yalow points out, it would be easy for a per-son accidentally to transmit radioactive contamination into fruits or vegetables by washing them with "contaminated" water, or simply by han-ding peeled fruits with "contaminated" gleves

With this knowledge, a farmer's wife, for example, could in most cases make the pro-duce from her fallout-exposed garden safe and usable again by her family.

After an attack, housewives would find out by radio whether their homes were located in a fall-out zone. Then they would learn whether to take

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

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


