THE MONEY YOU NEVER SEE

Thurman Sensing of the Southern States Industrial Council suggests that the major reason why people don't realize how excessively expensive government is lies in "the fact that they never see the taxes they pay.

This is because most or all of the federal income taxes paid by the majority of workers are required to be withheld by the employer, who turns them into the Treasury. The worker never sees the money and so doesn't realize he didn't get his full earnings.

Thus the device of the withholding tax may indirectly encourage government waste and extra- stant work in the enforcement of vagance. News From The U. S. Congress

Congressman Frank Ikard The control of the illegal traffic in narcotics the last several years has been one of the most serious and troublesome social problems that we have been confronted with. The first Federal legislation in an attempt to control narcotics was the Harrison Narcotics Law which was enacted in 1914 at which time there were approximately 250,000 known narcotics addicts in the United States while today even with the tremendous increase in population since 1914, it is estimated that there are only 60,000 known addicts in the coun try. It has been through the conment led to a substantial decrease umber of addicts in this country. It has been a historical fact that after each National emergency like the Civil War, World War I, and World War II, there has been an increase in the illegal use of drugs. This was certainly true after the end of World War II, and the situation grew to such alarming proportions that in 1951 Congress enacted laws that provided for more severe mandatory penalties. After the enactment of this Law, by 1952 the post-war upsurge in addiction and in narcotics traffic had reached its peak. In 1953 there were 23,627 arrests under the Narcotics Laws. In 1954 there

were 19,489, and the number of

Good records will make the job of preparing a claim for a refund on gasoline used on the a more effecient production ool, says W. L. Ulich, extension agriculture engineer. Farmers are low eligible to ask for a refund Federal excise tax.

To get a refund, a farmer must file after June 30 and before FOR SALE-1 parakeet including October 1, a claim with the District Director of Internal Revenue covering the gasoline used duryear. After 1956 refunds will be made for a one-year period from July 1 to June 30.

Refunds, explains Ulich, will be made only on gasoline used on a farm for farming purposes. 
